# A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO LONG TERM CARE.

### BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1 SECTION 1. While virtually all of Hawaii's elders want	ll of Hawaii's elders want to	ll of	virtually	While	N 1.	SECTION	1
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- 2 age-in-place at home rather than in a care home or institution,
- 3 many elders will require a more intensive caregiving environment
- 4 at the end of their lives. However, the costs of institutional
- 5 care have escalated beyond the financial means of most elders.
- 6 The State's portion of medicaid expenditures has increased
- 7 steadily over the years and is projected to increase
- 8 significantly as baby boomers begin to retire. As Hawaii's
- 9 population ages, the number of frail and disabled individuals
- 10 will also increase, placing a precipitous demand on the need for
- 11 long-term care services.
- 12 The legislature finds that an array of services are
- 13 necessary to meet the long-term care needs of Hawaii's elders.
- 14 To make this possible, the following shall be the long-term care
- 15 policy goals of the State of Hawaii:
- 16 (1) Creating a continuum of care, up to and including the
- end of life;

3	(3)	Strengthening family caregiver support systems to
4		encourage aging-in-place;
5	(4)	Stimulating manpower development and training programs
6		to expand the capacity of long-term care service
7		providers;
8	(5)	Developing financial mechanisms to help Hawaii's
9		families meet the cost of long-term care;
10	(6)	Seeking ways to create a better balance between public
11		expenditures for institutional care and home- and
12		community-based care;
13	(7)	Fostering public understanding of caregiving issues;
14		and
15	(8)	Encouraging research and education on aging, long-term
16		care, and related subjects through the University of
17		Hawaii system.

1 The purpose of this Act is to establish a long-term care 2 commission to research what resources are necessary to meet 3 state long-term care public policy goals and to recommend a 4 program and funding mechanism that may provide long-term care 5 services. 6 SECTION 2. (a) There is established a long-term care 7 commission, which shall: 8 (1)Identify problems with current long-term care 9 capacity, programs and services; and 10 Develop a comprehensive plan that, when implemented, 11 will ensure the availability of a full continuum of 12 institutional and community-based services, including support 13 for family caregivers. The commission shall also research 14 public and private financing options and develop a second plan 15 that details what financial resources, or mix of public and 16 private financing, are necessary to address needed state long-17 term care reforms, as well as state public policy goals and 18 services. 19 The long-term care commission shall consist of: (b) Five members appointed by the governor; 20 (1) 21 Five members appointed by the president of the senate;

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1	(3) Five members appointed by the speaker of the house of
2	representatives;
3	provided that all of the members shall be selected on the basis
4	of their knowledge, interest, and experience in the following:
5	research, policy development, and advocacy and service delivery
6	relating to seniors or those with disabilities. Given the scop
7	of the issues and activities to be considered by the commission
8	members shall also have expertise in business, economics,
9	finance, and management, especially as they pertain to health
10	care, long-term care, and social services. All of the members
11	shall serve for two-year terms beginning on December 1, 2008,
12	and ending on November 30, 2010.
13	(c) The commission shall elect from among its members a
14	chairperson, who shall commence commission meetings, and a vice
15	chairperson and shall adopt rules for the conduct of its work.
16	(d) The long-term care commission shall:
17	(1) Ensure that addressing the needs of the consumer is
18	the paramount concern of policy development;
19	(2) Review available research, studies, and previously
20	proposed programs relating to the financing and
21	provision of a full continuum of long-term care

services;

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1	(3)	Esta	blish a set of policy goals and principles, to be
2		prop	oosed for enactment as statutory provisions, to
3		guid	le the work of the long-term care commission and
4		the	development of policy related to long-term care
5		fina	ncing and service delivery. In creating these
6		poli	cies and development of the plan to reform long-
7		term	care services, the commission shall include the
8		foll	owing critical elements:
9		(A)	Creating a full continuum of care infrastructure,
10			including different forms of institutional,
11			community-based, and home-care programs and
12			services, up to and including the end of life;
13		(B)	Ensuring that all consumers needing and using
14			long-term care services of any kind can easily
15			access such services;
16		(C)	Providing consumers with timely access to
17			comprehensive information, including information
18			about cost and quality and about financing and
19			service delivery options;
20		(D)	Ensuring that health, long-term care, and social
21			services are connected through the use of timely,
22	e		standardized assessments, care planning,

1		coordination, and case management. Special
2		attention shall be given to pre-admission
3		assessment and screening for those who need
4		institutional services, smooth transitions
5		between the current health and long-term care
6		service systems, and between institutional
7		services and the community- or home-care
8		services;
9	(E)	Improving the use of technology to enable the
10		tracking of patients across various care
11		settings;
12	(F)	Strengthening informal family caregiver support
13		systems to encourage aging-in-place;
14	(G)	Stimulating manpower development and training
15		programs to expand the capacity of long-term care
16		service providers;
17	(H)	Developing additional public and private
18		financial mechanisms to help Hawaii's families
19		and to conserve limited state resources to meet
20		the costs of long-term care;
21	(I)	Seeking ways to create a real balance between
22		public expenditures for institutional care, care

1		provided in community settings, as well as care
2		in the home, based on the needs and preferences
3		of those who use such services;
4		(J) Fostering public understanding of the risk of
5		needing long-term care services, the cost of
6		various levels and kinds of care, and caregiving
7		issues; and
8		(K) Encouraging research and education on aging,
9		long-term care, and related subjects through the
10		University of Hawaii system;
11	(4)	Prepare a five-year plan to accomplish the goals,
12		including the recommendation of benchmarks to evaluate
13		accomplishments for each year;
14	(5)	Monitor federal legislation for changes that may
15		impact the program and adjust the five-year plan
16		accordingly;
17	(6)	Collaborate with interested stakeholders, including
18		community coalitions or organizations concerned with
19		educating the public regarding long-term care; and
20	(7)	Submit an interim report relating to the proposed
21		system reforms, including the final public policy
22		goals and principles, to the legislature no later than

1		February 28, 2010, and a final report to the
2		legislature no later than September 30, 2010. The
3		final report shall include the final five-year plan,
4		as well as how the reforms will be prioritized and
5		phased in, and a description and final recommendations
6		of how financing long-term care services can be
7		achieved.
8	(e)	The long-term care commission may:
9	(1)	Conduct or initiate new studies as it deems necessary;
10		and
11	(2)	Contract with consultants to conduct the studies,

- including an actuarial study, as it deems necessary

  for the purpose of recommending any program to address

  long-term care financing issues. Any contract

  executed pursuant to this paragraph shall be exempt

  from chapter 103D, Hawaii Revised Statutes; provided

  that the long-term care commission shall endeavor to

  ensure transparency in the letting of the contract.
- 19 (f) The University of Hawaii at Manoa, college of social 20 sciences public policy center, shall provide administrative 21 support and staffing to facilitate the work of the long-term 22 care commission.

- 1 SECTION 3. There is appropriated out of the general
- 2 revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ or so
- 3 much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2008-2009 for
- 4 the long-term care commission to research what resources are
- 5 necessary to provide a continuum of long-term care services for
- 6 Hawaii's aging population and to recommend a program and funding
- 7 mechanism that can provide these services pursuant to section 2
- 8 of this Act.
- 9 The sum appropriated shall be expended by the University of
- 10 Hawaii to assist the long-term care commission for the purposes
- 11 of this Act.
- 12 SECTION 4. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2020, and
- 13 shall be repealed on December 1, 2010; provided that section 3
- 14 of this Act shall take effect on July 1, 2020.
