HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

REQUESTING THE LEGISLATIVE REFERENCE BUREAU TO STUDY THE ESTABLISHMENT OF A COMPREHENSIVE VOCATIONAL REHABILITATION CENTER FOR DEAF AND HARD OF HEARING INDIVIDUALS.

1 WHEREAS, the State benefits when its residents are productive, contributing members of society; and 2 3 4 WHEREAS, the ability to lead a productive life and contribute to society is often closely related to the pursuit of 5 personal professional goals; and 6 7 8 WHEREAS, the State has an interest in providing consistent 9 vocational rehabilitation services to individuals with disabilities so that they may meet their personal employment 10 potential; and 11 12 WHEREAS, individuals with disabilities that affect their 13 communication skills can face particular challenges when 14 15 entering the workforce; and 16 17 WHEREAS, persons who are deaf or hard of hearing can experience difficulties in communicating, which may be overcome 18 with specialized vocational rehabilitation services, such as the 19 use of American Sign Language and residual hearing amplification 20 techniques; and 21 22 WHEREAS, a significant number of deaf and hard of hearing 23 individuals use American Sign Language as a primary mode of 24 communication; and 25 26 27 WHEREAS, there exists a comprehensive state Department of 28 Human Services vocational rehabilitation program called Ho'opono that provides vocational rehabilitation services for blind and 29 visually impaired individuals; and 30 31



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WHEREAS, a 1996 Legislative Reference Bureau study 1 2 entitled, "Vocational Rehabilitation Services for the Deaf and Hard of Hearing in Hawaii" found that "there is no question that 3 the Department of Human Services is required to provide 4 vocational rehabilitation services to multiple populations, 5 including the deaf or hard of hearing subgroup, " that "the deaf 6 population has not been receiving services on par with the blind 7 population, " and that "the number of services and staff devoted 8 9 to vocational rehabilitation for the deaf group should be 10 substantially greater than at present"; and 11 12 WHEREAS, Gallaudet University reports that, based on Census Bureau data collected in 1994-1995, an estimated 5.56 percent of 13 Hawaii's population aged sixteen or older, or a little over 14 44,000 people, experience difficulty hearing in a normal 15 conversational setting, and 0.47 percent, or 3,719 individuals 16 17 aged sixteen or older cannot hear normal conversation at all; and 18 19 WHEREAS, this estimated population of over 47,700 could 20 benefit from services provided by a comprehensive state facility 21 22 providing their particular community with specialized vocational rehabilitation services; and 23 24 WHEREAS, in state fiscal year 2007, the Department of Human 25 Services Hawaii Vocational Rehabilitation and Services for the 26 27 Blind served 243 deaf and hard of hearing adults, and placed forty-five of these individuals in employment statewide; and 28 29 WHEREAS, the purpose of a comprehensive vocational 30 rehabilitation center for persons who are deaf and hard of 31 hearing would be to provide vocational assessment related to 32 employment interests and capabilities, training related to 33 independent living or adjustment services, including money 34 management, time management, decisionmaking, and basic work 35 skills, and to provide job placement, job coaching, and other 36 necessary services to ensure that individual skills are 37 38 maximized with placement in appropriate job settings; and 39 WHEREAS, services provided through a comprehensive state 40 facility specifically designed for adults who are deaf and hard 41 of hearing will improve client employment options and increase 42 43 the number of job placements; and 44



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1 WHEREAS, there may be centers on deafness in other states that may act as models for the establishment of comparable 2 services in Hawaii; now, therefore, 3 4 BE IT RESOLVED by the House of Representatives of the 5 Twenty-fourth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular 6 7 Session of 2008, the Senate concurring, that the Legislative Reference Bureau is requested to report to the Legislature on 8 establishing a comprehensive center serving deaf and hard of 9 hearing individuals to coordinate and improve their employment 10 options through the Hawaii Vocational Rehabilitation Services 11 for the Blind Division of the Department of Human Services; and 12 13 14 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Legislative Reference Bureau is requested to include research on model centers in 15 other states for persons who are deaf and hard of hearing to 16 17 address the type of services provided to the target population, and make findings and recommendations to: 18 19 20 (1) Suggest services to be delivered by a comprehensive state facility providing vocational rehabilitation 21 services for individuals who are deaf and hard of 22 hearing; 23 24 (2)Roughly estimate the costs of establishing such a 25 center in Hawaii and survey similar start-up and 26 operating costs of centers in other states; 27 28 Consult with agencies familiar with serving the target 29 (3)population, including the Hawaii Vocational 30 Rehabilitation and Services for the Blind Division of 31 the Department of Human Services, the Vocational 32 33 Rehabilitation Deaf and Hard of Hearing Advisory Board, the Disability and Communication Access Board, 34 the Hawaii Center for the Deaf and Blind, the 35 Kapiolani Deaf Center, the Aloha State Association of 36 the Deaf, the Hearing Loss Association of America, 37 38 Ohana Kokua Ano Kuli, Goodwill Industries of Hawaii, and Hawaii Centers for Independent Living; and 39 40 Recommend legislation to establish such a center to (4)41 the Legislature for the Regular Session of 2009; and 42 43



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BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Vocational Rehabilitation and Services for the Blind Division of the Department of Human Services is requested to assist the Legislative Reference Bureau in this study by identifying the potential population of deaf and hard of hearing individuals in Hawaii who may benefit from the services of a comprehensive center; and

8 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Legislative Reference 9 Bureau is requested to submit its findings and recommendations 10 to the Legislature no later than twenty days prior to the 11 convening of the Regular Session of 2009; and 12

13 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that certified copies of this 14 Concurrent Resolution be transmitted to the Director of the Legislative Reference Bureau, the Director of the Hawaii 15 16 Vocational Rehabilitation and Services for the Blind Division of 17 the Department of Human Services, the Chair of the Vocational Rehabilitation Deaf and Hard of Hearing Advisory Board, the 18 19 Executive Director of the Disability and Communication Access Board, the Administrator of the Hawaii Center for the Deaf and 20 Blind, the Director of the Kapiolani Deaf Center, the President 21 22 of the Aloha State Association of the Deaf, the Executive Director of the Hearing Loss Association of America, the 23 Director of Ohana Kokua Ano Kuli, the President of Goodwill 24 25 Industries of Hawaii, and the Executive Director of Hawaii Centers for Independent Living. 26
