A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO SCHOOLS.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- 1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that individual public
- 2 schools are increasingly enjoying flexibility and autonomy in
- 3 operations. The Reinventing Education Act of 2004, Act 51,
- 4 Session Laws of Hawaii 2004, as amended, envisions a public
- 5 school system where the responsibility, flexibility, and
- 6 accountability is located as close to the classroom as possible.
- 7 Under this policy, principals and their school community
- 8 councils are taking greater responsibility for the successful
- 9 management of their schools.
- 10 The legislature further finds that the State has committed
- 11 itself to greater decentralization of decision making and
- 12 accounting of finances toward the individual school and the
- 13 classroom. To achieve this end, the department's school
- 14 community councils and charter school local school boards should
- 15 be increasingly allocated funds based on a per pupil basis that
- 16 go directly to the school for management and allocation.

- 1 With all the pressures on schools to achieve adequate
- 2 yearly progress under the No Child Left Behind Act of 2001,
- 3 Public Law 107-110, several important programs and expenditures
- 4 are often given lower priority.
- 5 Specifically, it is well known that participation in the
- 6 performing and visual arts not only enriches student life, but
- 7 also contributes to greater student achievement. For many
- 8 students, hands-on opportunities for self expression are keys to
- 9 self esteem and control of disruptive behavior. A complete
- 10 education is one in which a young person is given continuous
- 11 opportunities for expression through the arts.
- 12 Secondly, it is also well known that many of our students
- 13 are not physically fit, and in fact exhibit symptoms of
- 14 childhood obesity. Because student health relates not only to
- 15 the physical well-being of our community but also contributes to
- 16 student achievement, it is essential that physical education
- 17 programs be sustained even as schools spend more resources on
- 18 remedial tutoring designed to raise test scores.
- 19 Finally, the ability of school communities to purchase high
- 20 quality learning materials, whether virtual computer-based, text
- 21 book, or other reading materials such as novels, is crucial for
- 22 a dynamic and effective educational system.

15		the arts, physical education, and learning materials;
16	(3)	Provide up to \$ per pupil for these
17		earmarked purposes;
18	(4)	Provide an additional \$ per pupil to allow
19		schools to purchase business services to ensure each
20		school is using best accounting and record keeping
21		practices and is prepared for a financial audit; and

1	(5)	Provide funds for each complex area to hire a business	
2		manager and trainer to provide services to schools in	
3		their newly granted responsibilities.



- SECTION 4. Section 302A-1308, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is 4
- 5 amended to read as follows:
- 6 "\$302A-1308 Use of resources by schools. School
- 7 principals shall consult with teachers, parents, and students to
- solicit their advice on the use of moneys and positions. Prior 8
- 9 to expending moneys and implementing position assignments,
- 10 principals shall submit plans for the use of the moneys and
- 11 positions to their complex area superintendents who shall review
- 12 the plans for conformance with departmental policies and rules.
- 13 [Upon approval of the plans, moneys] Upon determination by the
- 14 complex area superintendent that a school's plans are not in
- conflict with existing laws, policies and rules, school 15
- 16 community councils and the school principals shall have
- 17 independent authority to authorize the expenditure of funds.
- 18 Moneys may be expended by the principals for supplies,
- 19 textbooks, equipment, and services. Positions may be used to

- 1 SECTION 6. There is appropriated out of the general revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ 2 much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2007-2008, and 3 the same sum, or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal 4 5 year 2008-2009, to the department of education for each school to purchase business services either from the department of 6 7 education or other sources to assist the school in adopting best 8 practices for accounting and recordkeeping; provided that these 9 amounts shall be allocated on a per pupil basis to each department of education school community council or charter 10 11 school local school board in an amount not to exceed \$ 12 per pupil as determined by the department's fall enrollment 13 count or the charter school official enrollment count. 14 school community council or local school board shall expend these funds with the goal of ensuring that their school is 15 prepared for a financial audit. The department of education 16 17 shall transfer the appropriate per pupil amounts for charter schools to the charter school administrative office no later 18 19 than July 15, of each fiscal year for distribution to the 20 charter schools. 21 The sums appropriated shall be expended by the department

of education for the purposes of this section.

1 SECTION 7. There is appropriated out of the general 2 revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$, or so 3 much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2007-2008, and the same sum, or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal 4 year 2008-2009, to the department of education for the 5 6 establishment of one full-time equivalent permanent business 7 manager and training for each of the fifteen school complexes to assist schools in developing and maintaining professional 8 9 financial planning and records and such other responsibilities 10 as the chief financial officer deems appropriate. 11 The sums appropriated shall be expended by the department 12 of education for the purposes of this section. 13 SECTION 8. Statutory material to be repealed is bracketed 14 and stricken. New statutory material is underscored. SECTION 9. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2008, 15 provided that sections 5, 6, and 7 shall take effect on 16 July 1, 2007. 17 18
