S.B. NO. 2821

A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO EDUCATION.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

The legislature finds that stability is a 1 SECTION 1. serious issue facing Hawaii's foster children. It further finds 2 that foster children suffer educational setbacks due to frequent 3 changes in school placement. Foster children may change schools 4 5 many times during a single school year due to changing placements in foster homes. Each time a child moves from one 6 school to another, the child must adapt to new personnel, new 7 subject matter, and new students, while having to adjust to a 8 9 new home environment at the same time.

10 The purpose of this Act is to remedy this situation by 11 providing educational stability for foster children, regardless 12 of situations within their biological or foster families.

13 Specifically, this Act:

14 (1) Requires decisions made on where a child will be 15 enrolled for school be based on the best interests of 16 the child;



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Requires that foster children, including those living 1 (2)outside the geographic area of the school district, 2 receive services comparable to those for children 3 living within the school district; and 4 5 (3) Appropriates funds for school transportation services 6 for foster children. SECTION 2. Section 302A-1143, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is 7 8 amended to read as follows: 9 "§302A-1143 Attend school in what district. (a) All persons of school age shall be required to attend the school of 10 the district in which they reside, unless enrolled in a Hawaiian 11 language medium education program, or unless it appears to the 12 13 department to be in the best interests of the child or otherwise 14 desirable to allow the attendance of pupils at a school in some 15 other district, in which case the department may grant this 16 permission [-,] in accordance with subsections (b) and (c). (b) In making a determination of where a child should be 17 enrolled, the department shall presume it is in the child's best 18 19 interests to: 20 Keep the child in the child's school of origin until (1) 21 the end of the school year or, for high school



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1		students, until completion of the twelfth grade, to
2		the extent feasible; and
3	(2)	Follow the wishes of the child, to the extent
4		feasible.
5	(C)	Foster children, including those living outside the
6	geographi	c area of the school district, shall receive services
7	comparabl	e to those for children living within the school
8	district,	including:
9	(1)	Transportation services, including supervised
10		transportation to school from the child's foster home;
11	(2)	Tutoring services;
12	(3)	Counseling services; and
13	(4)	Extracurricular activity opportunities.
14	(d)	For the purposes of this section:
15	"Fos	ter child" means a child who has been removed from the
16	care of t	he child's parents and has been placed into foster care
17	or permane	ent custody by the department of human services
18	pursuant	to chapter 587.
19	"Scho	ool of origin" means the school that a child was
20	attending	when the child was removed from the care of the
21	child's pa	arents and placed into foster care or permanent custody



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1	by the department of human services; or the school that a child
2	was attending when the child's foster placement was changed."
3	SECTION 3. There is appropriated or authorized from
4	temporary assistance for needy families funds the sum of \$
5	or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2008-2009
6	to provide foster children, even those living outside the
7	geographic area of the school district, with school
8	transportation services comparable to those for children living
9	within the school district.
10	The sum appropriated shall be expended by the department of
11	education for the purposes of this Act.
12	SECTION 4. Statutory material to be repealed is bracketed
13	and stricken. New statutory material is underscored.
14	SECTION 5. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2008.

Foster Children; School Placement; School Transportation

Description:

Provides educational stability for foster children by requiring decisions made on where a child will be enrolled for school be based on the best interests of the child. Requires that foster children, including those living outside the geographic area of the school district, receive services comparable to those for children living within the school district. Appropriates funds for school transportation services for foster children.
