A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO FOOD WASTE RECYCLING.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- 1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that waste disposal is an
- 2 issue of critical importance throughout the islands. Section
- 3 226-15, Hawaii Revised Statutes, declares that "it shall be the
- 4 policy of this State to . . . promote re-use and recycling to
- 5 reduce solid and liquid wastes and employ a conservation ethic."
- 6 The legislature further finds that state facilities,
- 7 including state hospitals and public schools, are among the
- 8 largest institutional generators of food waste, in spite of
- 9 current recycling efforts. Despite statewide policies,
- 10 recycling efforts still reduce only a fraction of the solid and
- 11 liquid waste generated. Landfills on all islands are
- 12 approaching or have already reached capacity, and both expansion
- 13 of current landfills and relocation efforts are meeting
- 14 widespread community opposition.
- 15 Food waste recycling falls within the program elements of
- 16 the integrated solid waste management plans under chapter 342G,
- 17 Hawaii Revised Statutes. Moneys to implement and administer

- 1 this important state effort will come from the environmental
- 2 response revolving fund.
- 3 The purpose of this Act is to include a program for
- 4 recycling food waste as part of the State's integrated solid
- 5 waste management plans under chapter 342G, Hawaii Revised
- 6 Statutes, and to mandate food waste recycling at state
- 7 facilities.
- 8 SECTION 2. Chapter 342G, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
- 9 amended by adding a new part to be appropriately designated and
- 10 to read as follows:
- 11 "PART". FOOD WASTE RECYCLING
- 12 §342G- Definitions. As used in this part, unless the
- 13 context otherwise requires:
- 14 "Agency" means any department, office, board, or commission
- 15 of the State, the University of Hawaii, or any quasi-public
- 16 institution that is supported in whole or in part by State
- 17 funds.
- 18 "Composting facility" means an establishment that conducts
- 19 either major or minor composting operations through a process in
- 20 which organic materials are biologically decomposed under
- 21 controlled conditions to produce a stable humus-like mulch or
- 22 soil amendment. The composting process includes but is not



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- 1 limited to receipt of materials, primary processing,
- 2 decomposition activities, and final processing for sale and
- 3 marketing. This term does not include bioremediation of
- 4 fuel-contaminated soil.
- 5 "Major composting" includes the composting of mixed solid
- 6 waste, including solid waste facility residues (rubbish), sewage
- 7 sludge, waste from animal food processing operations, and
- 8 similar materials. Major composting operations involve more
- 9 complex controls to manage odors, vectors, and surface water
- 10 contamination, even if, in some cases, on-site odors may not be
- 11 able to be completely mitigated.
- "Meal" includes any food item or items served as an entree
- 13 at breakfast, lunch, or dinner, but excludes beverages and
- 14 desserts, if the beverages or desserts are served by themselves
- 15 and not part of a breakfast, lunch, or dinner.
- 16 "Minor composting" includes the composting of clean,
- 17 source-separated organic materials, including greenwaste, animal
- 18 manure, crop residues, and waste from vegetable food processing
- 19 operations. Minor composting operations involve relatively
- 20 simple management and engineering solutions to control odors,
- 21 vectors, and surface water contamination.

- "Prepared meal" means a meal that has been cleaned, cooked, 1 2 or otherwise prepared on the premises of the food establishment, 3 and excludes prepackaged meals that are cooked or otherwise 4 prepared elsewhere and only sold on the premises of the 5 establishment. Prepared meals include meals a portion of which have been precooked or prepared off the premises of the 6 7 establishment. 8 "Recycling facility" includes a composting facility, waste 9 bioconversion facility, rendering facility, pig farm, or other 10 agricultural facility that uses food waste as animal feed or for 11 other agricultural use, or any other facility that recycles food 12 waste and is approved by the department for that purpose. 13 "Recycling service" means a service or collection of 14 services that includes the collection and transportation of food 15 waste to a department-approved recycling facility by a refuse hauler or other company that collects the food waste, and the 16 17 recycling or reuse of that food waste by a department-approved 18 recycling facility, which may be operated by the company that 19 collects and transports the food waste. 20 "State facility" means a building or buildings or similar 21 structure owned or leased by, or otherwise under the
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jurisdiction of, an agency.

3	§342G-	Recycling requirements. An agency that serves	
4	prepared me	als in a state facility shall arrange and provide for	
5	the separat	e collection of a minimum of fifty per cent or more	
6	of the total food waste generated, and for its recycling by a		
7	recycling facility; or separate a minimum of fifty per cent or		
8	more of the	total food waste from all other solid waste	
9	generated b	y the food establishment and deliver the food waste	
10	to a recycling facility.		
11	§342G-	Suspension of requirements. The department may	
12	suspend the	requirements of this part as follows:	
13	(1) D	ouring the period of a work stoppage or any other	
14	į	nterruption of recycling collection service to a	
15	S	tate facility; or	
16	(2) W	Then the department determines that there are	
17	i	nadequate recycling facilities or that there is	
18	i	nadequate recycling capacity to dispose of the food	
19	W	waste being collected pursuant to this part.	
20	§342G-	Implementation. The department shall adopt rules	
21	in accordan	ace with chapter 91 to implement this part	

1	§342	G- Inspection authorized. Upon presentation of
2	proper cr	edentials, the department or the department's duly
3	authorize	d representative may enter at reasonable times any
4	building	or premises of a state facility and inspect the books
5	and recor	ds to determine compliance with the requirements of
6	this part	; provided that:
7	(1)	The entry and inspection shall be made in such a
8		manner as to cause the least possible inconvenience to
9		the persons in possession of the property; and
10	(2)	An order of a court authorizing the entry and
11		inspection shall be obtained prior to entry or
12		inspection if the entry or inspection is denied or
13		resisted.
14	§342	G- Reporting requirements. Effective January 1,
15	2006, and	quarterly thereafter, each waste recycling facility
16	shall rep	ort to the department for the quarter preceding:
17	(1)	The total volume of food waste being recycled, and the
18		average dollar amount the facility is charging per
19		unit of weight or volume, if the facility both
20		collected and disposed of food waste from a food
21		establishment; and

1	(2) The amount of food waste, measured either by unit of			
2	weight or volume, which the facility recycled during			
3	the previous quarter.			
4	§342G- Donations of food. Nothing in this part shall			
5	preclude a food establishment from donating leftover or unsold			
6	food that is safe to consume to a food bank.			
7	§342G- Dissemination of information. The department			
8	shall ensure that a copy of this part, and any related			
9	ordinances or rules adopted pursuant to chapter 91, are made			
10	available to all agencies."			
11	SECTION 3. There is appropriated out of the environmental			
12	response revolving fund the sum of \$, or so much			
13	thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2007-2008, and the			
14	same sum, or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year			
15	2008-2009, for the establishment and staffing of the food waste			
16	recycling program.			
17	The sums appropriated shall be expended by the department			
18	of health for the purposes of this Act.			
19	SECTION 4. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2007.
