HOUSE RESOLUTION

SUPPORTING CONGRESSIONAL ACTION TO EXEMPT THE STATE OF HAWAII FROM FEDERAL PREEMPTION PROHIBITING STATE INSPECTION OF PLANTS, PLANT PRODUCTS, AND OTHER BIOLOGICAL ORGANISMS.

1	WHEREAS, invasive species are a major problem on all
2	islands of Hawaii; and
3	
4	WHEREAS, Act 85, Session Laws of Hawaii 2003, which created
5	the Hawaii Invasive Species Council indicates that invasive
6	species cause "millions of dollars in crop losses, the
7	extinction of native species, the destruction of native forests,
8	and the spread of disease"; and

10	WHEREAS, in addition, the State expends a significant
11	amount of funds to eradicate invasive species, such as the coqui
12	frog, Australian treefern, miconia, and varroa mite; and
13	, , ,
14	WHEREAS, to prevent the exacerbation of the invasive
15	species problem, state inspection programs should be enhanced to
16	prevent new invasive species from entering Hawaii's borders; and
17	
18	WHEREAS, the State's ability to establish an inspection
19	program for imported foreign plants and products, however, is
20	hampered by a federal preemption provision in the Plant
21	Protection Act of 2000, Public Law 106-224 that states:
22	
23	No State or political subdivision of a State may
24	regulate in foreign commerce any article, means of
25	conveyance, plant, biological control organism, plant
26	pest, noxious weed, or plant product in order
27	
28	(1) to control a plant pest or noxious weed;
29	
30	(2) to eradicate a plant pest or noxious weed; or
31	
32	(3) prevent the introduction or dissemination of a
33	biological control organism, plant pest, or
34	noxious weed; and

1 WHEREAS, the Legislature finds that, based on this 2 preemption provision, the United States Department of Homeland 3 Security refuses to notify the state Department of Agriculture 4 when foreign shipments of plants that may carry invasive species 5 enters Hawaii's borders; and 6 7 8 WHEREAS, the Legislature further finds that the United States Department of Homeland Security's uncooperativeness 9 greatly hinders the state Department of Agriculture's ability to 10 inspect taro coming from the South Pacific islands and other 11 12 foreign locations; and 13 WHEREAS, foreign taro may contain diseases and beetles that 14 15 could be extremely detrimental to the plant itself; and 16 17 WHEREAS, Hawaii's congressional delegation is aware of the federal preemption problem and is working toward a resolution 18 that would enable the state Department of Agriculture to conduct 19 20 necessary inspections; now, therefore, 21 BE IT RESOLVED by the House of Representatives of the 22 23 Twenty-fourth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular 24 Session of 2008, that this body supports congressional action to exempt the State of Hawaii from federal preemption prohibiting 25 26 state inspection of plants, plant products, and other biological organisms; and 27 28 29 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that certified copies of this Resolution be transmitted to the members of Hawaii's 30 31 congressional delegation, the United States Secretary of Agriculture, the United States Secretary of Homeland Security, 32 33 and the Chairperson of the state Board of Agriculture. 34 35 36 OFFERED BY: Hummon K:rk caldwel
