A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO DOCUMENTARY EVIDENCE.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- 1 SECTION 1. Chapter 448, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is 2 amended by adding a new section to be appropriately designated 3 and to read as follows: 4 "\$448- Retention of dental records. (a) Dental records 5 may be computerized or minified by the use of microfilm or any 6 other similar photographic process; provided that the method 7 used creates an unalterable record. The dentist shall retain 8 dental records in the original or reproduced form for a minimum 9 of seven years after the last data entry except in the case of 10
- 11 minority plus seven years after the minor reaches the age of 12 majority.

minors whose records shall be retained during the period of

- 13 (b) Records exempt from the retention requirement are: 14 public health mass screening records; pupils' health records and 15 related school health room records; preschool screening program records; communicable disease reports; and mass testing 16
- 17 epidemiological projects and studies records, including

1 consents; topical fluoride application consents; psychological 2 test booklets; laboratory copies of reports, pharmacy copies of 3 prescriptions, patient medication profiles, hospital 4 nutritionists' special diet orders, and similar records retained separately from the dental record but duplicated within it; 5 6 public health nurses' case records that do not contain any 7 dentist's direct notations; social workers' case records; and diagnostic or evaluative studies for the department of education 8 9 or other state agencies. 10 (c) X-ray films, electro-encephalogram tracings, and 11 similar imaging records shall be retained for at least seven 12 years, after which they may be presented to the patient or 13 destroyed; provided that interpretations or separate reports of x-ray films, electro-encephalogram tracings, and similar imaging 14 15 records shall be subject to subsection (e). 16 (d) Dental records may be destroyed after the seven-year retention period or after minification, in a manner that will 17 18 preserve the confidentiality of the information in the record; provided that the dentist retains basic information from each 19

record destroyed. Basic information from the records of a

dentist shall include the patient's name and birthdate, a list

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    of dated diagnoses and intrusive treatments, and a record of all
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    drugs prescribed or given.
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         (e) The dentist, or the dentist's successor, shall be
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    liable for the preservation of basic information from the dental
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    record for twenty-five years after the last entry, except in the
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    case of minors, whose records shall be retained during the
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    period of minority plus twenty-five years after the minor
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    reaches the age of majority. If the dentist is succeeded by
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    another entity, the burden of compliance with this section shall
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    rest with the successor. Before a provider ceases operations,
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    the provider shall make immediate arrangements, subject to the
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    approval of the department of health, for the retention and
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    preservation of the dental records in keeping with the intent of
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    this section."
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         SECTION 2. Section 622-51, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
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    amended by amending the definition of "medical facility" to read
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    as follows:
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         ""Medical facility" means a hospital operated by a public
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    entity, a hospital licensed under chapter 321, the office of a
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medical group practice, a licensed physician's office, a

licensed dentist's office, or any other type of facility where

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- 1 medical records relating to the care or treatment of a patient
- 2 are kept."
- 3 SECTION 3. Section 622-58, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
- 4 amended by amending subsection (f) to read as follows:
- 5 "(f) For the purposes of this section, the term "health
- 6 care provider" means as defined in section 671-1[-] but also
- 7 includes a licensed dentist."
- 8 SECTION 4. Statutory material to be repealed is bracketed
- 9 and stricken. New statutory material is underscored.
- 10 SECTION 5. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2008.
