A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO CAREGIVING.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1 SECTION 1. Act 204, Session Laws of Hawaii 2007, expanded 2 the mandate of the joint legislative committee on family caregiving by including grandparents of children age eighteen 3 4 years and younger, or nineteen years of age or older with physical or cognitive limitations, in the Act's definition of 5 family caregiver. The revised definition is now more consistent 6 with the scope of the National Family Caregiver Support Program. 7 8 The Act also required the committee to examine the issues facing 9 this population of grandparents raising grandchildren. 10 Since then, numerous government agencies have testified 11 before the committee regarding how the agencies identify and address the needs of grandparents raising grandchildren. 12 addition, the executive office on aging presented the 2007 Needs 13 Assessment of Grandparents Raising Grandchildren in the State of 14 15 Hawaii, prepared by the University of Hawaii, department of

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family and consumer science.

1	The needs assessment indicates that over fourteen thousand
2	grandparents are primary caregivers for over thirty-three
3	thousand grandchildren in Hawaii and that these numbers are
4	expected to grow. While there is a wide range of service needs,
5	the most often-cited relate to children's programs, financial
6	assistance, respite, and grandparents rights. Many of these
7	services are available, but barriers are preventing grandparents
8	from using the services. Barriers may include a lack of
9	information regarding the availability of services, a lack of
10	services in a particular county, or legal or financial
11	impediments. For instance, in focus groups, some grandparents
12	expressed a fear of losing their grandchildren. Others
13	identified a need for an advocate or case worker to help guide
14	them to the services and through the various systems.
15	The legislature finds that the needs assessment provides
16	critical demographic information and feedback regarding what
17	programs and services grandparents require to care for their
18	grandchildren. The findings indicate that the population of
19	grandparents raising grandchildren faces particular challenges,
20	different in some ways from the general caregiver population,
21	and should have a focused task force to specifically address

1 those concerns. The legislature further finds that the next 2 step is a comprehensive, coordinated effort to identify: 3 (1)The services that exist to meet the identified needs; 4 Any service deficiencies; (2)5 Barriers that prevent grandparents from accessing (3)6 services; and 7 (4)What can be done to facilitate the provision of 8 services to grandparents raising grandchildren. 9 The purpose of this Act is to establish a task force to specifically focus on the needs of and issues facing 10 11 grandparents raising grandchildren. 12 SECTION 2. (a) There is established a grandparents 13 raising grandchildren task force to focus on the needs of and 14 issues facing grandparents raising grandchildren. The task force shall consist of a representative of: 15 16 The University of Hawaii, center on aging, to serve as (1)17 co-chair; 18 The University of Hawaii, college of tropical (2)agriculture and human resources, to serve as co-chair; 19 20 (3)The department of education; 21 The department of human services; (4)

The department of health, executive office on aging;

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(0)	The department of public safety;
(7)	The judiciary;
(8)	The department of the attorney general, child support
	enforcement agency;
(9)	Each area office on aging;
(10)	The policy advisory board for elder affairs;
(11)	Na Tutu Coalition;
(12)	Queen Lili'uokalani Children's Center;
(13)	Legal Aid Society of Hawaii; and
(14)	Hawaii Volunteer Legal Services.
(b)	In accessing the needs of and issues facing
grandpare	nts, the task force shall, among other things:
(1)	Review the 2007 Needs Assessment of Grandparents
	Raising Grandchildren in the State of Hawaii, prepared
	by the University of Hawaii, department of family and
	consumer science;
(2)	Review the most recent Four Year State Plan on Aging
	to the United States Administration on Aging by the
	executive office on aging and the area agencies on
	aging;
(3)	Review the testimony of the various agencies submitted
	to the joint legislative committee on family

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1		caregiving at its hearing on August 16, 2007,
2		regarding issues facing grandparents raising
3		grandchildren;
4	(4)	Review laws relating to issues facing grandparents
5		raising grandchildren, including:
6		(A) Section 302A-482, Hawaii Revised Statutes,
7		regarding the affidavit for caregiver consent,
8		which permits a caregiver, under certain
9		circumstances, to enroll a minor in school and
10		consent to participation in curricular and
11		co-curricular activities;
12		(B) Chapters 571, Hawaii Revised Statutes, regarding
13		child custody and support; and
14		(C) Chapter 587, Hawaii Revised Statutes, regarding
15		child protective services;
16	(5)	The memorandum prepared by the department of education
17		to guide school personnel when enrolling students who
18		reside with caregivers;
19	(6)	Review the supports and services offered to caregivers
20		by the department of education through its
21		comprehensive student support system;

1	(7)	Investigate whether a need arises when a minor
2		residing, formally or informally, with a grandparent
3		requires consent for medical service, including when a
4		student needs consent for programs and services under
5		the Individuals with Disabilities Act or Section 504
6		of the Rehabilitation Act of 1973;
7	(8)	Investigate the issues that arise when a minor
8		residing, formally or informally, with a grandparent
9		is returned to the custody of a parent;
10	(9)	Investigate housing issues that may arise when a
11		grandparent is raising a grandchild, particularly when
12		the grandparent resides in senior housing, and
13		identify any state or federal laws that prohibit or
14		prevent a grandchild from residing with a grandparent;
15	(10)	Review how each area office on aging allocates the
16		federal funds it receives under the National Family
17		Caregiver Support Program for grandparent programs;
18	(11)	Identify the agencies that collect data relating to
19		grandparents raising grandchildren and whether the
20		data can be more comprehensive, uniform, and readily
21		available or exchanged; and

1	(12)	Identify legal needs and whether these needs are being
2		adequately addressed.
3	(c)	The task force on grandparents raising grandchildren
4	shall subm	nit an interim report to the legislature and the joint
5	legislativ	ve committee on family caregiving no later than twenty
6	days prior	to the convening of the 2009 regular session and a
7	final repo	ort to the legislature and the joint legislative
8	committee	on family caregiving no later than twenty days prior
9.	to June 30	, 2009. The final report shall include, to the
10	greatest e	extent possible:
11	(1)	A list of the services that exist in each county to
12		meet grandparents' identified needs;
13	(2)	A discussion of service deficiencies in each county;
14	(3)	A discussion of identifiable barriers that prevent
15		grandparents from accessing services;
16	(4)	A synopsis of the task force's work and any findings
17		regarding the task force's responsibilities as
18		detailed in section 2(b) of this Act; and
19	(5)	Recommendations, including possible legislation.
20	(d)	The task force shall cease to exist on June 30, 2009.

SECTION 3. This Act shall take effect upon its approval. 1
