### A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO LITTER CONTROL.

#### BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1	SECTION 1. The litter control office, established by							
2	Chapter 339, Hawaii Revised Statutes, existed from 1977 until							
3	1996, when it was administratively closed due to budgetary							
4	constraints. The legislature finds that the office provided a							
5	critical, necessary, and strategic service to the public in							
6	serving as the focal point to plan, coordinate, and implement							
7	litter control efforts in the State.							
8	The legislature also finds that the litter control office							
9	was very successful in its efforts to clean up litter, prevent							
10	littering, and educate the public through an anti-litter							
11	campaign. Among its accomplishments were:							
12	(1) A statewide recycling campaign, including a							
13	fundraising program from private businesses;							
14	(2) An annual statewide litter prevention and clean up							
15	campaign; partnerships and involvement of volunteers							
16	from civic and community organizations;							
17	(3) A statewide training program for volunteers;							

1	(4)	A statewide litter hotline and complaint resolution
2		for litter hotspots;
3	(5)	An abandoned vehicle and appliances removal program;
4	i	fundraising from private foundations, organizations
5		and individuals;
6	(6)	Establishment of service learning and education
7		programs in schools and youth organizations;
8	(7)	Annual statewide shoreline and coastal clean ups; and
9	(8)	The creation of the nonprofit, section 501(c)(3)
10		federal tax-exempt organization, the Community Work
11		Day Program.
12	The	litter control office, like the Community Work Day
13	Program,	was part of the national Keep America Beautiful
14	program,	which partners with business, government, and the
15	community	to create successful education and action-oriented
16	programs	for island-wide clean up projects, roadside
17	beautific	cation programs; anti-pollution of the ocean and streams
18	and disea	ase prevention efforts; and other clean environment and
19	community	revitalization initiatives, such as the Ala Wai Canal
20	clean up	and the renovation and reuse of the old Maui High
21	School.	All of these projects are made possible by volunteers

- 1 and in-kind donations coordinated and supported by the Community
- 2 Work Day Program staff.
- 3 The purpose of this Act is to facilitate anti-litter and
- 4 recycling education projects.
- 5 SECTION 2. Section 339-1, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
- 6 amended by amending the definition of "director" to read as
- 7 follows:
- 8 ""Director" means the director of [the department of]
- 9 health."
- 10 SECTION 3. Section 339-3, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
- 11 amended by amending subsection (a) to read as follows:
- "(a) The director shall:
- 13 (1) Be responsible for the study of available research in
- the field of litter control, prevention, removal,
- disposal, and recycling; the study of methods for the
- implementation of such research; and development of
- 17 public educational programs;
- 18 (2) Serve as a coordinator between the State, state
- agencies, and various organizations seeking to aid in
- the anti-litter effort;
- 21 (3) Cooperate with local governments to accomplish the
- 22 coordination of anti-litter efforts; [and]

8	SECT	ION 4. Chapter 371K, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is						
9	amended by adding a new section to be appropriately designated							
10	and to read as follows:							
11	" <u>§37</u>	1K- Anti-litter and recycling education						
12	demonstra	tion projects special fund. (a) There is established						
13	an anti-l	itter and recycling education demonstration projects						
14	special f	und into which shall be deposited appropriations by the						
15	legislatu	re, gifts, and other donated funds. The fund shall be						
16	administe	red by the office of community services.						
17	(b)	All interest earned or accrued on moneys deposited in						
18	the fund	shall become part of the fund. Subject to legislative						
19	authoriza	tion, the office of community services may expend						
20	moneys fro	om the fund for anti-litter and recycling education						
21	demonstra	tion projects."						

1	SECTION	5.	There	1S	appropriated	out	OÏ	the	beverage

- 2 container deposit special fund the sum of \$500,000 or so much
- 3 thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2008-2009 for
- 4 deposit into the anti-litter and recycling education projects
- 5 special fund established pursuant to section 4 of this Act.
- 6 SECTION 6. There is appropriated out of the anti-litter
- 7 and recycling education projects special fund the sum of
- 8 \$500,000 or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year
- 9 2008-2009 for anti-litter and recycling education projects.
- 10 The sum appropriated shall be expended by the department of
- 11 labor and industrial relations as a grant-in-aid to the
- 12 Community Work Day Program for the purposes of this Act.
- 13 SECTION 7. Statutory material to be repealed is bracketed
- 14 and stricken. New statutory material is underscored.
- 15 SECTION 8. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2008.
