## HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

SUPPORTING THE INSTALLATION AND USE OF SMOKE DETECTORS IN EVERY HAWAII HOME BY 2010.

WHEREAS, fire safety in the state and the safety of its 1 citizens are of great concern to every legislator, public 2 servant, and first responder; and 3 4 5 WHEREAS, after prevention, smoke detectors are the first line of defense against fire and can cut nearly in half the risk 6 7 of death in a house fire; and 8 WHEREAS, in recent years, approximately three-fifths of 9 10 house fire deaths occurred in homes without smoke detectors; and 11 WHEREAS, in 2006, a total of 2,580 people died in 412,500 12 house fires that resulted in more than \$11,000,000,000 in 13 14 property damage; and 15 WHEREAS, the Honolulu Fire Department, the 16<sup>th</sup> largest fire 16 department in the nation, responds to over 10,000 fires 17 18 annually; and 19 WHEREAS, with a house fire occurring in this country every 20 86 seconds, the diligence, determination, and devotion of 21 Hawaii's firefighters can be supported by the installation of a 22 smoke detector in every Hawaii home; and 23 24 25 WHEREAS, inexpensive household smoke detectors can mean the difference between life and death by sounding an early warning 26 27 in the event of a fire and alerting people before they are overcome by smoke and other poisonous gases; and 28 29 WHEREAS, most low-income families in Hawaii cannot afford 30 home smoke detectors; and 31



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WHEREAS, low-income families are defined as families 1 qualifying for the State's general assistance program or the 2 federal Aid to Families with Dependent Children program; and 3 4 WHEREAS, low-income families in Hawaii deserve the 5 6 protection that smoke detectors can provide; and 7 8 WHEREAS, Hawaii's senior citizens are also a vulnerable 9 population when it comes to house fires, and sometimes need assistance with installing or maintaining a smoke detector; and 10 11 12 WHEREAS, in states that observe daylight savings time, the day used to convert to daylight savings time is also used to 13 check smoke detector batteries and ensure the safe operation of 14 15 smoke detectors; now, therefore, 16 BE IT RESOLVED by the House of Representatives of the 17 Twenty-fourth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular 18 Session of 2008, the Senate concurring, that the Legislature 19 supports the installation and use of smoke detectors in every 20 Hawaii home by 2010; and 21 22 23 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that fire departments throughout Hawaii are urged to designate April 15 as the day to remind 24 Hawaii's residents to check the batteries in their smoke 25 26 detectors and to make sure they operate effectively; and 27 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Hawaii Fire Chiefs 28 Association and Hawaii State Fire Council are requested to 29 investigate the possibility of donating and distributing smoke 30 detectors to low-income families; and 31 32 33 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that local fire departments are requested to consider implementation of a program to provide 34 free smoke detectors in exchange for a free on-site fire safety 35 inspection of low-income family homes; and 36 37 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Hawaii Public Housing 38 Authority is requested to consider installing smoke detectors in 39 all public housing projects in Hawaii and requiring a working 40 smoke detector as a requirement of residency; and 41



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BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that local fire departments and the Hawaii State Fire Council make every effort to develop an outreach program with senior citizen-focused organizations to educate people about the need for our senior citizens to be safeguarded with a smoke detector properly installed and maintained in their home; and

8 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that Hawaii's fire departments and 9 senior citizen advocate groups and organizations are urged to 10 designate a day during Fire Prevention Week, which occurs ever 11 October, as "Fire Safe Senior Day," for the purpose of educating 12 seniors about the need for these life-saving devices; and 13

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that certified copies of this Concurrent Resolution be transmitted to all county fire chiefs, the Chair of the State Fire Council, Chairperson of the Hawaii Public Housing Authority, Director of the Executive Office on Aging, and President of AARP Hawaii.

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
