# A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO THE HAWAII HIGHER EDUCATION COMMISSION.

#### RE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII.

1	SECTION 1. The legislature finds that as Hawaii's		
2	technology sector grows, and as technology becomes embedded in		
3	many of our more traditional industries, there is a growing need		
4	for a workforce that has basic science, technology, engineering		
5	and mathematical skills, as well as graduates with specialized		
6	science and engineering degrees. Some states are addressing		
7	their science, technology, engineering, and math education, as		
8	well as other strategic post-secondary education needs through a		
9	strong commission on higher education. Examples include New		
10	Jersey, California, Arizona, and Maryland, among others. In		
11	these states, a commission helps coordinate an integrated system		
12	of higher education that includes both public and private		
13	institutions.		
14	Common goals of these commissions include:		
15	(1) Increasing the rate of students pursuing post-		
16	secondary education;		
17	(2) Improving access to education, training, and lifelong		

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learning;

1	(3)	Engaging the business community in setting goals and		
2		objectives; and		
3	(4)	Changing public perceptions and aspirations regarding		
4		higher education.		
5	In H	awaii, the state post-secondary education commission,		
6	as established by section 304A-3151, Hawaii Revised Statutes,			
7	has a limited scope. Its primary legislative mandate is to			
8	serve as a vehicle for receiving federal funds with the			
9	authority to develop procedures for receiving and responding to			
10	complaints. Most of the seats are assigned to representatives			
11	of the University of Hawaii, including all members of the board			
12	of regents, and the commission is administratively attached to			
13	the University of Hawaii, with the university's president			
14	designated as its administrative officer.			
15	The	legislature further finds that a state post-secondary		
16	education	commission with broader representation and a more		
17	comprehen	sive mandate would better serve the State's needs		
18	relative	to meeting the challenges of a global economy. A		
19	commission with representatives from public and private			
20	instituti	ons of higher education, government, and business could		
21	develop a	vision and a strategy to move Hawaii toward excellence		
22	in the tw	enty-first century.		

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         The purpose of this Act is to broaden the representation on
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    the state post-secondary education commission and expand its
    mission to increase student enrollment and access to higher

    education and recognize the workforce needs of Hawaii's business
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    community.
         SECTION 2. Chapter 304A, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
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    amended by amending the title of subpart C of part VII to read
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8
    as follows:

         SECTION 3. Section 304A-3151, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is

    amended to read as follows:
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         "[+]$304A-3151[+] Establishment of the [state post-

    secondary] Hawaii higher education commission; membership,
    administration. There is established a state [post-secondary

    education | commission [. The] on higher education to be known as
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    the Hawaii higher education commission. Notwithstanding the
    provisions of section 78-4, the commission shall consist of [the
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    members of the board of regents of the university, the
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    provisions of section 78-4 notwithstanding, and four other
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    members who shall be broadly and equitably representative of the
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    general public and public and private nonprofit and proprietary
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1	institutions of post-secondary education in the State who shal			
2	be appointed in accordance with section 26-34.] no more than			
3	fifteen members to be appointed as follows:			
4	(1)	The director of business, economic development, and		
5		tourism or the director's designee;		
6	(2)	The director of labor and industrial relations or the		
7		director's designee;		
8	(3)	The superintendent of education or the		
9		superintendent's designee;		
10	(4)	The president of the University of Hawaii or the		
11		<pre>president's designee;</pre>		
12	(5)	The president of Brigham Young University-Hawaii or		
13		the president's designee;		
14	(6)	The president of Chaminade University or the		
15		president's designee;		
16	(7)	The president of Hawaii Pacific University or the		
17		<pre>president's designee;</pre>		
18	(8)	The executive director of the high technology		
19		development corporation or the executive director's		
20		designee;		

1	(9)	The executive director of the Hawaii Association of
2		Independent Schools or the executive director's
3		designee;
4	(10)	Four members of Hawaii's business community, including
5		one representative each from the city and county of
6		Honolulu and the counties of Hawaii, Kauai, and Maui,
7		and from the different economic sectors of banking,
8		land planning, health, and international affairs;
9		provided that two of these members are to be appointed
10		by the president of the senate; provided further that
11		two of these members are to be appointed by the
12		speaker of the house of representatives; and
13	(11)	Two university students, to serve terms of one year,
14		to be nominated by the student governing body of their
15		respective institutions.
16	The chair	of the commission shall initially be appointed by the
17	governor	for a term of one year, following which the chair shall
18	be elected	d by the members of the commission. The commission
19	shall be ]	placed within the [university] department of business,
20	economic	development, and tourism for administrative purposes[ $ au$
21	and its a	dministrative officer shall be the president of the
22	universit	y]. The commission may appoint necessary staff members
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- 1 to carry out its mandate in accordance with applicable policies
- 2 and procedures of the [university.] department of business,
- 3 economic development, and tourism, and as provided for in the
- 4 state budget."
- 5 SECTION 4. Section 304A-3152, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
- 6 amended to read as follows:
- 7 "[{]\$304A-3152[}] Commission's duties, powers, and
- 8 authority. (a) The commission may cooperate with the federal
- 9 government to qualify the State to receive federal funds made
- 10 available under the Higher Education Act of 1965, Public Law 89-
- 11 329, as amended from time to time, and in addition may serve as
- 12 the state agency for the receipt of federal funds when federal
- 13 legislation dealing with higher education or post-secondary
- 14 education requires, as a condition of state receipt of such
- 15 funds, the designation of a state agency that is broadly
- 16 representative of the general public and of post-secondary
- 17 education in the State and when agencies other than the
- 18 commission created by this subpart may not qualify. The
- 19 commission also may receive funds from other sources to carry
- 20 out its mandate. The commission shall adopt appropriate rules
- 21 not inconsistent with this subpart as may be required to

- 1 administer this subpart. The rules shall be adopted in
- 2 accordance with chapter 91.
- 3 (b) No funds appropriated by the legislature may be used
- 4 to aid a person attending an institution not owned or
- 5 exclusively controlled by the State or a department of the State
- 6 or to pay for any staff work distributing federal or private
- 7 funds to students attending such schools. The maximum amount of
- 8 any grant awarded under the Hawaii state incentive grant program
- 9 shall be equal to the maximum allowed by federal law.
- 10 (c) The commission shall propose and manage a program to
- 11 provide student enrollment incentives, such as scholarships,
- 12 grants, and loans, including specific programs designed to meet
- 13 workforce needs, such as science, technology, engineering, and
- 14 math scholarships or loan forgiveness plans.
- 15 (d) The commission shall have the authority to evaluate
- 16 Hawaii's elementary and secondary public schools, including
- 17 their ability to prepare Hawaii's students for post-secondary
- 18 education.
- 19 (e) The commission shall have the authority to review and
- 20 recommend policies that increase the rate of students pursuing
- 21 post-secondary education."

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- 1 SECTION 5. Section 304A-3154, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
- 2 amended to read as follows:
- 3 "[+]\$304A-3154[+] Cooperation with other state agencies.
- 4 The commission may be assisted by other state agencies,
- 5 including but not limited to the university  $[\tau]$  of Hawaii, the
- 6 department of education, [and] the department of commerce and
- 7 consumer affairs [-], and the department of labor and industrial
- 8 relations."
- 9 SECTION 6. Statutory material to be repealed is bracketed
- 10 and stricken. New statutory material is underscored.
- 11 SECTION 7. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2020;
- 12 provided that the members of the State Post-Secondary Education
- 13 Commission serving on June 30, 2008, shall continue their duties
- 14 until the members of the new commission provided for by this Act
- 15 are appointed.
