A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO HAWAII HEALTH SYSTEMS CORPORATION BACKGROUND CHECKS.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- 1 SECTION 1. SECTION 1. Chapter 323F, Hawaii Revised
- 2 Statutes, is amended by adding a new section to be appropriately
- 3 designated and to read as follows:
- 4 "§323F- Criminal history record checks. (a) The Hawaii
- 5 health systems corporation shall develop procedures for
- 6 obtaining verifiable information regarding the criminal history
- 7 of persons who are employed or seeking employment, or are
- 8 current or prospective contractors, providers or volunteers in
- 9 any of the corporation's health facilities. The procedures shall
- 10 include but not be limited to criminal history record checks in
- 11 accordance with section 846-2.7.
- The Hawaii criminal justice data center may assess
- 13 providers and contractors a reasonable fee for criminal history
- 14 record checks performed. Providers and contractors shall be
- 15 responsible for payment to the Hawaii criminal justice data
- 16 center of the fee for the criminal history records checks.

Except as otherwise specified, any person who is 1 (b) employed or who seeks employment with Hawaii health systems 2 corporation, or is a current or prospective contractor, 3 provider, or volunteer in any of the corporation's health 4 facilities may be required to provide to the corporation: 5 (1) A sworn statement indicating whether or not the 6 person has ever been convicted of an offense for 7 which incarceration was a sentencing option, and 8 9 the details thereof; Written consent for the corporation to obtain criminal (2) 10 history record check information for verification; and 11 Written consent to be fingerprinted for the purpose 12 (3) of a criminal history record check. 13 Information obtained pursuant to subsection (a) and this 14 subsection shall be used exclusively by the Hawaii health 15 systems corporation for the purposes of determining whether a 16 17 person is suitable for working or providing services in any of the corporation's health facilities. All such decisions shall be 18 subject to federal laws and regulations currently or hereafter 19 20 in effect. (c) Any Hawaii health systems corporation employee, 21 applicant for employment, or current or prospective contractor, 22

- 1 provider, or volunteer, who has been convicted of a criminal
- 2 offense for which incarceration is a sentencing option, may be
- 3 terminated, not hired, released, or not be utilized. This
- 4 action will be based on the corporation's analysis of whether
- 5 the nature and circumstances of the crime may pose a risk to the
- 6 health, safety, or well-being of patients and residents in its
- 7 health facilities.
- 8 (d) For the purposes of this section:
- 9 "Contractor" means any organization or individual that
- 10 enters into a contract or agreement to provide services to the
- 11 patients or residents in any of the Hawaii health systems
- 12 corporation's health facilities.
- "Criminal history record check" means an examination of an
- 14 individual's criminal history records by means including, but
- 15 not limited to, fingerprint analysis and name inquiry into state
- 16 and national criminal history record files.
- "Provider" means any organization or individual that
- 18 currently provides or intends to enter into a contract or
- 19 agreement to provide services to the patients or residents in
- 20 any of the Hawaii health systems corporation's health facilities,

or is a student in any program at any of Hawaii health systems 1 corporation's health facilities. 2 3 (e) Notwithstanding any other law to the contrary, for purposes of this section, the Hawaii health systems corporation 4 shall be exempt from section 831-3.1 and need not conduct 5 investigations, notifications, or hearing under this section in 6 accordance with chapter 91." 7 SECTION 2. Section 378-2.5, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is 8 amended by amending subsection (d) to read as follows: 9 "(d) Notwithstanding subsections (b) and (c), the 10 requirement that inquiry into and consideration of a prospective 11 employee's conviction record may take place only after the 12 individual has received a conditional job offer, and the 13 limitation to the most recent ten-year period, excluding the 14 period of incarceration, shall not apply to employers who are 15 16 expressly permitted to inquire into an individual's criminal history for employment purposes pursuant to any federal or state 17 law other than subsection (a), including: 18 The State or any of its branches, political (1)19

TITLE:

A BILL FOR AN ACT RELATING TO HAWAII HEALTH SYSTEMS CORPORATION BACKGROUND CHECKS.

PURPOSE:

Authorize the Hawaii health systems corporation (HHSC) to request criminal history checks through the Federal Bureau of Investigation and through the Hawaii Criminal Justice Data Center, on employees or applicants, as well as current or prospective contractors, providers, or volunteers, in order to comply with federal

law and to ensure the safety of its

patients.

MEANS:

Add a new section to chapter 323F and amend sections 378-2.5(d) and 846-2.7(b), Hawaii Revised Statutes.

JUSTIFICATION:

Currently, HHSC is authorized by 42 U.S.C. section 5119 et seq. to conduct FBI criminal history background checks on employees and applicants who will have direct contact with children, the elderly and disabled patients. HHSC is seeking to expand its authority to conduct background checks through the Federal Bureau of Investigation and through the Hawaii Criminal Justice Data Center, on all employees and applicants, including current and potential contractors, providers and volunteers who provide services to HHSC, regardless of whether they will be having direct contact with protected categories of patients. All patients should be afforded this protection.

Impact on the public: Conducting criminal background checks on HHSC employees and applicants will promote the safety of its patients and employees.

Impact on the department and other agencies:
