A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO REPORTS OF PERSONS WITH A DEMENTING ILLNESS.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1 SECTION 1. Chapter 286, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is 2 amended by adding a new section to be appropriately designated 3 and to read as follows: 4 Reports on cognitive disorders. (a) 5 "Physician" means a doctor of medicine or osteopathy licensed to 6 practice under chapter 453 or 460. 7 (b) Every physician shall report immediately in writing to 8 the respective county examiner of drivers every patient age 9 fifteen years or older residing in that county whose dementing 10 illness affects that person's ability to safely operate a motor 11 vehicle. If a designated physician makes a report to the 12 examiner in good faith, that physician shall be immune from 13 civil liability that might otherwise result from making the 14 report. If a designated physician does not make a report, that 15 physician shall be immune from civil liability that might 16 otherwise result from not making the report. 17 (c) A temporary working group, consisting of the director 18 of transportation, the four county examiners of drivers, and

5	(d) Determinations regarding a person's ability to safely			
6	operate a motor vehicle shall be based upon the actual effect of

9	medical condition.			
10	(e) Physician reports as required by the examiners of			
11	drivers under this section shall be upon forms prescribed or			
12	provided by the department of transportation, with input from			
13	the working group. Each report shall include the person's name,			
14	address, date of birth, sex, and description of how the person's			
15	current medical status affects the person's ability to safely
