A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO CAREGIVING.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1	PART I
2	FINDINGS AND PURPOSE
3	SECTION 1. The legislature finds that, due to a shortage
4	of care providers in Hawaii, family caregiving has become a
5	critical element of our health and long-term care system. By
6	2020, more than one in four individuals is expected to be sixty
7	years old or older. The need for personal care assistance due
8	to physical, sensory, cognitive, and self-care disabilities
9	increases with age. As Hawaii's population ages, many more
10	families will be providing higher levels of long-term care to
11	frail and disabled older adults at home.
12	A comprehensive public policy to strengthen support for
13	family caregivers is essential. The joint legislative committee
14	on family caregiving was established under Act 285, Session Laws
15	of Hawaii 2006, to develop a comprehensive public policy to
16	strengthen support for family caregivers in Hawaii.

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The committee held numerous meetings during the fall of 1 2006 and submitted a special committee report to the legislature 2 outlining its proposal for the establishment of a comprehensive 3 and sustainable, community-based family caregiver support system 4 that will maximize resources in all communities. However, it is 5 still necessary to gather more information on this subject to 6 7 enable the State to apply resources and services in a more 8 efficacious manner. The committee should be extended to enable it to continue work on its proposal for the establishment of a 9 comprehensive and sustainable, community-based family caregiver 10 11 support system. Numerous testifiers appeared before the committee on behalf 12 of grandparents in support of recognizing their role as family 13 caregivers for their grandchildren. According to the United 14 15 States Census Bureau, between 1990 and 2000, there was an over thirty per cent increase in the number of children under age 16 eighteen living in grandparent-headed households in Hawaii. Of 17 the 14,029 grandparents in Hawaii who report that they are 18 19 responsible for their resident grandchildren, over one-fifth also report that the children's parents are not present in the 20

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household.

1	The national family caregiver support program under the
2	reauthorized Older Americans Act includes grandparents of
3	grandchildren age eighteen years and younger. They experience
4	similar support needs and costs of caregiving with family
5	caregivers who provide unpaid, informal assistance to older
6	adults with physical or cognitive disabilities. Custodial
7	grandparenting has emotional, physical, and financial costs.
8	Custodial grandparents report more anxiety, depression, and
9	physical health problems than their non-caregiving peers, and
10	they need accurate and accessible information on a myriad of
11	issues.
12	A crucial element in the design and implementation of a
13	comprehensive and sustainable, community-based family caregiver
14	support system is an assessment of the needs of family
15	caregivers and the care recipients. A thorough needs assessment
16	is imperative to appropriately encourage, support, and
17	strengthen the provision of family caregiving.
18	
	Family caregivers who provide care to recipients with
19	Family caregivers who provide care to recipients with chronic or disabling conditions are themselves at risk for

	chronic or disabling conditions are themselves at risk for

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- 1 higher health care costs, and affect the family caregiver's
- 2 quality of life and the quality of life of the care recipient.
- 3 For many family caregivers, their role as family caregiver
- 4 arises as suddenly as the care recipient's health declines,
- 5 leaving the family caregivers with an immediate need for
- 6 services, but little preparation or education regarding who to
- 7 contact for assistance or what services are available to them.
- 8 In addition, the family caregivers may not know who is capable
- 9 or qualified to provide them with the services that they or the
- 10 care recipients need. Family caregivers themselves need support
- 11 services, including respite services and training, education,
- 12 and counseling in areas such as caregiving and dealing with end-
- 13 of-life issues.
- 14 Kupuna care is a statewide long-term care program,
- 15 administered by the executive office on aging, which was
- 16 developed in partnership with the county area agencies on aging
- 17 to address the growing numbers of elders with long-term care
- 18 needs. Services provided by kupuna care are intended to help
- 19 meet the needs of older adults who cannot live at home without
- 20 adequate help from family or formal caregiving services, and
- 21 include services such as adult day care, respite care, assisted
- 22 transportation, attendant care, case management, chore, home

- 1 delivered meals, homemaker, transportation, and personal care.
- 2 In addition to the services provided to the elderly, direct
- 3 services to family caregivers can be provided to educate and
- 4 assist family caregivers in coping with their roles as a
- 5 caregiver.
- 6 Under Act 262, Session Laws of Hawaii 2006, the executive
- 7 office on aging is required to coordinate a statewide system of
- 8 caregiver support services. An appropriation should be made to
- 9 assist the executive office on aging's caregiver's resource
- 10 initiative project to enable it to continue its efforts in that
- 11 regard.
- 12 A number of approaches have been suggested as means to help
- 13 family caregivers with the financial costs of family caregiving,
- 14 including cash and counseling and a family caregiver refundable
- 15 tax credit. However, more research and analyses of these
- 16 different approaches is necessary to ensure that the State
- 17 applies its resources and services towards helping family
- 18 caregivers in the most efficacious manner.
- 19 The purpose of this Act is to strengthen support of family
- 20 caregiving by:
- 21 (1) Extending the life of the joint legislative committee
- on family caregiving;

2		establishing a paid family leave program under the

4	(3)	Providing a broader definition of "family caregiver"
5		by including grandparents who are caregivers for
6		grandchildren who are age eighteen years or younger or
7		eighteen years of age or older with physical or
8		cognitive limitations;
9	(4)	Requiring the executive office on aging to conduct a
10		comprehensive assessment of the needs of care
11		recipients who are age sixty and older with physical
12		or cognitive disabilities and the needs of their
13		family caregivers;
14	(5)	Appropriating funds for the executive office on aging
15		to conduct a comprehensive assessment of the issues
16		facing, and the needs of, grandparents raising
17		grandchildren who are age eighteen years or younger;
18	(6)	Appropriating funds to expand the kupuna care
19		program's in-home and access services for qualified
20		care recipients;
21	(7)	Appropriating funds to provide direct services to
22		family caregivers;

1	(8)	Appropriating funds to the executive office on aging
2		for the caregiver's resource initiative project,
3		including the continuation of its efforts to
4		coordinate a statewide system of family caregiver
5		policies and support services; and
6	(9)	Appropriating funds to the executive office on aging
7		to provide analyses of two different approaches to
8		helping family caregivers with their financial needs.
9		PART II
10	J	OINT LEGISLATIVE COMMITTEE ON FAMILY CAREGIVING
11	SECT	ION 2. Act 285, Session Laws of Hawaii 2006, is
12	amended by	y amending section 2 to read as follows:
13	"SEC	TION 2. (a) There is established a joint legislative
14	committee	on family caregiving. The committee shall be composed
15	of eight m	members as follows:
16	(1)	Four members of the house of representatives,
17		consisting of three members from the majority party
18		and one member from the minority party, who shall be
19		appointed by the speaker of the house of
20		representatives; and
21	(2)	Four members of the senate, consisting of three
22		members from the majority party and one member from

1		the minority party, who shall be appointed by the
2		president of the senate.
3	The	committee shall select a chairperson from its
4	membershi	p.
5	(d)	The joint legislative committee shall develop
6	comprehen	sive public policy to strengthen support for family
7	caregiver	s [who provide unpaid, informal assistance to persons
8	age sixty	and older with physical or cognitive disabilities].
9	For purpo	ses of this Act, "family caregiver" means:
10	(1)	A person, including a non-relative such as a friend or
11		neighbor, who provides unpaid, informal assistance to
12		a person age sixty and older with physical or
13		cognitive disabilities; and
14	(2)	A grandparent who is a caregiver for a grandchild who
15		is age eighteen years or younger or who is eighteen
16		years of age or older with physical or cognitive
17		limitations.
18	(c)	The joint legislative committee shall [consider]:
19	(1)	Consider providing support in categories including
20		[but not limited to]:
21	[(1)]	(A) Coordinated services and policies;
22	[(2)]	(B) Training and education;

1	[(3)] (C) Respite services;
. 2	[(4)] <u>(D)</u> Financial incentives; and
3	$[\frac{(5)}{(E)}]$ Balancing work and caregiving $[+]$; and
4	(2) Explore establishing a paid family leave program under
5	the state temporary disability insurance law, similar
6	to the California Paid Family Leave Program, to
7	provide wage replacement benefits to employees who
8	take time off from work to care for a seriously ill
9	family member.
10	(d) The joint legislative committee shall seek input from
11	the department of health, the department of human services, the
12	department of taxation, the University of Hawaii, the executive
13	office on aging, and the elderly, disability, business, and
14	faith-based communities.
15	(e) The joint legislative committee shall submit its
16	findings and recommendations to the legislature no later than
17	twenty days prior to the convening of the regular [session]
18	<u>sessions</u> of 2007[-] <u>and 2008.</u>
19	(f) The joint legislative committee shall cease to exist
20	on [June 30, 2007.] <u>June 30, 2008.</u> "

22	NEEDS ASSESSMENT OF FAMILY CAREGIVERS

1	SECT	ION 3. (a) The executive office on aging shall
2	conduct a	comprehensive assessment of the needs of care
3	recipient	s who are age sixty and older with physical or
4	cognitive	disabilities and the needs of their family caregivers.
5	The needs	assessment should include an evaluation of:
6	(1)	The extent of the unmet caregiving needs of persons
7		age sixty and older with physical or cognitive
8		disabilities;
9	(2)	The size of the current family caregiver population;
10	(3)	The percentage of care recipients' needs being met by
11		paid versus unpaid caregivers; and
12	(4)	The impact of caregiving on family caregivers'
13		employment and income.
14	(b)	In conducting the needs assessment, the executive
15	office on	aging shall identify and review past surveys, such as
16	the 2003 I	Hawaii Health Survey, include focus groups, and develop
17	policy que	estions to guide the focus of the needs assessment.
18	(c)	In conducting the needs assessment, the executive
19	office on	aging may utilize telephone surveys or other methods
20	of gather	ing reliable data regarding care recipients' needs and

the needs of their family caregivers, including purchasing

additional questions for the upcoming Hawaii Health Survey.

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1	(d) The executive office on aging shall submit the
2	completed needs assessment to the joint legislative committee on
3	family caregiving no later than twenty days prior to the
4	convening of the regular session of 2008 to facilitate the
5	development of a comprehensive, sustainable, and community-based
6	family caregiver support system.
7	(e) For purposes of this section, "family caregiver" means
8	a person, including a non-relative such as a friend or neighbor,
9	who provides unpaid, informal assistance to a person age sixty
10	and older with physical or cognitive disabilities.
11	SECTION 4. The executive office on aging shall submit a
12	report, including the completed needs assessment and any
13	proposed legislation, to the legislature no later than twenty
14	days prior to the convening of the regular session of 2008.
15	SECTION 5. There is appropriated out of the general
16	revenues of the State of Hawaii the following sums or so much
17	thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2007-2008 for the
18	executive office on aging to conduct a comprehensive needs
19	assessment pursuant to section 3.

8	much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2007-2008 for
9	the executive office on aging to conduct an assessment of the
10	issues facing, and the needs of, grandparents raising
11	grandchildren in Hawaii.

14	The sum appropriated shall be expended by the senate and
15	the house of representatives to assist the executive office on
16	aging for the purposes of this part.
17	SECTION 7. The executive office on aging shall submit a
18	report, including the completed needs assessment and any
19	proposed legislation, to the legislature no later than twenty
20	days prior to the convening of the regular session of 2008.
21	PART V
22	SERVICES

1	SECTION 8. There is appropriated out of the general
2	revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ or so
3	much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2007-2008 and
4	the same sum or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal
5	year 2008-2009 to the executive office on aging to expand the
6	kupuna care program's in-home and access services to qualified
7	care recipients.
8	The sums appropriated shall be expended by the department
9	of health for the purposes of this part.
10	SECTION 9. There is appropriated out of the general
11	revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ or so
12	much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2007-2008 and
13	the same sum or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal
14	year 2008-2009 to the executive office on aging to provide
15	direct services to family caregivers.
16	The sums appropriated shall be expended by the department
17	of health for the purposes of this Act.
18	SECTION 10. There is appropriated out of the general
19	revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ or so
20	much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2007-2008 and

the same sum or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal

year 2008-2009 to the executive office on aging for the

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- 1 caregiver's resource initiative project, including the
- 2 continuation of its efforts to coordinate a statewide system of
- 3 family caregiver policies and support services.
- 4 The sums appropriated shall be expended by the department
- 5 of health for the purposes of this part.
- 6 PART VI
- 7 APPROACHES TO FINANCIAL NEEDS OF FAMILY CAREGIVERS
- 8 SECTION 11. (a) Cash and counseling is a national program
- 9 sponsored by the Robert Wood Johnson Foundation; the United
- 10 States Department of Health and Human Services, Office of the
- 11 Assistant Secretary for Planning and Evaluation; and the
- 12 Administration on Aging. Under the program, recipients of
- 13 medicaid personal care services or home- and community-based
- 14 services receive a flexible monthly allowance and decide who to
- 15 hire and what services they want to receive.
- 16 The program's innovative approach enables participants to
- 17 direct and manage their personal assistance services according
- 18 to their own specific needs. Participants can choose a family
- 19 member or friend, in lieu of an agency worker, to provide the
- 20 services. They receive counseling and fiscal assistance to help
- 21 them manage their allowance and responsibilities. The program

- 1 was first implemented in Arkansas, New Jersey, and Florida, and
- 2 has since expanded to include twelve other states.
- 3 The potential exists to establish a similar program here in
- 4 Hawaii to serve the needs of residents receiving medicaid
- 5 personal care services or home- and community-based services, as
- 6 well as residents who are not medicaid recipients.
- 7 (b) A tax credit to caregivers who care for qualified care
- 8 recipients is another approach to helping family caregivers
- 9 defray some of the cost of providing invaluable caregiving
- 10 services. One measure introduced during the 2007 legislative
- 11 session, Senate Bill No. 1199, S.D. 2 (2007), provides eligible
- 12 taxpayers with a refundable income tax credit on a sliding scale
- 13 basis.
- 14 SECTION 12. (a) The executive office on aging shall:
- 15 (1) Research the cash and counseling program and its
- implementation in other states, including Arkansas,
- 17 New Jersey, and Florida;
- 18 (2) In completing its research:
- 19 (A) Contact the national program office at the Boston
- 20 college graduate school of social work, which
- 21 coordinates replications of the program;

1		(B) Consult with the Robert Wood Johnson Foundation	a,
