A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO EDUCATION.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1	SECTION 1. The legislature finds that the recruitment and
2	retention of high-quality teachers are fundamental components of
3	a high-quality education system for Hawaii's children. Act 51,
4	Session Laws of Hawaii 2004, notes that other than home and
5	societal factors, teacher quality is the single most influential
6	factor in student achievement. While the State hires over one
7	thousand three hundred new teachers each year, the University of
8	Hawaii graduates only four hundred to four hundred fifty
9	teachers per year.
0	At Waianae high school, there are approximately one hundred

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11 fifty teachers serving the needs of two thousand students, the

12 majority of whom are native Hawaiians and are living at or below

13 the poverty level. Currently, only fifty-six per cent of

14 teachers at Waianae high school are fully licensed.

Additionally, Waianae high school and all but one of its 15

16 elementary and intermediate feeder schools are being

17 restructured due to failures in student learning. 1

school has led to the awarding of a multi-year federal native 2 3 Hawaiian education program grant that provides resources to design a model for Waianae high school. Waianae high school and 4 5 the Waianae High School Alumni Association are the program grant recipients. The new human resource management model will allow 6 the school to achieve a significantly greater level of fully 7 licensed teachers. 8 9 The purpose of this Act is to appropriate funds to a pilot project that implements a new human resource management model 10 for Waianae high school and its elementary and intermediate 11 12 feeder schools. The funds would complement the federal grant 13 funds and allow for the extension of the recruitment, induction, 14 and mentoring model to elementary, middle, and high school 15 students. SECTION 2. The Waianae complex schools shall submit to the 16

13	same sum, or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year		
14	2008-2009, for the implementation of a new human resource		
15	management model for the Waianae complex schools, including		
16	Waianae high school and its elementary and intermediate feeder		
17	schools.		
18	The	sums appropriated shall be expended by the department	
19	of education for the purposes of this Act.		
20	SECTION 4. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2020, and		
21	shall be	repealed on July 1, 2023.
