A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO TAXATION.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

7	SECT	ION 2. Section 237-23, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
8	amended b	y amending subsection (a) to read as follows:
9	"(a)	This chapter shall not apply to the following
10	persons:	
11	(1)	Public service companies as that term is defined in
12		section 239-2, with respect to the gross income,
13		either actual gross income or gross income estimated
14		and adjusted, that is included in the measure of the
15		tax imposed by chapter 239;
16	(2)	Public utilities owned and operated by the State or
17		any county, or other political subdivision thereof;
18	(3)	Fraternal benefit societies, orders, or associations,
19		operating under the lodge system, or for the exclusive
20		benefit of the members of the fraternity itself,
21		operating under the lodge system, and providing for
22		the payment of death, sick, accident, prepaid legal
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services, or other benefits to the members of the 1 2 societies, orders, or associations, and to their 3 dependents; 4 (4) Corporations, associations, trusts, or societies 5 organized and operated exclusively for religious, charitable, scientific, or educational purposes, as 6 7 well as that of operating senior citizens housing 8 facilities qualifying for a loan under the laws of the 9 United States as authorized by section 202 of the 10 Housing Act of 1959, as amended, as well as that of operating a prepaid legal services plan, as well as 11 12 that of operating or managing a homeless facility, or 13 any other program for the homeless authorized under 14 part VII of chapter 356D; 15 (5) Business leagues, chambers of commerce, boards of trade, civic leagues, agricultural and horticultural 16 17 organizations, and organizations operated exclusively 18 for the benefit of the community and for the promotion of social welfare that shall include the operation of 19 20 a prepaid legal service plan, and from which no profit 21 inures to the benefit of any private stockholder or 22 individual;



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1 (6) Hospitals, infirmaries, and sanitaria; Cooperative associations incorporated under chapter 2 (7)3 421 or Code section 521 cooperatives which fully meet 4 the requirements of section 421-23, except Code section 521 cooperatives need not be organized in 5 6 Hawaii; provided that: 7 (A) The exemption shall apply only to the gross income derived from activities that are pursuant 8 9 to purposes and powers authorized by chapter 421, 10 except those provisions pertaining to or requiring corporate organization in Hawaii do not 11 12 apply to Code section 521 cooperatives; 13 The exemption shall not relieve any person who (B) 14 receives any proceeds of sale from the 15 association of the duty of returning and paying the tax on the total gross proceeds of the sales 16 on account of which the payment was made, in the 17 same amount and at the same rate as would apply 18 19 thereto had the sales been made directly by the person, and all those persons shall be so 20 21 taxable; and



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1 (C) As used in this paragraph, "section 521 cooperatives" mean associations that qualify as a 2 3 cooperative under section 521 (with respect to 4 exemption of farmers' cooperatives from tax) of 5 the Internal Revenue Code of 1986, as amended; (8)Persons affected with Hansen's disease and kokuas, 6 7 with respect to business within the county of Kalawao; (9) Corporations, companies, associations, or trusts 8 9 organized for the establishment and conduct of 10 cemeteries no part of the net earnings of which inures 11 to the financial benefit of any private stockholder or 12 individual; provided that the exemption shall apply only to the activities of those persons in the conduct 13 14 of cemeteries and shall not apply to any activity the 15 primary purpose of which is to produce income, even 16 though the income is to be used for or in the 17 furtherance of the exempt activities of those persons; 18 [and] 19 Nonprofit shippers associations operating under part (10)20 296 of the Civil Aeronautics Board Economic 21 Regulations [-]; and

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

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Report Title:

Income Tax; General Excise Tax; Potable Water

Description:

Provides an income tax and general excise tax exemption for companies that provide potable water and are exempt under section 501(c)(12) of the IRC and collect at least 85% of its income from members for the sole purpose of meeting losses and expenses.
