A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO EDUCATION.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

PART I

SECTION 1. The University of Hawaii's physical plant has
accumulated a backlog of repairs and maintenance due to the lack
of general funds. This project includes reroofing, mechanical,
and electrical systems, renovations, resurfacing, repainting,
and other improvements and project costs to upgrade facilities
at all university campuses.

8 Facilities provide the centerpiece around which all other 9 educational activities exist at higher education institutions. 10 The total replacement value of all University of Hawaii 11 facilities is estimated at \$3,000,000,000. Therefore, it is 12 imperative to reinvest in the university's physical plant to 13 ensure that the physical infrastructure facilitates the mission 14 of the institution.

15 The role of repair and maintenance is to maintain the 16 physical infrastructure and facilities of our campuses so that 17 they are functional, architecturally sound, aesthetically 18 pleasing, and in compliance with building and safety codes to 2008-1983 HB2521 SD1 SMA-1.doc

support quality instruction, research, student, and community
 services programs.

3 The current backlog of repair and maintenance deficiencies 4 at the University of Hawaii totals \$257,000,000. The purpose of this part is to reduce the backlog of repair and maintenance 5 projects at the University of Hawaii to a manageable level. 6 7 Each year an estimated \$50,000,000 of projects are added to the 8 repair and maintenance list. Repair and maintenance projects 9 can be funded entirely with general funds or through a 10 combination of general funds and bond funding.

The backlog of \$257,000,000 less \$75,000,000 totals 11 \$182,000,000. For a six-year plan this would reduce \$30,000,000 12 13 per year for this portion of the plan. In addition, sixty per 14 cent of the annual \$50,000,000 of added annual projects would be 15 \$30,000,000 of bonds to be augmented by \$20,000,000 of general 16 funds. For the bond portion only, this measure proposes adding 17 the first \$30,000,000 to the second \$30,000,000 for a total of 18 \$60,000,000.

SECTION 2. The director of finance is authorized to issue general obligation bonds in the sum of \$60,000,000 or so much thereof as may be necessary and the same sum or so much thereof as may be necessary is appropriated for fiscal year 2008-2009

NO. for the purpose of reducing the backlog of repair and maintenance projects at the University of Hawaii system to manageable levels; provided that a share of the funds shall be allocated for the athletic facilities of the University of Hawaii system, including Cooke Field athletic offices and locker

rooms and other top priorities of the athletics director and 6 7 football coach.

8 The sum appropriated shall be expended by the University of Hawaii for the purposes of this part. 9

SECTION 3. The sum appropriated under this part shall be 10 in addition to any other funds that may be appropriated for the 11 12 same purposes of this part.

14 SECTION 4. The legislature finds that in 2007, emerging creative media programs at the University of Hawaii academy for 15 creative media, Waianae high school, and within a broad range of 16 17 multidisciplinary programs like Project EAST on the neighbor islands have achieved a specific level of achievement to 18 19 evaluate their performance in the context of what a globally-20 integrated economy requires.

21 As pointed out by New York Times columnist Thomas Friedman 22 in an op-ed commentary endorsing the National Center on

1 Education and the Economy's report: "We need to radically 2 overhaul . . . an education system designed in the 1900's for people to do 'routine work' and refocus it on producing people 3 who can imagine things that have never been available before, 4 5 who can create ingenious marketing and sales campaigns, write 6 books, build furniture, make movies and design software that 7 will capture people's imaginations and become indispensable for 8 millions" (December 13, 2006, New York Times).

9 Just as Waianae Searider Productions demonstrated the 10 transformational power of multi-media literacy to engage at-risk 11 students, and Project EAST students have distinguished 12 themselves in national competitions with their homegrown 13 science-technology and multimedia skills, Hawaii has the 14 opportunity to establish itself as a true "crossroads of the 15 Pacific" in the field of creative media.

16 The legislature further finds that since being approved by 17 the University of Hawaii board of regents three years ago, the 18 academy for creative media program is the fastest growing new 19 program at the University of Hawaii. For spring 2007, one 20 hundred seventy-six enrolled students, including sixty majors, 21 filled two hundred seventy-five seats in twenty of the thirty-22 two new courses in film production, screenwriting, indigenous

filmmaking, computer animation, critical studies, and video game
 design.

3 More than three hundred fifty original short films and 4 video games have been written, directed, and produced by 5 students that reflect their unique diversity and backgrounds. 6 Over forty-eight student films were screened at film festivals 7 from Atlanta to Shanghai, including the Hawaii International 8 Film Festival 2004-2006. Students are also offered internship 9 opportunities with major motion picture productions (Superman 10 Returns) and television shows (LOST and local morning news 11 shows), and have opportunities to showcase their work on local 12 television, such as commercials for Toyota/Scion of Hawaii, 13 which were entirely produced by students.

14 Since its inception, the academy for creative media program 15 has been responsible for raising and funding all of its own 16 operating expenses outside of faculty salaries and basic office 17 overhead. This has meant providing all of the funding for 18 hardware, software, computers, cameras, sound equipment, editing 19 equipment, etc. In its first three years, the academy for 20 creative media program raised over \$1,481,000 to support the students and program. 21

1 The school also received gifts from generous donors and 2 supporters to build and install the school's animation render 3 farm, a bank of over fifty computers that efficiently converts, 4 assigns, and monitors animation projects. The system is 5 available for all campuses on all islands via the Internet and is currently being used by the Manoa, Leeward, and Kapiolani 6 campuses, as well as Waianae Seariders Production. Additional 7 8 funds were also raised from the Kellogg Foundation to quadruple 9 the capacity of the animation render farm project to provide system-wide animation computing power, via the Internet, to 10 digital media programs on all of the University of Hawaii 11 campuses and Hawaii public schools at all levels. Furthermore, 12 13 a \$500,000 federal grant was received for the school to produce 14 an original documentary on statehood, which is currently in 15 post-production.

In spite of its success, the academy for creative media program is without a central facility or permanent home on any campus and does not receive any funding for programmatic needs outside of faculty salaries. Yet it contributes significantly to economic development in the State and a first-rate University of Hawaii system.

1 For these reasons, the legislature finds that the 2 establishment of an academy for creative media program within 3 the University of Hawaii is an issue of statewide concern. It is an integral component of the State's development of a 4 5 creative media industry in Hawaii, and as such, the siting of 6 the academy for creative media program is the cornerstone of the State's development of the Kapolei-west Oahu region as the hub 7 8 of Hawaii's creative media industry.

9 The purpose of this part is to enhance the role of the 10 academy for creative media program in developing the skilled 11 workforce to support digital media production sound stages, 12 post-production services, and related businesses in the west 13 Oahu region, as well as providing creative career and business 14 opportunities for students from throughout the State, by:

15 (1) Establishing the academy for creative media program at
16 the University of Hawaii and specifying its management
17 structure; and

18 (2) Amending Act 11, Special Session Laws of Hawaii 2007,
19 to delete provisions relating to leasing the Public
20 Broadcasting System Hawaii facility.

Authorizes the issuance of general obligation bonds to fund University of Hawaii repair and maintenance projects. Establishes the system-wide, statewide academy for creative media program in statute under the University of Hawaii. Amends Act 11, Special Session Laws of Hawaii 2007, to refocus the purpose section, delete all references to a lease agreement with PBS Hawaii, and provide that funds shall be expended to expand the programs and facilities of the academy for creative media program at a system-wide level, including funding directed to the West Oahu-Kapolei region. (SD1)
