A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO HA'IKU VALLEY.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- 1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that Ha'iku valley on Oahu
- 2 is of significant cultural and historic importance to the native
- 3 people of Hawaii. Ha'iku valley is renowned for its
- 4 archaeological remains and other cultural and historic sites,
- 5 including lo'i, sacred sites, and burial sites. The valley is
- 6 also home to many species of native and endangered flora and
- 7 fauna. Preserving the valley's cultural, historic, and natural
- 8 resources and educating the public about these resources are of
- 9 paramount importance.
- 10 The legislature further finds that ownership of the valley
- 11 is segmented among several entities. The valley's segmented
- 12 ownership and limited stewardship have placed its cultural and
- 13 historic resources at high risk. Adequate management of the
- 14 valley and appropriate access to the valley, have proven
- 15 elusive.
- 16 The purpose of this Act is to establish the Ha'iku valley
- 17 cultural preserve commission, which shall have policy and



- 1 management oversight of the Ha'iku valley cultural preserve. The
- 2 establishment of the commission will provide a system that
- 3 recognizes the valley's unique challenges and preserves in
- 4 perpetuity its cultural and historic resources for the people of
- 5 Hawaii.
- 6 SECTION 2. The Hawaii Revised Statutes is amended by
- 7 adding a new chapter to be appropriately designated and to read
- 8 as follows:
- 9 "CHAPTER
- 10 HA'IKU VALLEY CULTURAL PRESERVE
- 11 § -1 Administration of chapter. The Ha'iku valley
- 12 cultural preserve commission and the office of Hawaiian affairs
- 13 shall administer this chapter.
- 14 § -2 Definitions. As used in this chapter, unless the
- 15 context otherwise requires:
- "Commission" means the Ha'iku valley cultural preserve
- 17 commission.
- 18 "Department" means the department of land and natural
- 19 resources.
- 20 "Office" means the office of Hawaiian affairs.
- 21 "Valley cultural preserve" means the area designated as
- 22 Ha'iku valley.

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1 -3 Reservation of uses. (a) The Ha'iku valley 2 cultural preserve shall be used solely and exclusively for the 3 following purposes: Preservation and practice of all rights customarily 4 (1)and traditionally exercised by native Hawaiians for 5 cultural, spiritual, and subsistence purposes; 6 7 (2) Preservation and protection of the area's cultural, 8 archaeological, historical, and environmental 9 resources; 10 Rehabilitation, revegetation, habitat restoration, and (3) 11 preservation; 12 (4)Education; and 13 (5) Other purposes as determined by the commission. The valley shall be reserved in perpetuity for the 14 (b) uses enumerated in this section. Commercial uses shall be 15 16 strictly prohibited. 17 Powers and duties. The office and other 18 departments and agencies of the State shall be subject to the 19 oversight of the commission with regard to the control and management of the valley cultural preserve. Subject to section 20 -6, the office shall: 21

1	(1)	Implement controls and permitted uses for the valley
2		cultural preserve;
3	(2)	Enforce this chapter;
4	(3)	Provide administrative support to the commission; and
5	(4)	Authorize those of its employees as it deems
6		reasonable and necessary to serve and execute warrants
7		and arrest offenders or issue citations in all matters
8		relating to enforcement of the laws and rules
9		applicable to the valley cultural preserve.
10	\$	-5 Commission. (a) There is established the Ha'iku
11	valley cu	ltural preserve commission to be placed within the
12	office of	Hawaiian affairs for administrative purposes as
13	provided	in section 26-35. The commission shall consist of
14	seven mem	pers to be appointed in the manner and to serve for the
15	terms pro	vided in section 26-34; provided that:
16	(1)	One member shall be a member of the Koʻolau Foundation
17	(2)	Two members shall be appointed by the governor from a
18		list provided by the Ko'olaupoko Hawaiian Civic Club;
19	(3)	One member shall be a representative of the office of
20		Hawaiian affairs;
21	(4)	One member shall be an official of the city and county
22		of Honolulu appointed by the governor from a list of

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1		nominees provided by the mayor of the city and county
2		of Honolulu;
3	(5)	One member shall be a representative of the board of
4		land and natural resources; and
5	(6)	One member shall be appointed by the governor from a
6		list provided by native Hawaiian organizations with a
7		historical relationship with the ahupua'a in which
8		Ha'iku valley is located.
9	(b)	The chairperson shall be elected from among the
10	members of	f the commission, by the members of the commission.
11	(c)	The members of the commission shall serve without pay
12	but shall	be reimbursed for their actual and necessary expenses
13	including	travel expenses, incurred in carrying out their
14	duties.	
15	· (d)	Any action taken by the commission shall be approved
16	by a simpl	le majority of its members. Four members shall
17	constitute	e a quorum to do business.
18	(e)	The commission, without regard to the requirements of
19	chapter 76	6, may hire employees necessary to perform its duties.
20	§ -	-6 Responsibilities and duties of the commission. The

general administration of the valley cultural preserve shall

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1	rest with	the commission. In carrying out its duties and
2	responsib	ilities, the commission:
3	(1)	Shall establish criteria, policies, and controls for
4		permissible uses within the valley cultural preserve;
5	(2)	Shall approve all contracts for services and rules
6		pertaining to the valley cultural preserve;
7	(3)	Shall provide advice to the office, the governor, the
8		department, and other departments and agencies on any
9		matter relating to the valley cultural preserve;
10	(4)	Shall provide advice to the office of planning and the
11		department of the attorney general on any matter
12		relating to the conveyance of Ha'iku valley to the
13		office;
14	(5)	May enter into curator or stewardship agreements with
15		appropriate Hawaiian cultural and spiritual community
16		organizations for the perpetuation of native Hawaiian
17		cultural, religious, and subsistence customs, beliefs,
18		and practices for the purposes stated in section
19		-3;
20	(6)	Shall carry out those powers and duties otherwise
21		conferred upon the board of land and natural resources
22		and the land use commission with regard to

1		dispositions and approvals pertaining to the valley
2		cultural preserve. All powers and duties of the board
3	•	of land and natural resources and the land use
4		commission concerning dispositions and approvals
5		pertaining to the valley cultural preserve shall be
6		transferred to the commission;
7	(7)	Shall carry out those powers and duties concerning the
8		valley cultural preserve otherwise conferred upon the
9		city and county of Honolulu by chapter 205A;
10	(8)	Shall carry out those powers and duties concerning the
11		valley cultural preserve otherwise conferred upon the
12		island burial councils and the department of land and
13		natural resources with regard to proper treatment of
14		burial sites and human skeletal remains found in the
15		valley preserve;
16	(9)	Shall adopt rules in accordance with chapter 91 that
17		are necessary for the purposes of this chapter and
18		shall maintain a record of its proceedings and
19		actions;
20	(10)	May delegate to the executive director or employees of
21		the commission, by formal commission action, such
22		power and authority vested in the commission by this

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              chapter as the commission deems reasonable and proper
              for the effective administration of this chapter; and
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        (11) May solicit and accept grants, donations, and
              contributions for deposit into the Ha'iku valley
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              cultural preserve trust fund to support the purposes
              of this chapter.
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                 Farming. Section
                                      -3 notwithstanding, the
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    commission shall adopt rules pursuant to chapter 91 to permit
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    farming activities in the valley cultural preserve that are
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    consistent with the purpose of this chapter and that take into
    consideration the health and safety of the general public.
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             -8 Penalty. Any person who violates any of the laws
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    or rules applicable to the valley cultural preserve shall be
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    quilty of a petty misdemeanor and shall be fined not more than
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    $1,000 or imprisoned not more than thirty days, or both, for
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    each offense. Each day of each violation shall be deemed a
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    separate offense.
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             -9 General administrative penalties. (a)
                                                          Except as
    otherwise provided by law, the commission is authorized to set,
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    charge, and collect administrative fines, or bring legal action
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    to recover administrative costs of the commission or the
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    department, or payment for damages, or for the cost to correct
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- 1 damages resulting from a violation of this chapter or any rule
- 2 adopted hereunder. The administrative fines shall be as
- 3 follows:
- 4 (1) For a first violation, a fine of not more than
- \$10,000;
- 6 (2) For a second violation within five years of a previous
- 7 violation, by a fine of not more than \$15,000; and
- **8** (3) For a third or subsequent violation within five years
- 9 of the last violation, by a fine of not more than
- 10 \$25,000.
- (b) In addition, an administrative fine of up to \$5,000
- 12 may be levied for each specimen of natural resource or any
- 13 historic property taken, killed, injured, broken, or damaged in
- 14 violation of any rule adopted under this chapter. For purposes
- 15 of this section, "natural resource" includes any archaeological
- 16 artifacts, minerals, any aquatic life or wildlife or parts
- 17 thereof, including their eggs, and any land plants or parts
- 18 thereof, including seeds. Also for purposes of this section,
- 19 "historic property" means any building, structure, object,
- 20 district, landscape, area, or site, including heiau and
- 21 underwater sites, that is over fifty years old.

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
- (c) Any criminal penalty for any violation of this chapter 1 2 or any rule adopted under this chapter shall not be deemed to preclude the commission from bringing a civil legal action to 3 recover additional administrative fines and costs. Any civil 4 5 legal action against a person to recover administrative fines 6 and costs for any violation of this chapter or any rule adopted under this chapter shall not be deemed to preclude the State 7 from pursuing any criminal action against that person. 8 9 In any judicial proceeding to recover an 10 administrative penalty imposed, the commission need only show that notice was given, that a hearing was held or the time 11 12 granted for requesting a hearing has run without such a request,
- S -10 Administrative violation system. With the mutual consent of both the commission and the department, the commission may use the civil natural resource violations system of the department of land and natural resources; provided that the commission shall act whenever the board is authorized to act, to process violations of this chapter or any rules adopted hereunder.

1	\$	-11 Transfer. Upon its conveyance to the office, the
2	resources	and waters of the valley cultural preserve shall be
3	held in t	rust by the office as part of the public land trust;
4	provided	that the office shall transfer management and control
5	of the va	lley cultural preserve to a sovereign native Hawaiian
6	entity up	on its recognition by the United States and the State.
7	All	terms, conditions, agreements, and laws affecting the
8	valley sh	all remain in effect unless expressly terminated.
9	\$	-12 Ha'iku valley cultural preserve trust fund. (a)
10	There is	created in the state treasury a trust fund to be
11	designate	d as the Ha'iku valley cultural preserve trust fund to
12	be admini	stered by the office with the prior approval of the
13	commissio	n. Subject to this chapter:
14	(1)	All moneys received from the federal government for
15		purposes consistent with this chapter;
16	(2)	Any moneys appropriated by the legislature to the
17		trust fund;
18	(3)	Any moneys received from grants, donations, or the
19		proceeds from contributions; and
20	(4)	The interest or return on investments earned from
21		moneys in the trust fund;

- 1 shall be deposited in the trust fund and shall be used to
- 2 fulfill the purposes of this chapter.
- 3 (b) The commission may use moneys in the trust fund to
- 4 carry out the purposes of this chapter, including hiring
- 5 employees, specialists, and consultants necessary to complete
- 6 projects related to the purposes of this chapter.
- 7 (c) Moneys deposited into or appropriated to the trust
- 8 fund shall remain available until they are obligated or until
- 9 the trust fund is terminated.
- 10 (d) If the trust fund is terminated, all funds shall be
- 11 transferred to the general fund; provided that all unexpended or
- 12 unencumbered balances shall be disbursed in accordance with any
- 13 requirements set by funding sources and for purposes consistent
- 14 with this chapter.
- 15 (e) The commission shall submit an annual report on the
- 16 status of the Ha'iku valley cultural preserve trust fund to the
- 17 legislature, no later than twenty days prior to the convening of
- 18 each regular session. The annual report shall include the total
- 19 number of and amount of grants, donations, and contributions
- 20 received and balances remaining on June 30 of each year.
- 21 § -13 Severability. If any provision of this chapter or
- 22 the application thereof to any person or circumstance is held



- 1 invalid, the invalidity shall not affect other provisions or
- 2 applications of this chapter that can be given effect without
- 3 the invalid provision or application, and to this end the
- 4 provisions of this chapter are severable."
- 5 SECTION 3. The office of planning and the department of
- 6 the attorney general, after consulting with the Ha'iku valley
- 7 cultural preserve commission, are authorized to initiate the
- 8 conveyance of all of Ha'iku valley in fee simple to the office of
- 9 Hawaiian affairs; provided that before the valley is conveyed to
- 10 the office, agreements shall be executed with respect to
- 11 liability, monetary resources, and removal of hazardous wastes.
- 12 SECTION 4. There is appropriated out of the general
- 13 revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ or so
- 14 much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2008-2009 for
- 15 the purposes of this Act, including but not limited to the
- 16 acquisition of Ha'iku valley by the office of Hawaiian affairs.
- 17 The sum appropriated shall be expended by the office of
- 18 Hawaiian affairs for the purposes of this Act.
- 19 SECTION 5. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2050.
