# A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO BIODIESEL.

### BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1	SECTION 1. Chapter 171, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
2	amended by adding a new subpart to part III to be appropriately
3	designated and to read as follows:
4	" . CROPS USED IN THE PRODUCTION OF BIODIESEL FUEL
5	§171- Definitions. As used in this subpart:
6	"Biodiesel" means a vegetable oil-based fuel that meets
7	ASTM International Standard D6751, "Standard Specification for
8	Biodiesel Fuel (B100) Blend Stock for Distillate Fuels," as
9	amended.
10	"Eligible lessee" means a person who is:
11	(1) Engaged or proposing to engage in an agricultural use
12	by growing qualified crops; and
13	(2) Qualified to lease public lands under this chapter.
14	"Qualified crops" means those agricultural crops having
15	vegetable oil content that is suitable for bioconversion into
16	biodiesel fuel, including soy, corn, bean, nut, olive, canola,

sunflower, and other such crops and the seeds thereof.

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1	§171·	- Lease of agricultural lands for crops used in the
2	production	n of biodiesel fuel. The board may lease, by direct
3	negotiatio	on and without recourse to public auction, public
4	agricultu	ral lands to eligible lessees; provided that:
5	(1)	The terms of the lease entered into between the board
6		and an eligible lessee shall incorporate appropriate
7		restrictions on the use of the land, ensuring that the
8		land is used for agricultural purposes and that
9		qualified crops are grown; provided that nothing in
10		this subpart shall affect an eligible lessee's use of
11		the land for personal residence purposes, if allowed
12		by relevant land use laws; and
13	(2)	The qualified crops grown on the leased public lands
14		shall be sold, exchanged, bartered, traded, or
15		otherwise transferred in exchange for consideration to
16		oil seed processing facilities, biodiesel producers,
17		or the department of agriculture under the energy
18		feedstock program in section 141-9."
19	SECT	ION 2. Section 103D-1012, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
20	amended by	y amending subsection (a) to read as follows:
21	<b>"</b> (a)	Notwithstanding any other law to the contrary,
22	contracts	for the purchase of diesel fuel or boiler fuel shall
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- 1 be awarded to the lowest responsible and responsive bidders,
- 2 with preference given to bids for biofuels or blends of biofuel
- 3 and petroleum fuel [-]; provided that where the fuel is for use
- 4 in state vehicles with diesel engines, preference shall be given
- 5 to biodiesel blends that contain up to twenty per cent biodiesel
- 6 that is produced in the state from feedstock grown in the
- 7 state."
- 8 SECTION 3. Chapter 141, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
- 9 amended as follows:
- 10 1. By designating sections 141-1 to 141-8 as part I and
- 11 adding a title before section 141-1 to read:
- 12 "PART I. GENERAL PROVISIONS"
- 13 2. By designating section 141-9 as part II and adding a
- 14 title before section 141-9 to read:
- 15 "PART II. ENERGY FEEDSTOCK PROGRAM"
- 16 SECTION 4. Section 141-9, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
- 17 amended to read as follows:
- 18 "[+] \$141-9[+] Energy feedstock program. (a) There is
- 19 established within the department of agriculture an energy
- 20 feedstock program that shall:
- 21 (1) Maintain cognizance of actions taken by industry and
- by federal, state, county, and private agencies in

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1		activities relating to the production of energy
2		feedstock, and promote and support worthwhile energy
3		feedstock production activities in the [State;
4	(2)	Serve as an information clearinghouse for energy
5		feedstock production activities;
6	(3)	Coordinate development projects to investigate and
7		solve biological and technical problems involved in
8		raising selected species with commercial energy
9		generating potential;
10	(4)	Actively seek federal funding for energy feedstock
11		production activities;
12	(5)	Undertake activities required to develop and expand
13		the energy feedstock production industry; and
14	(6)	Perform other functions and activities as may be
15		assigned by law, including monitoring [the] compliance
16		with the provisions [under] of section 205-4.5(a)(15).
17	(b) '	The energy feedstock program shall support, promote,
18	and stimu	late the development of a market for biodiesel
19	feedstock	crops grown in the state by:
20	(1)	Purchasing biodiesel feedstock crops grown in the
21		state that are offered by biodiesel feedstock
22		producers at a price of up to 15 cents per pound above

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1		cost until December 31, 2018; provided that the total
2		amount expended shall not exceed an aggregate total of
3		<pre>\$ per fiscal year;</pre>
4	(2)	Purchasing biodiesel fuel and biodiesel fuel blends
5		that are produced in the state using feedstock grown
6		in the state and offered by fuel producers at a fair
7		and reasonable purchase price that shall take into
8		consideration the expenses incurred by and profit
9		margin of the producer; provided that the total amount
10		expended shall not exceed an aggregate total of \$
11		per fiscal year; and
12	(3)	Determining the disposition of the biodiesel feedstock
13		crop and biodiesel fuel and biodiesel fuel blends
14		purchased under this program.
15	[ <del>(b)</del> ]	(c) The chairperson of the board of agriculture shall
16	consult a	nd coordinate with the energy resources coordinator
17	under cha	pter 196 to establish milestones and objectives for the
18	productio	n of energy feedstock that is grown in the [State.]
19	state. T	he chairperson and the coordinator shall report the
20	State's p	rogress toward meeting such milestones and objectives
21	annually	to the legislature[ $_{ullet}$ ] at least twenty days prior to the
22	convening	of each regular session. The report shall include:
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1	<u>(1)</u>	The amount of biodiesel feedstock crops purchased
2		under the energy feedstock program and the dollar
3		amount expended;
4	(2)	The amount of biodiesel fuel and biodiesel fuel blends
5		purchased under the energy feedstock program and the
6		dollar amount expended; and
7	(3)	The disposition of the feedstock crops and biodiesel
8		fuel and biodiesel fuel blends purchased under the
9		energy feedstock program.
10	[ <del>(c)</del> ]	(d) The chairperson of the board of agriculture shall
11	also cons	ult and coordinate with research programs and
12	activitie	s at the University of Hawaii that will assist in the
13	further g	rowth and promotion of the energy feedstock production
14	industry	in Hawaii.
15	[ <del>(d)</del> ]	(e) The chairperson of the board of agriculture may
16	employ te	mporary staff exempt from chapters 76 and 89. The
17	board may	adopt rules pursuant to chapter 91 to effectuate the
18	purposes	of this section.
19	<u>(f)</u>	As used in this section, "biodiesel" means a vegetable
20	oil-based	fuel that meets ASTM International Standard D6751,
21	"Standard	Specification for Biodiesel Fuel (B100) Blend Stock
22	for Disti	llate Fuels," as amended."

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1	SECT	ION 5. Section 235-7, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
2	amended by	y amending subsection (a) to read as follows:
3	"(a)	There shall be excluded from gross income, adjusted
4	gross inco	ome, and taxable income:
5	(1)	Income not subject to taxation by the State under the
6		Constitution and laws of the United States;
7	(2)	Rights, benefits, and other income exempted from
8		taxation by section 88-91, having to do with the state
9		retirement system, and the rights, benefits, and other
10		income, comparable to the rights, benefits, and other
11		income exempted by section 88-91, under any other
12		<pre>public retirement system;</pre>
13	(3)	Any compensation received in the form of a pension for
14		past services;
15	(4)	Compensation paid to a patient affected with Hansen's
16		disease employed by the State or the United States in
17		any hospital, settlement, or place for the treatment
18		of Hansen's disease;
19	(5)	Except as otherwise expressly provided, payments made
20		by the United States or this State, under an act of
21		Congress or a law of this State, which by express

provision or administrative regulation or

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1		interpretation are exempt from both the normal and
2		surtaxes of the United States, even though not so
3		exempted by the Internal Revenue Code itself;
4	(6)	Any income expressly exempted or excluded from the
5		measure of the tax imposed by this chapter by any
6		other law of the State, it being the intent of this
7		chapter not to repeal or supersede any express
8		exemption or exclusion;
9	(7)	Income received by each member of the reserve
10		components of the Army, Navy, Air Force, Marine Corps,
11		or Coast Guard of the United States of America, and
12		the Hawaii national guard as compensation for
13		performance of duty, equivalent to pay received for
14		forty-eight drills (equivalent of twelve weekends) and
15		fifteen days of annual duty, at an:
16		(A) E-1 pay grade after eight years of service;
17		provided that this subparagraph shall apply to
18		taxable years beginning after December 31, 2004;
19		(B) E-2 pay grade after eight years of service;
20		provided that this subparagraph shall apply to
21		taxable years beginning after December 31, 2005;

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2			provided that this subparagraph shall apply to
3			taxable years beginning after December 31, 2006;
4		(D)	E-4 pay grade after eight years of service;
5			provided that this subparagraph shall apply to
6			taxable years beginning after December 31, 2007;
7			and
8		(E)	E-5 pay grade after eight years of service;
9			provided that this subparagraph shall apply to
10			taxable years beginning after December 31, 2008;
11	(8)	Inco	me derived from the operation of ships or aircraft
12		if t	he income is exempt under the Internal Revenue
13		Code	pursuant to the provisions of an income tax
14		trea	ty or agreement entered into by and between the
15		Unit	ed States and a foreign country; provided that the
16		tax	laws of the local governments of that country
17		reci	procally exempt from the application of all of
18		thei	r net income taxes, the income derived from the
19		oper	ation of ships or aircraft that are documented or
20		regi	stered under the laws of the United States;

(C) E-3 pay grade after eight years of service;

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1	(9)	The value of legal services provided by a prepaid
2		legal service plan to a taxpayer, the taxpayer's
3		spouse, and the taxpayer's dependents;
4	(10)	Amounts paid, directly or indirectly, by a prepaid
. 5		legal service plan to a taxpayer as payment or
6		reimbursement for the provision of legal services to
7		the taxpayer, the taxpayer's spouse, and the
8		taxpayer's dependents;
9	(11)	Contributions by an employer to a prepaid legal
10		service plan for compensation (through insurance or
11		otherwise) to the employer's employees for the costs
12		of legal services incurred by the employer's
13		employees, their spouses, and their dependents;
14	(12)	Amounts received in the form of a monthly surcharge by
15		a utility acting on behalf of an affected utility
16		under section 269-16.3 shall not be gross income,
17		adjusted gross income, or taxable income for the
18		acting utility under this chapter. Any amounts
19		retained by the acting utility for collection or other
20		costs shall not be included in this exemption; [and]
21.	(13)	One hundred per cent of the gain realized by a fee
22		simple owner from the sale of a leased fee interest ir

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1	units within a condominium project, cooperative
2	project, or planned unit development to the
3	association of apartment owners or the residential
4	cooperative corporation of the leasehold units.
5	For purposes of this paragraph:
6	["Fee simple owner" shall have the same meaning
7	as provided under section 516-1; provided that it
8	shall include legal and equitable owners;
9	"Legal and equitable owner", and "leased fee
10	interest" shall have the same meanings as provided
11	under section 516-1; and]
12	"Condominium project" and "cooperative project"
13	shall have the same meanings as provided under section
14	514C-1[+].
15	"Fee simple owner" shall have the same meaning as
16	provided under section 516-1; provided that it shall
17	include legal and equitable owners.
18	"Legal and equitable owner" and "leased fee
19	interest" shall have the same meanings as provided
20	under section 516-1;
21	and

1	(14)	One hundred per cent of income derived from the
2		operation of an oil seed crushing facility that
3		processes oil seed produced or grown in the state for
4		biodiesel production in the state.
5		As used in this paragraph:
6		"Biodiesel" means a vegetable oil-based fuel that
7		meets ASTM International Standard D6751, "Standard
8		Specification for Biodiesel Fuel (B100) Blend Stock
9		for Distillate Fuels," as amended.
10		"Biodiesel production facility" means a facility
11		that processes feedstock to produce biodiesel.
12		"Feedstock" means the form of biomass as it is
13		processed in an oil seed crushing facility.
14		"Oil seed crushing facility" means a facility
15		that processes oil seed that is grown in the state,
16		including soy, corn, bean, nut, olive, canola,
17		mustard, and sunflower and other such crops and the
18		seeds thereof, to be used as biomass to produce
19		biodiesel."

- 1 SECTION 7. This Act shall take effect on January 1, 2020;
- 2 provided that the amendments made to section 235-7(a), Hawaii
- 3 Revised Statutes, by section 5 of this Act, shall not be
- 4 repealed when that section is repealed and reenacted on January
- 5 1, 2013, pursuant to section 3 of Act 166, Session Laws of
- 6 Hawaii 2007.

## Report Title:

Biodiesel; Market Stimulation

### Description:

Provides various market stimulation incentives for the development of biodiesel, including making state agricultural lands available for biodiesel fuel crops; establishing a state biodiesel feedstock crop and biodiesel fuel purchasing program; and creating tax exclusions for oil seed crushing facilities. (SB3215 HD1)
