A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO AFTER-SCHOOL PROGRAMS.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

PART I. NON-SCHOOL-HOUR PROGRAMS

2 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that many children are 3 left unsupervised in the mornings and afternoons before and after school. Nationally, nearly two-thirds of school-age 4 5 children are in homes where both parents work, but few communities have a comprehensive system that provides before-6 and after-school care for children. Currently, Hawaii has a 7 successful A+ program for students in grades K-6, but does not 8 9 have a similar program for older children who also need adult 10 supervision. Statistics show that the rates of juvenile crime, drug use, and experimentation with tobacco, alcohol, and sexual 11 12 activity increase among unsupervised older children during nonschool hours. These problems have been identified by and 13 qualify for federal funding programs using temporary assistance 14 15 for needy families block grants. The legislature further finds 16 that there is widespread agreement that it is important to establish safe, structured, and supervised learning environments 17

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for school-aged children during non-school hours to avoid or prevent these problems. The purpose of this part is to appropriate temporary

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4 assistance for needy families program funds to supervise school-5 aged children in non-school-hour programs to address problems of 6 juvenile crime, drug use, and experimentation with tobacco, 7 alcohol, and sexual activity.

8 SECTION 2. There is appropriated out of the federal
9 temporary assistance for needy families program funds the sum of
10 \$ or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal
11 year 2008-2009 for non-school-hour programs to provide
12 supervision of kindergarten through twelfth graders under the
13 department of education.

14 The sum appropriated shall be expended by the department of 15 human services for the purposes of this part.

16 SECTION 3. There is appropriated out of the federal 17 temporary assistance for needy families program funds the sum of 18 \$ or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal 19 year 2008-2009 for the office of youth services for non-school-20 hour programs for children and youth enrolled in school.

21 The sum appropriated shall be expended by the department of 22 human services for the purposes of this part.

1	SECTION 4. There is appropriated out of the federal		
2	temporary assistance for needy families program funds the sum of		
3	\$ or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal		
4	year 2008-2009 for non-school-hour programs for children and		
5	youth enrolled in school.		
6	The sum appropriated shall be expended by the department of		
7	human services subject to the following allocation percentages,		
8	which are based on the number of children eighteen years of age		
9	or younger residing in each county; provided that no funds shall		
10	be disbursed unless each county provides matching funds on a		
11	dollar-for-dollar basis as follows:		
12	(1) Seventy-one per cent, city and county of Honolulu;		
13	(2) Thirteen per cent, county of Hawaii;		
14	(3) Eleven per cent, county of Maui; and		
15	(4) Five per cent, county of Kauai.		
16	SECTION 5. Moneys allocated for the purposes of this part		
17	shall not reduce existing funding for non-school-hour programs.		
18	Moneys shall be awarded by the expending agencies only to non-		
19	school-hour programs that demonstrate a commitment to partnering		
20	with the public and private sectors and involve youth as active		
21	participants in all phases of program planning, implementation,		
22	and evaluation. All programs that receive moneys shall meet		
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each quarter with their community partners for the purposes of
 program evaluation and improvement.

SECTION 6. The department of education, the office of 3 youth services, and the counties' parks and recreation 4 departments shall convene annually to share information on the 5 best practices and outcomes of non-school-hour programs. 6 The office of youth services shall submit to the legislature an 7 8 annual report on the programs funded under this part no later than twenty days prior to the convening of each regular session, 9 10 beginning with the regular session of 2009.

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PART II. COUNTY OF HAWAII AFTER-SCHOOL PROGRAMS

SECTION 7. The island of Hawaii encompasses an area of 4,028 square miles and has a population of 167,000 residents. The island's population is spread over an area twice the size of all the other islands combined, which poses unique geographical challenges in the provision of programs and services to island residents.

18 Rural communities sometimes lack the necessary 19 infrastructure to support and implement beneficial programs. 20 Youth in rural communities can face challenges in remaining 21 drug-free, engaged, and involved in positive activities because 22 of the lack of transportation, facilities, and educational 2008-1975 HB2962 SD1 SMA.doc

1 alternatives during afternoon and evening hours. Families have 2 to travel significant distances to areas of employment that are 3 clustered in the South Kohala, Kona, and Hilo areas. This results in many children being unsupervised after school. Drugs 4 5 and substance abuse, primarily of crystal methamphetamine, are 6 taking a heavy toll on the children and families in these 7 communities. The State remains committed to ensuring the safety 8 and health of our children in rural areas.

9 Schools have the necessary infrastructure to provide support to youth, families, and communities, including 10 11 classrooms, restrooms, parking areas, computer labs, gyms, and 12 parks. In some rural communities, the only facilities for 13 meetings and activities are the schools, which often remain closed during the afternoon and evening hours. Schools are the 14 15 center of our communities. Through partnerships among the 16 department of education, the county, local businesses, and 17 community organizations, students can be given the opportunity 18 to remain at school to participate in non-school-hour 19 recreational and educational programs. Increasing the positive 20 alternatives available to our youth will provide untold benefits 21 to our community.

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1 Establishing the Hawaii safe haven demonstration program 2 will allow communities to become engaged in the education and 3 support of its students. This demonstration program will permit 4 schools to remain open after school with services to be provided by local businesses, organizations, and community volunteers. 5 6 It will also allow for the collaboration, cooperation, and collective commitment of rural communities towards nurturing, 7 8 quiding, and supporting youth and their families. The safe haven demonstration program is planned for implementation in the 9 10 county of Hawaii as a model to be expanded to other islands following the successful demonstration of this program. 11 One 12 school will be selected by each department of education area complex superintendent as a demonstration site. A total of 13 14 three schools will be part of this program during the first year 15 of operation.

16 The legislature finds that unacceptable rates of adolescent 17 substance abuse, juvenile delinquency, teenage pregnancies, and 18 other negative socio-economic statistics are occurring in Hawaii 19 communities. The Department of Justice, Office of Juvenile 20 Justice and Delinquency Prevention has clearly stated that 21 community programs most effective in addressing negative 22 behaviors amongst our youth are programs that reduce the risk 2008-1975 HB2962 SD1 SMA.doc

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1 factors and increase the protective factors in our community. 2 The Safe Haven demonstration program will accomplish both of 3 those goals. 4 The purpose of this part is to appropriate funds for the 5 implementation of the safe haven demonstration program in the 6 county of Hawaii. 7 SECTION 8. There is appropriated out of the general revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ 8 or so 9 much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2008-2009 for the implementation of the safe haven model demonstration program 10 11 in the county of Hawaii. The sum appropriated shall be expended by the county of 12 13 Hawaii for the purposes of the part. 14 PART III. NON-SCHOOL-HOUR PROGRAMS TASK FORCE 15 SECTION 9. The legislature is committed to providing 16 excellence in education in Hawaii. Under Act 51, Session Laws 17 of Hawaii 2004, the Reinventing Education Act of 2004, the 18 legislature found that "[a]lthough the State's students, parents, teachers, school administrators, departmental staff, 19 20 and other educational stakeholders strive to achieve excellence, their efforts will never be completely successful until various 21 22 aspects of the system around them are improved."



1 The legislature reiterates its support for efforts by the department of education to improve Hawaii's schools not only to 2 3 enhance the academic achievement, safety, well-being, and civic commitment of students, but to also meet the evolving needs of 4 today's communities. Those needs include after-school programs 5 that help facilitate academic achievement, fulfill recreational 6 needs, and promote civic responsibilities, as demonstrated by 7 8 existing programs held on and off campus by the office of youth 9 services, the Young Men's Christian Association, the Boys and 10 Girls Club, and other agencies.

11 The State's after-school programs provide safe and 12 supervised after-school education, enrichment, and recreation 13 for students. Research demonstrates that youth who participate 14 in after-school programs are less likely to drink alcohol, 15 smoke, use drugs, and drop out of school.

16 Although the State provides the A+ program for students in 17 lower grades and formal athletic programs in high schools, there 18 are no formal non-school-hour activities in public schools for 19 students in grades six to twelve.

20 The purpose of this part is to improve non-school-hour 21 programs by establishing a task force to review and recommend 22 improvements to the State's current non-school-hour activities 2008-1975 HB2962 SD1 SMA.doc

3	SECT	ION 10. (a) There is established a non-school-hour	
4	activitie	s task force within the office of youth services. The	
5	non-schoo	l-hour activities task force shall consist of the	
6	following	members appointed by the superintendent of education:	
7	(1)	The non-school-hour activities program coordinator;	
8	(2)	At least one athletic director;	
9	(3)	Two middle school administrators;	
10	(4)	Two high school administrators;	
11	(5)	A representative from the office of youth services;	
12	(6)	Two representatives from service organizations;	
13	(7)	A union representative;	
14	(8)	A representative from a faith-based organization;	
15	(9)	A representative from each county;	
16	(10)	At least one community college representative;	
17	(11)	At least one student representative; and	
18	(12)	Any additional members that may be determined by the	
19		superintendent.	
20	(b)	In carrying out its duties under this section, the	
21	task forc	e may request staff assistance from the department of	

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1	education	, the department of human services, and other
2	appropria	te agencies.
3	(c)	The members of the task force shall serve without
4	compensat	ion, but shall be reimbursed for the expenses,
5	including	travel expenses, necessary for the performance of
6	their dut	ies.
7	(d)	The task force shall:
8	(1)	Review the types of non-school-hour programs available
9		in middle schools, including by means of asset mapping
10		to geographically identify where the programs are
11		administered and the population being served;
12	(2)	Research the preferences of students, parents, and
13		educators regarding non-school-hour activities;
14	(3)	Identify programs that attract students who do not
15		normally participate in non-school-hour activities;
16	(4)	Identify public and private agencies willing to
17		participate in non-school-hour activities;
18	(5)	Identify vacant or unused public school or public park
19		facilities that can be used for non-school-hour
20		activities by public or private providers and
21		determine if the land or facilities can be used by
22		private providers to construct, lease, or rent;

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Determine available and potential resources for 1 (6) funding the establishment of new non-school-hour 2 activities; 3 4 (7) Establish a master plan to locate and construct new schools adjoining or adjacent to existing public or 5 private recreational facilities whenever possible; and 6 7 (8) Recommend legislation for the implementation of an after-school, weekend, and semester break activities 8 9 pilot program for students in grades six to twelve. (e) The task force shall submit a report of its findings 10 and recommendations, including proposed legislation, to the 11 legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of 12 the regular session of 2009 and shall cease to exist on June 30, 13 14 2009. SECTION 11. Section 302A-408, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is 15 amended to read as follows: 16 17 "§302A-408 [After-school and weekend] Non-school-hour programs. (a) The department and the appropriate county 18 19 agencies may establish and regulate non-school-hour programs [of], including after-school [and], weekend, and semester break 20 community-school activities for children, including but not 21 22 limited to [child care programs, arts and crafts, hula, 2008-1975 HB2962 SD1 SMA.doc 11

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1	ukulele,] academic, technology, visual arts, performing arts,
2	athletic, cultural, and other recreational [projects,] programs,
3	wherever feasible, at public school and public park facilities.
4	In addition to any appropriation of public funds, reasonable
5	fees established by the agencies operating the programs may be
6	collected from children enrolled, in the furtherance of
7	particular programs. The appropriate agencies may obtain from
8	time to time the services of department personnel, students, and
9	persons in a voluntary or unpaid capacity, exempt from chapter
10	76, as may be necessary for carrying out the purposes of this
11	section, and may regulate their duties, powers, and
12	responsibilities when not otherwise provided by law. Any person
13	whose services have been so accepted, while engaged in the
14	performance of duty under this section, shall be deemed a state
15	employee or an employee of a political subdivision, as the case
16	may be, in determining the liability of the State or the
17	political subdivision for the negligent acts of these persons.
18	(b) The department may:
19	(1) Allow the use of school facilities by public and
20	private entities to administer a non-school-hour
21	program;

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1	(2)	Provide transportation services for students		
2		participating in the non-school-hour programs; and		
3	(3)	Authorize schools to charge a fee for the use of their		
4		facilities; provided that students from low-income		
5		households may be charged a reduced fee.		
6	(c)	There is established within the department an		
7	education	al specialist II position to coordinate the State's		
8	non-school-hour programs; provided that the education specialist			
9	shall serve at the pleasure of the superintendent and the			
10	position may be established as a permanent position not subject			
11	to chapter 76."			
12	SECTION 12. There is appropriated out of the general			
13	revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ or so			
14	much ther	eof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2008-2009 for		
15	an education specialist II position.			
16	The	sum appropriated shall be expended by the department of		
17	education	for the purposes of this part.		
18	SECT	ION 13. There is appropriated out of the general		
19	revenues	of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ or so		
20	much ther	eof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2008-2009 for		
21	non-schoo	1-hour programs, which shall include after-school,		
22	weekend,	and semester break programs.		
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The sum appropriated shall be expended by the department of
 education for the purposes of this part.
 SECTION 14. Statutory material to be repealed is bracketed
 and stricken. New statutory material is underscored.
 SECTION 15. This Act shall take effect upon its approval;
 provided that sections 2, 3, 4, 8, 12, and 13 shall take effect
 on July 1, 2008.
