A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO THE FIRST-TO-WORK PROGRAM.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1	SECTION 1. Chapter 346, part XI, Hawaii Revised Statutes,
2	is amended to read as follows:
3	"[+]PART XI.[+] [JOB OPPORTUNITIES AND BASIC SKILLS (JOBS)
4	PROGRAM] FIRST-TO-WORK PROGRAM
5	[+]§346-261[+] [JOBS+] First-To-Work; establishment;
6	purpose. There is established a mandatory work program for
7	certain applicants and recipients of [aid to families with
8	dependent children (AFDC) temporary assistance for needy
9	families and temporary assistance for other needy families
10	consistent with federal regulations and requirements under
11	[Title IV F of the Social Security Act, Public Law 100 485.]
12	Title IV-A of the Social Security Act, 42 United States Code
13	Section 601 et seq. The purposes of the [job opportunities and
14	basic skills (JOBS) first-to-work program shall be to
15	encourage, assist, and require [AFDC] temporary assistance for
16	needy families and temporary assistance for other needy families
17	applicants and recipients to fulfill their responsibilities to
18	support their children by preparing for, accepting, and
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1	retaining	employment. [To assure that needy individuals or
2	families a	are provided the means to avoid long term welfare
3	dependenc	y, JOBS is intended to:
4	(1)	Provide individuals with the opportunity to acquire
5		the basic education and skills necessary to qualify
6		for employment;
7	(2)	Provide necessary supportive services, including but
8		not limited to transitional child care and medical
9		assistance, so that recipients can participate in the
10		work program and accept employment; and
11	(3)	Coordinate job services at all levels of government to
12		facilitate access to a wide range of services and
13		maximize the use of existing resources.]
14	The depart	tment shall adopt rules consistent with the
15	requiremen	nts of Title IV-A of the Social Security Act, 42 United
16	States Coo	de Section 601 et seq., and in accordance with chapter
17	91 for the	e purposes of this part.
18	[{\$3 4	16-262] Eligible participants; priority target groups.
19	(a) All c	applicants for and recipients of AFDC shall be required
20	to registe	er and participate in the program; provided that
21	exemptions	consistent with federal requirements are applied.

1	(b)	The priority target groups under the JOBS program may
2	include i	ndividuals who:
3	(1)	Are receiving AFDC and have received such aid for any
4		thirty six of the preceding sixty months;
5	(2)	Are applying for AFDC and have received such aid for
6		any thirty six of the sixty months immediately
7		preceding the most recent month for which application
8		has been made;
9	(3)	Are custodial parents under the age of twenty-four
10		years;
11	(4)	Are members of a family in which the youngest child is
12		within two years of being ineligible for AFDC because
13		of age.
14	(e)	Exempt applicants for and recipients of AFDC and
15	state fun	ded public assistance programs may volunteer to
16	participa	te in the program.
17	(d)	The department shall not be required to provide
18	services	to all eligible participants, if necessary resources
19	are not a	vailable, provided that:
20	(1)	Participants not offered specific services due to lack
21		of resources shall be placed on inactive status until
22		these services are available; and

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         (2) Any participant placed on inactive status due to lack
              of resources shall not incur any negative sanctions as
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              a result of that placement.
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         (e) The department may establish quotas for the target
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    groups under this program to reflect the priorities of this
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    section.
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         [5346-263] Program components. The activities and
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    components of the JOBS program may include, but are not limited
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    to the following:
         (1) Assessment and identification of barriers to
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              participation;
         (2) Development of a supportive service plan to remove
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              barriers:
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         (3) Employability planning, including career path
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              <del>development;</del>
         (4) Basic and higher education, including remedial
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              education and English proficiency to help participants
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              become job ready];
         (5) Job skills training;
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         (6) Job readiness and job search;
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         (7) Job placement activities and services;
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         (8) Work maturity;

4	[5346-	264] Assessment. An initial assessment of each
5	participant	shall determine priority for participation in JOBS.
6	A comprehen	sive assessment may follow to determine barriers to
7	participati	on in the program and may include, but is not limited
8	to:	
9	(1) A	review of the family circumstances to identify
10	S	ocial and health problems and needs; and
11	(2) I	dentification of child care, transportation, and
12	Ð	ther supportive services needs.
13	[\$346-	265] Support service plan. Where barriers have been
14	identified	during the assessment phase, the department, in
15	consultatio	n with the participant, shall develop a supportive
16	service pla	n describing services or tasks to be completed for
17	removing or	controlling barriers which constrain participation
18	in employme	nt, training, or education.
19	[\$346-	266] Employability planning. Under this component,
20	the departm	ent shall assess the participant's skills, knowledge,
21	capability,	and capacity for permanent employment in general and
22	in specific	professions, occupations, or vocations; offer
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),	guiannee-	and counseling to establish career goals and develop
2	career pa	ths; and, with the assistance and agreement of the
3	participa	nt, establish and approve a specific employability plan
4	which may	-include job-placement, job training, and education.
5	[\$34	6-267] Case management. The department may provide to
6	a partici	pant case management services to support and strengthen
7	the parti	cipant's capacity to become self supporting and to
8	facilitat	e access to resources and opportunities required for
9	self-supp	ort. Case management activities may include, but are
10	not-limit	ed-to:
11	(1)	Facilitating activities and services needed by a
12		recipient who is working toward the goal of self-
13		sufficiency,
14	(2)	Assisting the individual and the family to obtain
15		services needed to assure effective participation in
16		the program;
17	(3)	Facilitating communication between the participant and
18		service providers;
19	(4)	Providing initial support, assessment, and referral to
20		appropriate services; and

1	(5) Monitoring the participant's program participation
2	progress to ensure that the individual receives
3	required assistance in a timely and effective manner.
4	[§346-268] Child care. The department may provide child
5	care services to eligible families to allow participation in
6	education, training, and employment in accordance with federal
7	regulations and requirements; provided that the department:
8	(1) Shall ensure that care arrangements for children meet
9	applicable standards of state law; and
10	(2) May pay for child care services up to the amount
11	consistent with the department's payment standard.
12	[\$346-269] Transportation assistance. (a) The department
13	may provide transportation assistance that is necessary to
14	enable an individual to participate in the JOBS program. The
15	assistance may include the cost of transportation of the
16	participant and participant's child, if necessary.
17	(b) The determination of whether the transportation
18	services to be used are necessary and economical shall be the
19	decision of the department upon consultation with the
20	participant.
21	(c) Transportation assistance may be provided through bus
22	passes, mileage reimbursements equivalent to the public
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1	employees	' contract negotiations, and other appropriate means of
2	transport	ation to be determined by the department with the
3	involveme	nt and agreement of the participant.
4	(d)	The department may provide assistance with air fare
5	cost, on	a limited basis and as funds permit, to eligible
6	individua	ls living on Molokai, Lanai, and West Hawaii to travel
7	to anothe	r island to receive appropriate training not available
8	in these	locations. Assistance with this cost shall be based on
9	the indiv	idual's employability plan and availability of
10	employmen	t in the individual's place of residence.
11	[\$34	6-270] Other support services. The department may
12	provide o	ther supportive services, such as counseling for
13	personal	and family related problems, and for one time training
14	and work	related expenses, to allow eligible individuals to
15	participa	te in education, training, and employment. The
16	departmen	t may:
17	(1)	Provide health and social services to eligible
18		individuals and families with identified needs to
19		assist them in removing or controlling any barriers to
20		successful participation in the program.
21	(2)	Establish separate emergency funds to meet the one
22		time training and work related expenses necessary to

1	arrow individuals to participate in the program. The
2	items to be paid for by the emergency fund may
3	include, but are not limited to, initial work
4	elothing, work tools, safety equipment, dental and
5	medical procedures not covered under the medical
6	assistance program, rental and utility deposits not
7	available through the welfare grant, and limited
8	assistance with auto repairs.
9	[§346-271] Incentive benefits. The department may provide
10	incentive benefits for recipients who work full time under an
11	employability plan by providing supplemental benefits up to one
12	hundred per cent of the poverty standard.
13	[§346-272] Transitional benefits. The department may
14	provide transitional child care and medical benefits to those
15	families whose eligibility for AFDC has been discontinued due to
16	employment. Transitional assistance shall be provided in
17	accordance with federal regulations and requirements, and shall
18	be arranged and developed with the involvement and approval of
19	the participant.
20	[\$346-273] Coordination. The department shall coordinate
21	the JOBS program with education, employment, health, and other

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    related services programs to assist participants in becoming
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    self-sufficient.
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         $346-274 Contracts. The department may contract with a
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    public agency or private nonprofit organization to administer
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    all or portions of this part in accordance with federal
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    regulations and in accordance with chapter 42D.
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         [§346-275] Rules. The department shall adopt rules
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    consistent with federal JOBS program requirements and in
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    accordance with chapter 91 for the purposes of this part.
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         [$346-276] Duties. The department shall monitor and
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    evaluate the JOBS program, and shall, among other analyses,
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    identify factors that facilitate or make difficult the
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    implementation of this [part]. The department shall also assess
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    the impact of the program with regard to encouraging AFDC
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    recipients in finding employment and avoiding long term welfare
    dependency. The department shall collect and provide all data
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    relevant to its assessment.
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         The department shall submit annual status reports on its
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    findings to the legislature prior to the convening of the
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    regular session of each year, starting with the regular session
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    of 1991-1"
