#### A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO THE OFFICE OF INTERNATIONAL AFFAIRS.

#### BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1	SECTION 1. The legislature finds that Hawaii's desire for
2	economic growth that benefits all residents depends on building
3	our State's human resources.
4	Realization of Hawaii's longstanding desire for economic
5	diversification and sustainability turns on applying the State's
6	high skilled resources to the creation and adoption of
7	innovation across the economy.
8	Legislative Package for 2007 Legislative Session
9	This Act is part of an initial package of initiatives
10	focusing on innovation introduced for the 2007 regular session.
11	This package is intended to achieve:
12	(1) A twenty-first century workforce with science,
13	technology, engineering, math, and problem-solving
14	skills sufficient to ensure innovation and
15	sustainability of Hawaii's economy;
16	(2) Higher education institutions as "drivers" for
17	innovation;

1	(3)	Continued public investment in the State's innovation
2		infrastructure;
3	(4)	Addressing the capital gap for Hawaii's emerging
4		technology and creative industry companies;
5	(5)	Opportunities for incumbent workers to engage in life-
6		long learning and skill-building;
7	(6)	Residents and businesses with international exposure,
8		orientation, and skills to interact with and compete
9		in a global economy;
10	(7)	An innovation environment that encourages the creation
11		of new products and services that command global
12		market share; and
13	(8)	Analytical capability to assess policy performance and
14		progress toward innovation economy objectives.
15	In partic	ular, this Act expands the role of the office of
16	internation	onal affairs to include the facilitation, coordination,
17	and promo	tion of educational relationships and exchanges with
18	other cou	ntries through collaboration with and funding of
19	existing :	international programs and organizations. It also
20	clarifies	the office's position as the central point of
21	naaount ah:	lity in international affairs

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SECTION 2. Globalization refers to the increasing 1 integration of economies and societies around the world, enabled 2 by human innovation and technological progress. It has set in 3 motion the means by which goods, services, ideas, and capital can flow relatively freely across national borders. It has not 5 only enabled new types of activity, but it has also empowered 6 individuals and small businesses to undertake economic activity 7 that previously was reserved for large multinational firms. 8 While it has increased a whole range of opportunities for those 9 with minimum means, ability, and willingness to participate in 10 this new global economy, it has also created major challenges. 11 For young people graduating from high school or college, this 12 has meant that they now have to compete for jobs globally. 13 The new global economy demands that we establish Hawaii as a 14 community of lifelong learners, where children build a strong 15 foundation in internationalism during the K-12 years, and where 16 flexible, responsive, and continuing education and training are 17 available to meet the challenges of the global economy and are 18 available to all of Hawaii's adults. 19 There are a number of factors - including our location, 20 multicultural and ethnic population, and an environment 21 conducive to discussion and negotiation - that support Hawaii as 22

- 1 a center for international conferences. However, very little or
- 2 no concerted effort has been made to bring resources, plans, and
- 3 programs together and in line with any form of a larger vision
- 4 for Hawaii, within the context of a rapidly globalizing world.
- 5 The legislature understands that in order to advance global
- 6 competitiveness through education, there needs to be
- 7 coordination between the State, counties, educational
- 8 institutions, and private agencies on international affairs, as
- 9 well as a central point of accountability and a leveraging of
- 10 resources.
- 11 Section 201-17, Hawaii Revised Statutes, established the
- 12 office of international affairs to carry out various
- 13 international responsibilities and duties, but left out
- 14 education and training as a means to prepare Hawaii for a
- 15 globalized world. It also did not specify that the office of
- 16 international affairs would be the coordinator on international
- 17 matters for the State. And finally, it did not provide funding
- 18 for the office to carry out its broad mandate. This Act
- 19 remedies those problems.
- 20 SECTION 3. Section 201-17, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
- 21 amended to read as follows:

9	(2)	Develop policies that promote transportation between,
10		and tourism with, other countries;
11	(3)	Develop and promote international telecommunications
12		and high technology exchanges;
13	(4)	Encourage the development of international sister-city
14		programs, pairing Hawaii cities with cities around the
15		globe for artistic, cultural, economic, educational,
16		and faith-based exchanges;
17	(5)	Develop and promote Hawaii as the economic, trade,
18	*	commerce, transportation, banking, [and] tourism,
19		regional headquarters, and international conferences
20		hub of the [Pacific;] Asia-Pacific region;
21	(6)	Develop an international affairs and peace education
22		curriculum that includes studies of international

1		affairs and peace initiatives and takes a proactive,
2		strategic approach to the development of policies that
3		promote the prevention of national and international
4		conflict, nonviolent intervention, mediation, peaceful
5		resolution of conflict, and structured mediation of
6		conflict; [and]
7	(7)	Provide for exchanges of individuals between Hawaii
8		and other nations to develop international and peace-
9		based initiatives [-];
10	(8)	Facilitate an international educational links program
11		by increasing collaboration and coordination of
12		international, educational, business, and community
13		organizations and providing funding for activities
14		that shall include, but not be limited to:
15		(A) School excursions from Asia to Hawaii schools,
16		targeting middle and high school students from
17		Japan, Taiwan, Korea, and China with special
18		focus on Hawaii's sister-states, utilizing the
19		department and its overseas offices to market
20		school excursions to Hawaii and match these
21		overseas school visits with Hawaii schools;

1		(B)	Study abroad programs, targeting middle and high-
2			school students from Hawaii's schools, utilizing
3			the department's overseas offices and focusing on
4			Hawaii's sister-states, that match Hawaii schools
5			with overseas schools for school-to-school visits
6			and hosting. The office shall fund, and
7			encourage funding sources both public and private
8			to help finance, the studies abroad; and
9		(C)	Teacher exchange programs through which teachers
10			from Hawaii and abroad exchange a period of time
11			of teaching. The office shall fund, and
12			encourage funding sources both public and private
13			to help finance, the teaching abroad;
14	(9)	Faci	litate an international leaders program by
15		<u>faci</u>	litating the collaboration and coordination of
16		inte	rnational, educational, business, and community
17		orga	nizations and funding activities that shall
18		incl	ide, but not be limited to:
19		(A)	International conferences for high school
20			students involving international organizations
21			such as the east west center and the pacific
22			asian affairs council;

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1		(B) Adopt-a-school programs partnering international
2		companies and organizations schools for cultural
3		and educational enrichment;
4		(C) School competitions to become a high-school
5		fellow at international agencies' programs;
6	(10)	Be the State's central point of contact and
7		accountability in international affairs and serve as
8		the State's advocate for a global orientation;
9	(11)	Inventory existing international programs and develop
10		a web-based information portal to make this
11		information available to the public;
12	(12)	Encourage the attraction of international conferences
13		to be held in Hawaii; and
14	(13)	Encourage the development of international programming
15		and content on local radio shows and a dedicated
16	÷	public access channel for international programs and
17		issues.
18	<del>[(c)</del>	Notwithstanding any other law to the contrary, if any
19	of the re	sponsibilities or duties of the office of international
20	<del>affairs u</del>	nder this section overlap with the responsibilities or
21	duties of	another agency or authority under this chapter, the
22	office of	international affairs shall have exclusive

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1	Jurisaiction and duthority over those responsibilitees and
2	duties.]"
3	SECTION 4. There is appropriated out of the general
4	revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$531,000, or so much
5	thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2007-2008, and the
6	sum of \$518,000 or so much thereof as may be necessary fiscal
7	year 2008-2009, for the hiring of an executive director and
8	administrative assistant and for operating and program expenses
9	SECTION 5. The sums appropriated shall be expended by the
10	department of business, economic development, and tourism for
11	the purposes of this Act.
12	SECTION 6. Statutory material to be repealed is bracketed
13	and stricken. New statutory material is underscored.
14	SECTION 7. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2007.
