## SENATE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

REQUESTING THE CONVENING OF A TASK FORCE TO ADDRESS THE ISSUE OF SHARING CRIMINAL BACKGROUND INFORMATION BETWEEN THE FEDERAL AND STATE GOVERNMENT.

1 WHEREAS, immigration law is a creation of federal law, 2 encompassing many areas, including employment, citizenship, and 3 benefits; and 4 WHEREAS, since the September 11<sup>th</sup>, 2001 bombing of the World 5 6 Trade Center, the federal government has increased their emphasis on securing our borders through initiatives like the 7 creation of the Department of Homeland Security; and 8 9 WHEREAS, one of the tools the Department of Homeland 10 Security uses in an effort to secure our borders is background 11 checks, although the current mechanisms for these checks are 12 backlogged; and 13 14 15 WHEREAS, the Department of Homeland Security is improving the sharing of information amongst federal departments and with 16 the states, the agency itself is predominantly a counter-17 terrorism organization; and 18 19 WHEREAS, events over the past several years, including, 20 21 most recently, the murder of Karen Etrell, highlight a different 22 kind of border security problem, that of immigrants with criminal backgrounds entering the country and this state, and 23 committing crimes; and 24 25 26 WHEREAS, the Department of Homeland Security does deny visas to known international gang members because of their ties 27 28 to international terrorism; and 29 30 WHEREAS, although our federal and state constitutions quarantee the freedom to associate, and by inference, to travel 31 freely within the country, those legal guarantees and our 32

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separate state governments make it difficult to identify and 1 track immigrants with criminal backgrounds; and 2 3 WHEREAS, improved information sharing between the federal 4 5 government and the states could help address these public safety issues without infringing on the constitutional freedoms that 6 guarantee our freedom to associate and travel; now, therefore, 7 8 9 BE IT RESOLVED by the Senate of the Twenty-fourth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 2008, the 10 House of Representatives concurring, that the legislature 11 requests the convening of a task force to identify the legal and 12 13 logistical impediments to the sharing of criminal background information of immigrants between the federal government and the 14 state and between state departments; and 15 16 17 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the task force should be composed of: 18 19 The United States Attorney for Hawaii, or his 20 (1)designee; 21 22 23 (2) The Attorney General, or his designee; 24 25 (3) The police chiefs of each county, or their designees; 26 27 (4)The Superintendent of Education, or her designee 28 (5) The director of Human Services, or her designee 29 30 (6) The director of Health, or her designee; and 31 32 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED the task force submit their 33 recommendations, including proposed legislation, to the 34 35 legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the 2009 Regular Session; and 36 37 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that certified copies of this 38 Concurrent Resolution be transmitted to the United States 39 Attorney for Hawaii, the attorney general, the police chiefs of 40 each county, the Superintendent of Education, the director of 41 Human Services, and the director of Health. 42 43 44
