## HOUSE RESOLUTION

RECOGNIZING 2008 AS THE YEAR OF THE PANIOLO.

1 WHEREAS, in 1792, Captain George Vancouver gave King
2 Kamehameha I a gift of cattle, and under Captain Vancouver's
3 advice, King Kamehameha I placed a ten-year kapu over the cattle
4 so that they might multiply in peace; and
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6 WHEREAS, the kapu on the cattle accomplished more than its 7 desired effect as the cattle multiplied beyond control, and in 8 1803, horses were introduced to the Hawaiian Islands by Richard 9 Clevedon as a gift to the nation; and

WHEREAS, by 1820, the cattle industry was becoming a valuable industry to the Hawaiian Islands, and to help facilitate its growth, King Kamehameha III brought in a group of Mexican men from Vera Cruz, to the Big Island roughly around 1830, who became the first paniolo or cowboys in the Hawaiian Kingdom; and

18 WHEREAS, with the arrival of the paniolo, came the growth 19 of a new industry leading to the development of some of the 20 world's finest ranches and significant contributions to the 21 Hawaiian culture; and

WHEREAS, Hawaii was introduced to new ways of practicing water and land conservation, elements of indigenous, cultural, and Western medicine were brought in, and advances in veterinarian care, botanical surveys, and agronomical improvements can be credited to the paniolo; and 28

29 WHEREAS, with the knowledge and the skills of the first 30 paniolo, the cattle ranches of Hawaii were able to expand and 31 grow, and their skills were quickly learned by the Hawaiian 32 people; and for over a century, Hawaii was a major exporter of



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cattle to places such as California, other destinations in the 1 Americas, and around the Pacific Rim; and 2 3 4 WHEREAS, the skills and talents of Hawaii's paniolo were clearly on display at the 1908 World Rodeo Championships in 5 Cheyenne, Wyoming, when three paniolo from Hawaii placed in the 6 top six at the championships, with Ikua Purdy, arguably Hawaii's 7 most famous paniolo, taking first place and winning the event on 8 a horse he had to borrow; and 9 10 WHEREAS, the skills and the efforts of these early paniolo 11 12 led to the establishment of some of the world's most famous ranches, such as Parker Ranch on the Big Island, Ulupalakua 13 Ranch on Maui, Kahuku Ranch on Oahu, and Molokai Ranch; and 14 15 WHEREAS, the paniolo played a large role in the development 16 of Hawaii: bringing new language and customs, connecting with 17 and becoming a part of the local Hawaiian culture, and greatly 18 influencing the popularity of the slack key guitar and the 19 20 ukulele, two of Hawaii's most symbolic musical instruments; and 21 22 WHEREAS, an extremely significant cultural contribution of the paniolo is their influence on the preservation of the 23 24 Hawaiian language, since paniolo are one of the few groups who 25 actively speak the Hawaiian language and are viewed as "keepers 26 m of the language"; and 27 WHEREAS, each new generation brought into the paniolo way 28 of life and taught the lessons and skills of the previous 29 generation, a richer and stronger tradition will emerge, as new 30 elements are added to the traditions of the paniolo; and 31 32 33 WHEREAS, with the help of organizations such as the Hawaii High School Rodeo Association and the Paniolo Preservation 34 Society that provide opportunities for both boys and girls at an 35 extremely early age, the future of the paniolo community in the 36 37 State looks bright; and 38 WHEREAS, the impact that paniolo have had in all aspects of 39 life in Hawaii is far-reaching, and the people of Hawaii owe a 40 41 great deal to the contributions of the paniolo; and 42



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WHEREAS, on November 7, 2007, the Governor joined the 1 Lieutenant Governor in proclaiming 2008 as the "Year of the 2 Paniolo"; and 3 4 WHEREAS, the Paniolo Preservation Society is celebrating 5 2008 as the Year of the Paniolo by sponsoring the Great Waiomina 6 Centennial Celebration to honor generations of paniolo as 7 stewards of the land and perpetuators of the Hawaiian culture 8 and all things "cowboy" with rodeos, concerts, rides, barbecues, 9 and parades throughout the year and throughout the State; and 10 11 WHEREAS, while the combined efforts of all paniolo is 12 celebrated, a distinguished group of five men deserve special 13 recognition for their leadership, integrity, and contributions 14 to the paniolo community: Abraham Akau, Eddie Taniquchi, Jr., 15 Kimo Ho'opai, Jr., Merton Kekiwi, and Morrency Dudoit; and 16 17 WHEREAS, carrying on the rich tradition of the paniolo is 18 an important responsibility for the next generation, five young 19 adults have already shown that they have the skills to take up 20 the reigns: Levi Rita, Cheyenne Gaspar, Kristyn-Lee 21 Vasconcelles, Cole Hendrickson, and Chevanne Keliihoomalu; now, 22 therefore, 23 24 BE IT RESOLVED by the House of Representatives of the 25 Twenty-fourth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular 26 Session of 2008, that this body recognizes and honors the 27 paniolo, as the year 2008 has been proclaimed "The Year of the 28 Paniolo", so that we may commemorate their contributions to the 29 State, and most importantly, educate the citizens of Hawaii on 30 the history of the paniolo; and 31 32 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that certified copies of this 33 Resolution be transmitted to the Governor, the Lieutenant 34 Governor, the Speaker of the House of Representatives, the 35 Chairperson of the Board of Land and Natural Resources, the 36 Director of the Office of Hawaiian Affairs, and the Paniolo 37 Preservation Society. 38 39 40 OFFERED BY: Cincly Evans 41



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
