A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO EDUCATION.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- SECTION 1. The legislature finds that every school day,
- 2 each student throughout the State of Hawaii produces about half
- 3 a pound of waste. This unnecessary amount of waste is then
- 4 transported at a fee to Hawaii landfills such as Waimanalo
- 5 gulch, which are approaching, or have already reached, capacity.
- 6 With schools using up to 31,000 cubic yards of landfill space
- 7 every month at a cost of \$6 per cubic yard, the lack of
- 8 comprehensive school recycling programs is costing the State up
- 9 to \$186,000 per month for Hawaii schools to have their trash
- 10 picked up and disposed of at landfills. School recycling
- 11 programs would reduce unnecessary spending on waste disposal and
- 12 alleviate some of the spatial issues that landfills in Hawaii
- 13 are currently facing.
- 14 The Long Beach Unified School District, located in Los
- 15 Angeles County, California, has adopted a recycling program that
- 16 recycles solid waste, food waste, paper, aluminum, glass,
- 17 plastic, and other materials, and will reduce its spending by

- 1 \$310,000 per year. Hawaii can also benefit from a similar
- 2 recycling program that could use compost from recycled food and
- 3 green waste to fertilize plants, grass, and fields, save schools
- 4 thousands in disposal fees, and teach students the importance of
- 5 recycling habits that they could continue throughout their
- 6 lives.
- 7 It is said that for every ton of paper that is recycled,
- 8 7,000 gallons of water, 380 gallons of oil, and enough
- 9 electricity to power a house for six months are conserved;
- 10 recycling a single aluminum can reportedly conserves enough
- 11 energy to power a television for six hours. Aside from the
- 12 financial benefits schools would acquire, establishing
- 13 comprehensive school recycling programs would also benefit the
- 14 environment in which we all live.
- 15 For the foregoing reasons, the purpose of this Act is to
- 16 enact one of the recommendations from the thirty-fifth secondary
- 17 student conference that was held on Oahu between November 28
- 18 and 30, 2007. The conference recommended that the department of
- 19 education create a task force to evaluate comprehensive
- 20 recycling options available to schools, including but not
- 21 limited to a detailed cost benefit analysis related to the

- 1 establishment of a school recycling program in the State of
- 2 Hawaii.
- 3 SECTION 2. (a) There shall be established within the
- 4 University of Hawaii, college of social services public policy
- 5 center a task force to conduct a comprehensive evaluation of the
- 6 recycling options available to schools, including but not
- 7 limited to a detailed cost-benefit analysis related to the
- 8 establishment of recycling programs, the use of reverse vending
- 9 machines, and the feasibility of providing recycling bins in
- 10 schools throughout the State of Hawaii.
- 11 (b) The dean of the college of social sciences shall
- 12 appoint task force members without regard to section 26-34,
- 13 Hawaii Revised Statutes, based on lists of candidates submitted
- 14 by the department of education, the board of education, and the
- 15 Hawaii state student council; provided that at least two task
- 16 force members shall be students.
- 17 (c) Members shall serve without compensation, other than
- 18 the reasonable reimbursement for travel-related costs.
- (d) The task force shall submit a report to the
- 20 legislature, including its findings, recommendations, and any
- 21 proposed legislation, no later than twenty days prior to the
- 22 convening of the regular session of 2009.



- 1 (e) The task force shall cease to exist on June 30, 2009.
- 2 SECTION 3. There is appropriated out of the general
- 3 revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ or so
- 4 much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2008-2009 to
- 5 carry out the operations of the task force that are consistent
- 6 with this Act.
- 7 The sum appropriated shall be expended by the University of
- 8 Hawaii college of social science public policy center for the
- 9 purposes of this Act.
- 10 SECTION 4. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2008.
