A BILL FOR AN ACT

MAKING AN APPROPRIATION FOR LEGAL SERVICES.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1 In its November 2007 report, Achieving Access SECTION 1. 2 to Justice for Hawaii's People, the Access to Justice Hui 3 exposed the compelling and extensive need for legal services in 4 civil matters amongst Hawaii's low-income residents. Each day, 5 these residents grapple with disparate issues, sometimes simultaneously, in civil matters related to affordable housing, 6 7 homelessness, domestic and sexual violence, child custody, elder 8 abuse, public benefits, consumer fraud, and immigration. 9 According to the report, over seventy-seven per cent of Hawaii's 10 low-income community is without access to critical legal 11 services.

12 The legislature finds that while the need for legal 13 services is great, the resources to meet those needs are 14 inadequate. Hawaii's low-income community relies heavily on 15 legal service providers who offer a wide range of legal 16 assistance on civil matters to residents statewide. In 2007 17 alone, legal service providers offered direct legal services in 18 fifteen thousand civil matters involving family law, public 18 HB LRB 08-1313.doc

entitlements, housing, immigration, domestic violence, civil
 rights, health, consumer issues, estate planning, employment,
 and education.

Legal service providers throughout the State have 4 5 demonstrated their commitment to the people of Hawaii. They 6 have also demonstrated their ability to generate funds from a 7 variety of private and federal resources to sustain and create 8 new and innovative services to meet the expanding legal needs of 9 the low-income community. The legislature further finds that 10 access to legal services is essential to a free and democratic 11 society. The State has a responsibility to help fund the provision of legal services so that legal service providers can 12 13 continue to serve the legal needs of the low-income community. 14 The purpose of this Act is to appropriate funds for legal

15 service providers so that they can:

16 (1) Continue to offer a wide range of essential legal
17 services on civil matters to low-income residents at
18 their current levels of operation; and

19 (2) Further develop their capacity to meet the expanding
 20 need for legal services amongst this population.
 21 SECTION 2. There is appropriated out of the general


