## A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO CHILD ABANDONMENT.

## BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1	SECTION 1. Chapter 709, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
2	amended by adding a new section to be appropriately designated
3	and to read as follows:
4	"§709- Abandonment of a child in the second degree. (1)
5	A person commits the offense of abandonment of a child in the
6	second degree if, being a parent, guardian, or other person
7	legally charged with the care or custody of a child less than
8	fourteen years old, the person leaves the child with another
9	person in reckless disregard of the risk that:
10	(a) Proof of the other person's existence cannot be
11	confirmed or validated through records such as a birth
12	certificate, school diploma, court documents,
13	employment applications, social security records, or
14	documents proving next of kin; or
15	(b) The other person cannot be located or found.
16	(2) Leaving a newborn child at a hospital, fire station,
17	or police station or with emergency services personnel pursuant

- to section 587D-2 shall not constitute a violation of this 1
- 2 section.
- 3 (3) Abandonment of a child in the second degree is a
- 4 misdemeanor."
- SECTION 2. Section 709-902, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is 5
- amended follows: 6
- 7 1. By amending its title and subsection (1) to read:
- "§709-902 Abandonment of a child[-] in the first degree. 8
- A person commits the offense of abandonment of a child in 9
- the first degree if, being a parent, guardian, or other person 10
- legally charged with the care or custody of a child less than 11
- fourteen years old, the person deserts the child in any place 12
- with intent to abandon it." 13
- 2. By amending subsection (3) to read: 14
- "(3) Abandonment of a child [is a misdemeanor.] in the 15
- first degree is a class C felony." 16
- SECTION 3. This Act does not affect rights and duties that 17
- matured, penalties that were incurred, and proceedings that were 18
- 19 begun, before its effective date.
- SECTION 4. Statutory material to be repealed is bracketed 20
- and stricken. New statutory material is underscored. 21
- SECTION 5. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2050. 22

Child Abandonment

## Description:

Increases child abandonment to a class C felony and renames the offense to child abandonment in the first degree. Establishes the offense of child abandonment in the second degree and makes it a misdemeanor to abandon a child by leaving the child with a person in reckless disregard of the risk that the person's existence cannot be confirmed or the person cannot be found. Effective 7/1/2050. (SB2886 HD1)
