A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO TEMPORARY ASSISTANCE FOR NEEDY FAMILIES.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- 1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that according to the
- 2 National Council on Disabilities forty-four per cent of
- 3 temporary assistance for needy families recipients are
- 4 individuals with disabilities; furthermore almost twenty per
- 5 cent of temporary assistance for needy families parents are the
- 6 parents of a child with a disability. A critical need exists to
- 7 find services for temporary assistance for needy families
- 8 recipients that have the capacity to coordinate programs which
- 9 include the needs of people with disabilities along with the
- 10 needs of those for whom learning has been a lifelong struggle.
- The legislature further finds that there is a need in
- 12 Hawaii to work toward establishing linkages and strengthening
- 13 existing ties between different services for teens with
- 14 disabilities. This should include services that young parents
- 15 can use while they are teenagers which would facilitate their
- 16 transition to adulthood, such as vocational rehabilitation
- 17 services. The legislature finds there is a need to tap

- 1 temporary assistance for needy families funds to create
 2 interagency linkages that are designed to help teens meet the
- ${f 3}$ temporary assistance for needy families rules, such as,
- 4 coordination between school systems and agencies that provide
- 5 disability services. Temporary assistance for needy families
- 6 funds can also help provide service supports. For example, as
- 7 explicitly described in federal temporary assistance for needy
- 8 families guidance, a teen parent who receives supplemental
- 9 security income might be provided child care or transportation
- 10 through temporary assistance for needy families.
- 11 Some individuals with disabilities require program
- 12 modifications and support services to participate in and benefit
- 13 from education and training programs. Hawaii must work toward
- 14 assisting these individuals so that they may fulfill temporary
- 15 assistance for needy families work requirements. The need for
- 16 adequate screening and assessment is particularly acute for
- 17 applicants and recipients with disabilities as it is unlikely
- 18 that disabilities will be identified and appropriate program
- 19 placements and program supports will be provided without it.
- 20 The State should provide access to the expertise to serve
- 21 as a resource center to assist individuals with disabilities who
- 22 are unable to navigate the existing benefits application

- 1 processes or procedures for challenging sanctions and ensure the
- 2 skills and experience to further assist those who are unable to
- 3 participate in work requirements or who need exemptions from
- 4 work requirements are available.
- 5 SECTION 2. The department of human services shall
- 6 establish a three-year pilot project, beginning with fiscal year
- 7 2008-2009, to conduct and expand asset building classes
- 8 statewide to serve individuals with disabilities and parents of
- 9 children with a disability in developing skills in:
- 10 (1) Linkages with existing community resources;
- 11 (2) Assessment and training on assistive technology;
- (3) Career exploration; and
- 13 (4) Basic computer literacy.
- 14 The department of human services may enter into contracts
- 15 pursuant to chapter 103D to carry out the purposes of this Act.
- 16 SECTION 3. There is appropriated out of temporary
- 17 assistance for needy families funds the sum of \$ or so
- 18 much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2008-2009 for
- 19 the department of human services to establish a three-year pilot
- 20 project, beginning with fiscal year 2008-2009, to conduct and
- 21 expand asset building classes statewide to serve individuals

- 3 The sum appropriated shall be expended by the department of
