A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO ENHANCED 911 SERVICES FOR MOBILE PHONES.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- 1 SECTION 1. Chapter 138 requires wireless providers to
- 2 impose a surcharge on mobile phone service connections. Moneys
- 3 collected from the surcharge are deposited into the wireless
- 4 enhanced 911 fund, and are to be used to ensure cost recovery
- 5 for deployment of enhanced wireless 911 services. The
- 6 Legislature finds that the surcharge is no longer necessary
- 7 because deployment of enhanced wireless 911 services is
- 8 substantially completed. The purpose of this Act is to repeal
- 9 the surcharge.
- 10 SECTION 2. Section 138-3, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
- 11 amended to read as follows:
- 12 "[+] §138-3[+] Wireless enhanced 911 fund. There is
- 13 established outside the state treasury a special fund, to be
- 14 known as the wireless enhanced 911 fund, to be administered by
- 15 the board. [The fund shall consist of amounts collected under
- 16 section 138 4. Moneys paid into the fund are not general fund
- 17 revenues of the State.] The fund shall consist of



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- 1 appropriations made by the legislature to the fund. The board
- 2 shall place the funds in an interest-bearing account at any
- 3 federally insured financial institution, separate and apart from
- 4 the general fund of the State. Moneys in the fund shall be
- 5 expended exclusively by the board for the purposes of ensuring
- 6 adequate cost recovery for the deployment of phase I and phase
- 7 II wireless enhanced 911 service and for expenses of
- 8 administering the fund."
- 9 SECTION 3. Section 138-5, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
- 10 amended by amending subsection (b) to read as follows:
- "(b) After January 1, 2005, each wireless provider may
- 12 request reimbursement from the fund of wireless enhanced 911
- 13 commercial mobile radio service costs incurred; provided that
- 14 the costs [+
- 15 (1) Are recoverable under section 138-4(d); and
- 16 (2) Have] have not already been reimbursed to the wireless
- 17 provider from the fund. A wireless provider that has been
- 18 requested by a public safety answering point to provide phase I
- 19 or phase II wireless enhanced 911 service in a particular county
- 20 or counties, may recover wireless enhanced 911 commercial mobile
- 21 radio service costs as provided in this chapter.

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In no event shall a wireless provider be reimbursed for any
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    amount above its actual wireless enhanced 911 commercial mobile
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    radio service costs allowed to be recovered under section 138

12	SECTION 5. Section 138-4, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
13	repealed.
14	["[§138-4] Surcharge. (a) A monthly wireless enhanced
15	911 surcharge, subject to this chapter, shall be imposed upon
16	each commercial mobile radio service connection.
17	(b) The effective date of the surcharge shall be July 1,
18	2004. The rate of the surcharge shall be set at 66 cents per
19	month for each commercial mobile radio service connection. The
20	surcharge shall have uniform application and shall be imposed on
21	each commercial mobile radio service connection operating within
22	the State except:

1	(1) Connections billed to federal, state, and county
2	government entities; and
3	(2) Prepaid connections.
4	(c) All wireless providers and resellers shall bill to and
5	collect from each of their customers a monthly surcharge at the
6	rate established for each commercial mobile radio service
7	connection. The wireless provider or reseller may list the
8	surcharge as a separate line item on each bill. If a wireless
9	provider or reseller receives a partial payment for a monthly
10	bill from a commercial mobile radio service customer, the
11	wireless provider or reseller shall apply the payment against
12	the amount the customer owes the wireless provider or reseller,
13	before applying the partial payment against the surcharge.
14	(d) A wireless provider that:
15	(1) Is collecting the surcharge and remitting appropriate
16	portions of the surcharge to the fund pursuant to this
17	chapter; and
18	(2) Has been requested by a public safety answering point
19	to provide phase I or phase II wireless enhanced 911
20	service in a particular county or counties,
21	may recover wireless enhanced 911 commercial mobile radio
22	service costs as provided in this chapter.



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(e) Each wireless provider or reseller may retain two per
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    cent of the amount of surcharges collected to offset
    administrative expenses associated with billing and collecting
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    the surcharge.
         (f) A wireless provider or reseller shall remit to the
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    wireless enhanced 911 fund, within sixty days after the end of
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    the calendar month in which the surcharge is collected, an
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    amount that represents the surcharges collected less amounts
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    retained for administrative expenses incurred by the wireless
    provider or reseller, as provided in subsection (e).
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         (g) The surcharges collected by the wireless provider or
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    reseller pursuant to this section shall not be subject to any
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    tax, fee, or assessment, nor are they considered revenue of the
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    provider or reseller.
         (h) Each customer who is subject to this chapter shall be
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    liable to the State for the surcharge until it has been paid to
    the wireless provider. Wireless providers shall have no
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    liability to remit surcharges that have not been paid by
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    customers. A wireless provider or reseller shall have no
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    obligation to take any legal action to enforce the collection of
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    the surcharge for which any customer is billed. However, the
    board may initiate a collection action against the customer. If
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1	the board prevails in such a collection action, reasonable
2	attorney's fees and costs shall be awarded.
3	(i) At any time the members deem it necessary and
4	appropriate, the board may meet to make recommendations to the
5	legislature as to whether the surcharge and fund should be
6	discontinued, continued as is, or amended.
7	(j) When considering whether to discontinue, continue as
8	is, or amend the fund or surcharge, the board's recommendations
9	shall be based on the latest available information concerning
10	costs associated with providing wireless enhanced 911 service in
11	accordance with the Federal Communications Commission order."]
12	SECTION 6. Statutory material to be repealed is bracketed
13	and stricken. New statutory material is underscored.
14	SECTION 7. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2008.
