A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO SCHOOL COMMUNITY COUNCILS.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- 1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that the Reinventing
- 2 Education Act of 2004, Act 51, Sessions Laws of Hawaii 2004, as
- 3 amended, holds promise to engage the parents, students, and the
- 4 community into taking greater responsibility for their schools.
- 5 The department of education established the school community
- 6 councils, developed and issued guidelines in July 2005, in which
- 7 the councils were to operate, conducted training for school
- 8 community council members, and prepared and trained their
- 9 personnel on the Weighted Student Formula-Financial Plan
- 10 Implementation Manual for the 2006-2007 school year, as revised
- 11 as of October 5, 2005.
- 12 After a year of operating under Act 51, the legislative
- 13 auditor reported in the Management Audit of Kailua High School,
- 14 Report No. 06-06, September 2006, that the function of the
- 15 school's community council needs to be clarified and membership
- 16 selection criteria should be changed to ensure greater
- 17 independence. There are other incidents, such as parents

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opposing moving the sixth grade from Manoa elementary to 2 Stevenson intermediate that demonstrate that the department of 3 education has not implemented Act 51 to reach its intent and purpose. Less public than Manoa elementary, but equally known 5 to the department was the move of the Maemae elementary school's 6 sixth grade to Kawanankoa intermediate and concerns about the 7 school's academic and financial plans. With both schools being 8 told to move their sixth grades to meet the board of education's 9 Middle Level Education Policy No. 2406, without it being 10 presented, and an academic and financial plan of the impact of 11 the school losing \$600,000, the need to review Act 51 is an immediate concern. As a result of these and other incidents, 12 13 the school communities are divided - a result that is contrary 14 to the intent and purpose of Act 51. 15 The legislature further finds that the experience of school community councils implementing Act 51 and the findings of the 16 17 legislative auditor gives reason to amend the law, and emphasize 18 the need for community involvement and clarity in the authority 19 of the school community councils. It is also evident that 20 granting clarity to the school community councils' authority means that governance over complaints should be aligned with the 21 22 board of education creating lines of communication of statewide

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education policies while maintaining the authority of the
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    principal to direct the academic achievement of the school.
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         The purpose of this Act is to clarify the roles of the
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    school community councils.
         SECTION 2. Chapter 302A, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
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    amended by adding two new definitions to be appropriately
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    inserted and to read as follows:
         ""Financial plan" means all funding related to the academic
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    plan, including: projected student state allocations under this
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    chapter, federal funds, grants and other resources, any
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    carryover funds regardless of the funding source that will be
    expended in the school year, and funds from other sources such
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    as, but not limited to, parent support, and school supported
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    fundraising activities.
         "Expenditure plan" means how the moneys in the financial
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    plan will be spent on a monthly basis in meeting the academic
    goals for direct student services, support services, and
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    allocations not included in the weighted school formula."
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         SECTION 3. Section 302A-1103, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
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    amended to read as follows:
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         "§302A-1103 Principal; authority and responsibility. The
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role of the principal shall include but not be limited to

1	SECTION 4. Section 302A-1124, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is					
2	amended to read as follows:

5	shall establish a school community council system under which					
6	each public school, excluding charter schools, shall create and					
7	maintain a school community council. Each school community					
8	council shall:

10	principal's academic plan and financial plan[, and					
11	either recommend revisions of the plans to the					
12	principal, or recommend the plans for approval by the					
13	complex area superintendent]; provided that the

15	superintendent, may set aside any decision made by the					
16	school community council pursuant to subsection (g);					
17	(2) Ensure that the school's academic and financial plans

         [<del>(a)</del>] (h) The principal shall have the authority to set
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    aside any decision made by the school community council if the
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    principal determines it to be in the best interests of the
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    school; provided that the principal notifies the school
    community council. If the school community council opposes a
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    decision of the principal, an appeal shall first be brought to
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    the complex area superintendent for resolution and, if
    necessary, to the superintendent and, finally, to the board of
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    education.
          [(h) Complex] (i) A complex area [superintendents]
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    superintendent shall chair a unified complex area school
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community council comprised of the principals within the 1 2 complex, one parent, one community representative, and one student from each school within the complex to ensure the 3 schools' academic and financial plans are consistent with the 4 educational accountability system under section 302A-1004 and to 5 6 assist the school community councils and principals within their 7 respective complex areas in: 8 (1)Obtaining the support and services of the department; 9 and 10 (2) Ensuring the progress and success of the school's academic and financial plan." 11 SECTION 5.
