

HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

REQUESTING THE OFFICE OF PLANNING TO ESTABLISH A TEMPORARY HAWAII SUSTAINABLE INTERISLAND TRANSPORTATION TASK FORCE.

1 WHEREAS, the Governor, in conjunction with the Hawaii 2 Harbor Users Group and with the support of leadership of the 3 Legislature, recently announced a Harbor Improvements Initiative 4 (Initiative) costing \$842,000,000 over the next six years, and 5 financed by state funds and bonds, to modify and expand 6 facilities to accommodate twenty-five or more years of growth, 7 consumer demand, and changes in user needs; and 8

9 WHEREAS, while the Initiative creates significant opportunities for achieving a more efficient and higher-capacity 10 statewide system of interisland transportation, it also creates 11 significant environmental, cultural, social, and economic 12 impacts that the State must assess, address, mitigate, or avoid 13 14 through a systematic environmental review with identifiable measures to best address, mitigate, or avoid those impacts and 15 to enforce a statewide sustainability permitting scheme; and 16 17

WHEREAS, a strong consensus emerged from the testimony of 18 many members of the Legislature, interisland transportation 19 stakeholders, and the public during the 2007 Special Session on 20 the large capacity interisland ferry issue that much greater 21 attention must be paid to early assessment and mitigation of the 22 adverse environmental, cultural, economic, and social impacts of 23 our State's changing and growing interisland transportation 24 systems, as well as to achieving higher and equitable standards 25 in operating conditions among various interisland transportation 26 27 modes; and

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WHEREAS, the Polynesian people arrived in the Hawaiian
Islands more than 2,000 years ago by canoe, with sophisticated
navigation techniques, and developed a sustainable life both on
and among the islands, offering a cultural history that provides

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guidance to modern residents of Hawaii on how to achieve a 1 sustainable interisland transportation system; and 2 3 WHEREAS, Hawaii is unique among the United States (U.S.) as 4 the only all-island state, necessitating interisland 5 transportation by air or water, and is more than 2,500 hundred 6 7 miles from the U.S. mainland and Asia, creating critical issues 8 of dependence on air and water transportation systems; and 9 WHEREAS, the State needs a robust, environmentally 10 sustainable, efficient, diverse, secure, and affordable system 11 of interisland transportation to meet both public and private 12 needs of its businesses, residents, and visitors; and 13 14 15 WHEREAS, the proposed Initiative, the large capacity interisland ferry controversy, concerns about cruise ship 16 pollution, volatility in interisland airline services, and 17 increasing attention to carbon emission and impacts of 18 19 transportation systems on global warming demonstrate the need 20 for a comprehensive review and integrated regulation of all methods, existing and proposed, of interisland transportation to 21 22 ensure fair but coordinated regulation of the various modes and 23 operators so that short-term, long-term, cumulative, and secondary impacts are considered prior to commitments to major 24 expansion or modifications of such systems; and 25 26 27 WHEREAS, the proposed Initiative should undergo a programmatic environmental review prior to preferred 28 29 alternatives for site-specific projects being selected; and 30 31 WHEREAS, in the transportation context, the scope of the current environmental review process should be broadened to 32 include sustainability--the so-called "triple bottom line" of 33 environment, economy, and social needs; and 34 35 WHEREAS, a current weakness in the environmental review 36 process under Chapter 343, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is that it 37 does not ensure that appropriate mitigation measures to reduce 38 adverse impacts are incorporated into enforceable operating or 39 pollution control permits, nor has it consistently been applied 40 by state agencies who are considering projects such as harbor 41 42 improvements that will facilitate major interisland 43 transportation projects; and



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WHEREAS, the work and report of the 25-member Hawaii 2050 1 Task Force (Act 8, Special Session Laws of Hawaii 2005) provided 2 valuable expertise and stakeholder input on the importance of 3 achieving a more sustainable future for our State, which must 4 now be implemented and put into action to make a meaningful 5 difference for future generations who inherit the impact of the 6 7 decisions that we make today for these islands; and 8 9 WHEREAS, given all of these considerations, the State must seize this unique opportunity to focus public attention and 10 expertise on planning for and achieving a sustainable state 11 12 interisland transportation system; now, therefore, 13 14 BE IT RESOLVED by the House of Representatives of the 15 Twenty-fourth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 2008, the Senate concurring, that the Office of 16 Planning is requested to establish a temporary Hawaii 17 Sustainable Interisland Transportation Task Force (Task Force); 18 and 19 20 21 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Task Force be composed of 22 20 members, as follows: 23 One member of the Senate, to be selected by the 24 (1)President of the Senate; 25 26 (2) One member of the House of Representatives, to be 27 28 selected by the Speaker of the House of 29 Representatives; 30 (3) The Director of the Office of Planning or the 31 Director's designee; 32 33 The Chairperson of the Board of Land and Natural 34 (4)35 Resources or the Chairperson's designee; 36 (5) The Chairperson of the Board of Agriculture or the 37 Chairperson's designee; 38 39 (6)The Director of Transportation or the Director's 40 designee; 41 42 A representative of the Office of Hawaiian Affairs, to (7)43 44 be designated by the Office of Hawaiian Affairs;



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Three representatives of the Hawaii Harbor Users 2 (8) 3 Group, to be designated by the Hawaii Harbor Users Group, including one representative each from the 4 5 cruise line, ferry, and cargo industries; provided that the representatives of the Hawaii Harbor Users 6 7 group shall not participate in the Task Force for the air transportation report; 8 9 10 (9) Three air transportation representatives from the three largest interisland carriers, with one 11 representative to be selected by the President of the 12 Senate, one representative to be selected by the 13 Speaker of the House of Representatives, and one 14 15 representative to be selected by the Governor; provided that the air transportation representatives 16 shall not participate in the Task Force for the water 17 18 transportation report; 19 (10)Three representatives of the environmental community 20 that represent major environmental organizations, with 21 one representative to be selected by the President of 22 the Senate, one representative to be selected by the 23 Speaker of the House of Representatives, and one 24 representative to be selected by the Governor; and 25 26 Four representatives of the Hawaii 2050 Task Force, 27 (11)with expertise and interest in sustainable planning, 28 to be designated by the Chairperson of the Hawaii 2050 29 Task Force: 30 31 32 and 33 34 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that each of the foregoing entities are requested to submit the name of their designated 35 representative and an alternate to the Office of Planning no 36 37 later than August 15, 2008; and 38 39 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Task Force is requested to: 40 Study the environmental, economic, and social impacts 41 (1)42 of existing state interisland transportation systems; 43

36 37 38 39 40	(2)	Protecting local diversified agriculture, native ecosystems, and public health from the adverse effects of invasive and alien species that can be introduced, spread, and facilitated by interisland transportation;
40 41 42 43 44	(3)	Mitigating and minimizing the traffic and pedestrian impacts on all islands from the off-loading and on-loading of vehicles and cargo, including visitors using rental cars, from interisland transportation;

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preparing the report, as well as the resources of the Office of 1 Planning; and 2 3 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Office of Planning is 4 5 requested to: 6 Conduct informational briefings on each of the 7 (1)Neighbor Islands, as well as Oahu, on each draft 8 9 report; 10 11 (2) Actively solicit comments from the public, fully record the proceedings, and incorporate the comments 12 into the each final report; and 13 14 Maintain publicly accessible records of the Task Force 15 (3) meetings and public briefings; 16 17 18 and 19 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Office of Planning is 20 requested to submit a report of findings, recommendations, and 21 proposed legislation to the Legislature and Governor no later 22 than 20 days prior to the convening of the Regular Session of 23 2010, and submit further recommendations to the Legislature: 24 25 On water transportation no later than September 31, 26 (1)27 2010; and 28 29 (2)On air transportation no later than September 31, 30 2012; 31 and 32 33 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that certified copies of this 34 Concurrent Resolution be transmitted to the Governor, Director 35 of the Office of Planning, Chairperson of the Board of Land and 36 Natural Resources, Chairperson of the Board of Agriculture, 37 Director of Transportation, Office of Hawaiian Affairs, the 38 Hawaii Harbor Users Group, and Chairperson of the Hawaii 2050 39 Task Force. 40
