## A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO STATEWIDE TRAFFIC CODE.

## BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- 1 SECTION 1. According to the New York Times, some 158
- 2 billion mobile text messages were sent in the United States in
- 3 2006, an increase of almost two-fold from 2005. A study
- 4 conducted by the National Mutual Insurance Company was released
- 5 in 2007, finding that nineteen per cent of all drivers, and
- 6 thirty per cent of drivers between the ages of eighteen and
- 7 twenty-seven text message while driving. According to a study
- 8 from the Liberty Mutual Research Institute for Safety and
- 9 Students Against Destructive Decisions, teenagers say that
- 10 texting is their number one driving distraction.
- 11 A 2007 survey commissioned by the mobile messaging service
- 12 Pinger, Inc., and conducted by Harris Interactive(R), revealed
- 13 that nine out of ten or eighty-nine per cent of Americans
- 14 believe that sending text messages or emails while driving is
- 15 distracting, dangerous, and should be prohibited. The same
- 16 survey found that:

1	(1)	Ninety per cent of drivers believe that sending text
2		messages or mobile email were as dangerous as drivers
3		who had two drinks before driving;
4	(2)	Although the overwhelming majority of adults believe
5		driving while texting is dangerous, two in three
6		adults who drive a car and have used text say they
7		have read text messages or emails while they were
8		driving; and fifty-seven per cent admitted to sending
9		text messages or emails while driving.
10	The	legislature finds that sending text messages or emails
11	while dri	ving is a distraction. Texting and emailing while
12	driving n	ecessarily means that the driver's full attention is
13	not dedic	ated to the road. Research in 2006 by the National
14	Highway T	raffic Safety Administration found that nearly eight
15	per cent	of crashes and sixty-five per cent of near-crashes
16	involved	some form of driver inattention within three seconds
17	prior to	impact.
18	The	purpose of this Act is to prohibit sending text
19	messages	and emails, or reading them, while driving.
20	SECT	ION 2. Chapter 291C, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
21	amended by	y adding a new section to part XII to be appropriately

designated and to read as follows:

2	while drivi	ng a motor vehicle, shall compose, send, or read a
3	text messag	e on an electronic wireless communications device,
4	commonly kn	own as a cellular phone or similar device.
5	(d)	his section shall not apply to:
6	<u>(1)</u> A	authorized emergency vehicles;
7	<u>(2)</u> <u>C</u>	composing and sending a text message to report illegal
8	a	ctivity or to summon medical or other help in an
9	<u>e</u>	mergency situation;
10	<u>(3)</u> <u>S</u>	ending or receiving emergency alert messages;
11	<u>(4)</u> <u>M</u>	lessages related to the operation of a motor vehicle

## Report Title:

Statewide Traffic Code; Texting Prohibited

## Description:

Prohibits texting using electronic wireless communication device while driving; provides exemptions for authorized emergency vehicles, text messages to report illegal activity or to summon help in an emergency situation, emergency alert messages, messages related to the operation of a motor vehicle or an accessory component, global positioning or navigation systems permanently affixed to the vehicle.
