A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO LONG TERM CARE.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- 1 SECTION 1. While virtually all of Hawaii's elders want to
- 2 age-in-place, at home, rather than in a care home or
- 3 institution, many elders will require a more intensive
- 4 caregiving environment at the end of their lives. However, the
- 5 costs of institutional care have escalated beyond the financial
- 6 means of most elders. The State's portion of medicaid
- 7 expenditures has increased steadily over the years and is
- 8 projected to increase significantly as the baby boomers begin to
- 9 retire. As Hawaii's population ages, the number of frail and
- 10 disabled individuals also increases, placing a precipitous
- 11 demand on the need for long term care services.
- 12 The legislature finds that an array of services are
- 13 necessary to meet the long term care needs of Hawaii's elders.
- 14 Currently, long term care public policy goals include creating a
- 15 continuum of care up to and including the terminal phase of
- 16 life, coordinating referral and case management through a single
- 17 point of contact, building a family caregiver support system,

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- 1 expanding the capacity of long term care service providers,
- 2 developing a cost-effective long term care service delivery and
- 3 financial assistance approach, and stimulating and coordinating
- 4 research, education, and training on aging issues, in general.
- 5 The legislature further finds that it is necessary to
- 6 develop new funding approaches for long term care services, as
- 7 well as services to assist elders to age-in-place in order to
- 8 prevent the State from becoming fiscally liable for
- 9 unsustainable costs under medicaid.
- 10 The purpose of this Act is to establish a long term care
- 11 commission to research what resources are necessary to meet
- 12 state long term care public policy goals and to recommend a
- 13 program and funding mechanism that can provide these services.
- 14 SECTION 2. (a) There is established a long term care
- 15 commission to research what resources are necessary to meet
- 16 state long term care public policy goals and to recommend a
- 17 program and funding mechanism that can provide these services.
- 18 (b) The long term care commission shall consist of:
- 19 (1) Five members appointed by the governor;
- 20 (2) Five members appointed by the president of the senate;
- **21** and

1 Five members appointed by the speaker of the house of (3) 2 representatives; provided that all of the members shall be selected on the basis 3 4 of their knowledge, interest, and experience in the following: 5 long term care services or aging-in-place services, research or education, aging or disability advocacy, public policy 6 7 development, economics or finance, facilities planning and 8 management, medical or health services, and social services; 9 provided further that all of the members shall serve for two-10 year terms beginning on December 1, 2008, and ending on 11 November 30, 2010. 12 The commission shall elect its chair, who shall (c) commence commission meetings, and vice chair and shall adopt 13 14 rules for the conduct of its work. 15 (d) The long term care commission shall: 16 Review available research, studies, and previously (1)17 proposed programs relating to the provision of a 18 continuum of long term care services; 19 (2) Establish a purpose statement to guide the long term 20 care commission in the recommendation of a program;

Establish goals for the program, including:

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1		(A)	A public information and education component to
2			generate support for the program;
3		(B)	A single point-of-entry;
4		(C)	A system for comprehensive assessment planning
5			and management;
6		(D)	Consumer-directed service delivery; and
7		(E)	A funding mechanism that is independent of
8			medicaid;
9	(4)	Prep	are a five-year plan to accomplish the goals,
10		incl	uding the recommendation of benchmarks to evaluate
11		acco	mplishments for each year;
12	(5)	Moni	tor federal legislation for changes that may
13		impa	ct the program and adjust the five-year plan
14		acco	rdingly;
15	(6)	Coll	aborate with interested stakeholders, including
16		comm	unity coalitions or organizations concerned with
17		educ	ating the public regarding long term care; and
18	(7)	Subm	it an interim report to the legislature no later
19		than	twenty days prior to the convening of the 2009
20		regu	lar session, and a final report to the legislature
21		no la	ater than July 31, 2010. The final report shall

1		include a description of now the recommended program

3		(A) Other components of the State's aging-in-place,		
4		family caregiver support, and long term care

8		(C) Support for employed caregivers; and		
9		(D) The care home, adult foster home, nursing home,		
10		and assisted living and other retirement		
11		facilities in the State.		
12	(e)	The long term care commission may:		
13	(1)	Conduct or initiate new studies as it deems necessary;		
14		and		
15	(2)	Contract with consultants to conduct the studies,		
16		including an actuarial study, as it deems necessary		
17		for the purpose of recommending a program and funding		
18		mechanism, and reporting to the legislature. Any		
19		contract executed pursuant to this subparagraph shall		
20		be exempt from chapter 103D, Hawaii Revised Statutes;		
21		provided that the long term care commission shall		

1 endeavor to ensure transparency in the letting of the 2 contract. There is appropriated out of the general 3 SECTION 3. revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$250,000 or so much 4 5 thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2008-2009 for the long term care commission to research what resources are 6 7 necessary to provide a continuum of long term care services for 8 Hawaii's aging population and to recommend a program and funding 9 mechanism that can provide these services pursuant to section 2 10 of this Act. The sum appropriated shall be allotted as follows: 11 12 \$125,000 Senate 13 House of representatives \$125,000 The sum appropriated shall be expended by the senate and 14 the house of representatives to assist the long term care 15 commission for the purposes of this Act. 16 17 SECTION 4. This Act shall take effect upon its approval 18 and shall be repealed on December 1, 2010; provided that section 3 of this Act shall take effect on July 1, 2008. 19
