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A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO LANGUAGE ACCESS.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1	PART I
2	SECTION 1. Section 371-32, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
3	amended to read as follows:
4	"[-[]§371-32[-]] Definitions. Whenever used in this part,
5	unless a different meaning clearly appears from the context:
6	["Access or participate"] <u>"Access" or "participate"</u> means
7	to be informed of, participate in, and benefit from the
8	services, programs, and activities offered by the State and
9	covered entities.
10	"Covered entity" means a person or organization receiving
11	state financial assistance, including grants, purchase-of-
12	service contracts, or any other arrangement by which the State
13	provides or otherwise makes available assistance in the form of
14	funds to the person or organization for the purpose of rendering
15	services [on behalf of the State.] <u>to the public.</u> It shall not
16	include procurement contracts, state insurance or guaranty
17	contracts, licenses, tax credits, or loan guarantees to private



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businesses of general concern that do not render services on
 behalf of the State.

3 "Language" means human speech or the expression of ideas by
4 written characters and includes systems used by nations, people,
5 or other distinct communities.

6 "Limited English proficient" means individuals who, on
7 account of national origin, do not speak English as their
8 primary language and who identify themselves [+]as[+] having a
9 limited ability to read, write, speak, or understand the English
10 language.

"Oral language services" means the free provision of oral information necessary to enable limited English proficient persons to access or participate in services, programs, or activities[-] of a state agency or covered entity.

15 <u>"Purchase-of-service contract" means any and all types of</u>
16 formal written agreements, regardless of what they may be
17 called, between the State and any person, to purchase or
18 otherwise acquire any service for the purpose of rendering
19 services to the public.

20 "State" or "state agency" means the executive, legislative,
21 and judicial branches of state government, including

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departments, offices, commissions, boards, or other agencies 1 within the executive, legislative, or judicial branches. 2 3 "Vital documents" [+ (1) Means] means printed documents that provide important 4 information necessary to access or participate in services, 5 6 programs, and activities [; and 7 (2) Includes but is] of a state agency or covered entity, including but not limited to $[\tau]$ applications, outreach 8 materials, and written notices of rights, denials, losses, or 9 decreases in benefits or services. 10 11 "Written language services" means the free provision of written information necessary to enable limited English 12 proficient persons to access or participate in services, 13 programs, or activities of a state agency or covered entity." 14 SECTION 2. Section 371-37, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is 15 amended by amending subsection (a) to read as follows: 16 "(a) There is established the language access advisory 17 council within the department of labor and industrial relations 18 for administrative purposes. The council shall consist of the 19 following members to be appointed by the governor: 20 One representative from the state government; 21 (1)

12		PART II	
13	SECT	ION 3. For many people in Hawaii, English is not their	
14	primary language, and they have only a limited ability to read,		
15	write, speak, or understand English. According to the 2000		
16	census, n	early 290,000 people, or 24 per cent of Hawaii's	
17	population, speak a language other than English at home,		
18	including more than 250,000 people who speak an Asian or Pacific		
19	Island la	nguage. For persons who are limited English	
20	proficien	t, language barriers prohibit them from fully	
21	participating in the community and can undermine their ability		
22	to be self-sufficient and productive.		
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Recently, the legislature enacted Act 290, Session Laws of 1 Hawaii 2006, codified as part of chapter 371, Hawaii Revised 2 Statutes, to address the language access needs of limited 3 English proficient persons by, among other things, requiring 4 each state agency to take reasonable steps to ensure meaningful 5 6 access by limited English proficient persons to services, programs, and activities funded and provided by the State. 7 As 8 the lead agency for the State in this regard, the department of labor and industrial relations plays a critical role. 9

10 All state agencies and other covered entities are required 11 to establish a plan for language access to provide equal, 12 meaningful access to essential government services, such as 13 social services, job training, employment assistance, fair and 14 impartial hearings, and emergency assistance, to all of Hawaii's 15 diverse population.

16 As of December 2007, plans for 23 out of 25 state agencies 17 and 40 covered entities were completed. As the implementation 18 of the plans approaches, two major stumbling blocks hinder 19 meaningful access to essential government services for persons 20 who are limited English proficient. First, there is no 21 comprehensive system in Hawaii to identify language interpreters 22 and translators and to refer interpreters or translators to the HB2575 HD1 HMS 2008-1817

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1 state agencies and other covered entities seeking assistance. 2 Second, there is a lack of trained and certified language 3 interpreters and translators who can meet the demand to assist limited English proficient persons in a timely, meaningful 4 5 manner. 6 The legislature finds that it is necessary to establish a 7 statewide language access bank to act as a centralized resource 8 to: 9 (1) Compile and maintain a roster of available language 10 interpreters and translators; 11 (2) Coordinate training programs to increase the 12 availability of qualified language interpreters and 13 translators; 14 (3) Match and refer qualified language interpreters and 15 translators to the needs of state agencies and other 16 covered entities seeking assistance; 17 (4)Train state employees in positions of public contact 18 that are first to respond to limited English 19 proficient customers who seek to access state-funded 20 services, programs, and activities; 21 Work toward developing in the long run the capacity (5)

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- and resources of the office of language access to



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1 assist state agencies with their language services 2 needs in the future; and 3 (6) Work toward standardizing the testing and 4 certification of language interpreters and translators 5 to ensure the quality and accuracy of their services. 6 After its initial establishment, a statewide language 7 access bank could become self-sustaining by collecting user 8 fees, subscription and training fees, and support from the 9 resources available to state agencies and other covered entities 10 seeking language interpreter and translator assistance. 11 The purpose of this part is to appropriate funds to establish a statewide access language bank. 12 13 SECTION 4. There is appropriated out of the general 14 revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$189,500 or so much 15 thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2008-2009 for the 16 department of labor and industrial relations to establish a 17 statewide language access bank to ensure meaningful access by 18 limited English proficient persons to state-funded services, 19 programs, and activities.

20 The sum appropriated shall be expended by the department of 21 labor and industrial relations for the purposes of this part.
