A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO DISASTER PREPAREDNESS.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- 1 SECTION 1. The devastating effects of Hurricane Katrina
- 2 revealed severe shortcomings of the health care system serving
- 3 the residents of the Gulf Coast. And while the earthquake that
- 4 shook Hawaii on October 15, 2006, did not cause severe damage,
- 5 it underscored the need to assess the ability of Hawaii's health
- 6 care system to withstand natural disasters.
- 7 The Office of Domestic Preparedness of the Department of
- 8 Homeland Security issued a directive to each state requiring
- 9 each state to assess its ability to evacuate and shelter
- 10 residents in the event of a disaster. Of particular concern
- 11 were the special populations served by hospitals and long-term
- 12 care facilities.
- 13 The Katrina experience demonstrated that smaller
- 14 residential health care facilities on the Gulf Coast, such as
- 15 nursing homes, were not constructed to withstand strong winds.
- 16 Hawaii is in a similar situation. Discussions with nursing home
- 17 executives revealed that they were uncertain whether their

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- 1 facilities could resist the effects of a hurricane. Most felt
- 2 they would be compelled to evacuate their residents because of
- 3 this uncertainty. However, the availability of shelters that
- 4 are specially designed for nursing home residents is
- 5 insufficient.
- 6 Although state officials are currently working to establish
- 7 special needs shelters and to improve evacuation procedures,
- 8 they concede that the number of actual and potential shelters
- 9 are inadequate to house and protect the large numbers of
- 10 possible evacuees.
- 11 The evacuation of nursing home residents should be
- 12 considered only after all other options have been explored.
- 13 Enabling nursing homes to "shelter in place" their residents and
- 14 staff is the preferred alternative, because it eliminates any
- 15 risks resulting from transportation and does not use scarce
- 16 emergency shelter resources. However, this option requires
- 17 confidence in the structural integrity of a nursing home.
- 18 Hospitals are typically more prepared to address disasters
- 19 than nursing homes. For example, hospitals have comprehensive
- 20 plans that will be implemented in the event of a pandemic or
- 21 terrorist attack. However, the Katrina experience underscores

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- 1 the need to assess hospital facilities as well as to determine
- 2 their ability to withstand hurricanes.
- 3 The purpose of this Act is to fund a study to assess the
- 4 structural integrity of each hospital and nursing home facility
- 5 in Hawaii.
- 6 SECTION 2. The department of health shall undertake a
- 7 study to assess the structural integrity of all hospitals and
- 8 nursing homes in Hawaii. The assessment shall be conducted by
- 9 registered professional engineers qualified to conduct
- 10 structural analysis and knowledgeable in the effects of
- 11 hurricanes. The assessment shall include rating each facility
- 12 based on its ability to survive the likely effects of hurricanes
- 13 in categories I, II, III, IV, and V and earthquakes as strong as
- 14 magnitude 8.5.
- 15 Information derived from the assessment shall be provided
- 16 to facility owners and operators and used to support risk-based
- 17 disaster plans. The information shall also be provided to local
- 18 and state civil defense officials and used to support evacuation
- 19 decisions. A summary of the assessment shall be provided to the
- 20 legislature not later than twenty days prior to the convening of
- 21 the regular session of 2009.

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- 1 SECTION 3. There is appropriated out of the general
- 2 revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$2,000,000 or so much
- 3 thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2008-2009 for a
- 4 study to assess the structural integrity of all hospitals and
- 5 nursing homes in Hawaii.
- 6 The sum appropriated shall be expended by the department of
- 7 health for the purposes of this Act.
- 8 SECTION 4. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2008.
