#### SENATE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

REQUESTING THE LEGISLATIVE REFERENCE BUREAU TO INVESTIGATE AND DEVELOP FEASIBILITY AND IMPLEMENTATION MODELS REGARDING MERGING THE LAND COURT AND REGULAR SYSTEMS, REASSIGNING THE BUREAU OF CONVEYANCES TO ANOTHER STATE DEPARTMENT, AND PRIVATIZING CERTAIN FUNCTIONS OF THE BUREAU OF CONVEYANCES.

1 WHEREAS, in light of the published news reports, studies, 2 and Senate hearings regarding the problems at the Bureau of 3 Conveyances, the ongoing investigations by the Department of the 4 Attorney General and the State Ethics Commission, and the lack 5 of any effective solutions being created or implemented at the 6 Bureau of Conveyances, the Legislature adopted Senate Concurrent 7 Resolution No. 226 during the 2007 Regular Session; and 8

9 WHEREAS, it was clear to the Legislature that further 10 action was required to address concerns regarding the personnel, 11 operational, and fiscal management of the Bureau of Conveyances 12 as it serves an important public service as the repository of 13 information relating to the title to land upon which homes and 14 businesses are situated within the State; and

16 WHEREAS, the Concurrent Resolution established a Joint 17 Senate-House Investigative Committee to investigate the 18 personnel, operational, and fiscal management of the Bureau of 19 Conveyances to ensure that the Bureau of Conveyances serves the 20 public at its most optimal level and required the Committee to 21 submit its findings and recommendations to the Legislature prior 22 to the convening of the 2008 Regular Session; and 23

WHEREAS, the scope of the Committee's investigation of the Bureau of Conveyances was to complement rather than duplicate, impede, or jeopardize the ongoing investigations conducted by the Department of the Attorney General and the State Ethics Commission, and it was the goal of the Committee to develop methods, and short- and long-term solutions on how the Legislature can assist the Bureau of Conveyances in becoming a



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more efficient, effective, and accountable operation rather than 1 2 pinpoint blame for the existing problems at the Bureau; and 3 4 WHEREAS, pursuant to Senate Concurrent Resolution No. 226 5 (2007), the objectives of the Committee were to investigate, gather information, assess, and make recommendations concerning: 6 7 The management of the employees and administrators of 8 (1)the Bureau of Conveyances; 9 10 (2)The fiscal management and accountability of the Bureau 11 of Conveyances; 12 13 The rules, procedures, and fee schedules relating to 14 (3) information sharing between the Bureau of Conveyances 15 and private title companies and individual users or 16 subscribers: and 17 18 (4) The security of recorded documents, access to these 19 documents from private computers, and the potential 20 21 for tampering with these documents; and 22 WHEREAS, during the six months of public hearings and 23 24 intense investigative work, the Committee uncovered several and sometimes troubling findings relating to the voluminous and 25 26 escalating problems at the Bureau of Conveyances; and 27 WHEREAS, the Committee heard testimony and received 28 documents regarding the Bureau's computer system and information 29 sharing service, including the acquisition of the computer 30 system and software; the management of the Bureau's fiscal 31 32 matters, including contracts and agreements; the Bureau's relationship and business interactions with private title 33 companies or other entities in the title industry; and the 34 35 personnel and operational management of the Bureau; and 36 WHEREAS, in the course of its discussion and assessment of 37 the information and testimony it received, the Committee drew 38 39 the following three prevailing and interlocking conclusions 40 amongst the Committee's findings: 41 Severe mismanagement of the employees and operations 42 (1)43 of the Bureau of Conveyances hampers effective and efficient property recordings; 44 2008-1793 SCR SMA.doc

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1 2 A lack of fiscal management and accountability at the (2)3 Bureau of Conveyances has led to a loss of revenue for the State; and 4 5 Employee and operational mismanagement and a lack of 6 (3) fiscal accountability causes the operations of the 7 Bureau of Conveyances to be vulnerable to abuse; and 8 9 WHEREAS, from a review of the testimony and materials 10 presented to the Committee, and in light of the long standing 11 nature of the problems uncovered, it appears extremely unlikely 12 that the Bureau possesses the will or capability to address 13 these issues without some form of concentrated intervention; and 14 15 WHEREAS, in light of the breadth and depth of the 16 challenges the Bureau faces, and given the relative lack of 17 success that accompanied earlier attempts at improving 18 19 operations, it was clear to the Committee that more fundamental changes in the Bureau must be explored than have been discussed 20 in the past; and 21 22 23 WHEREAS, among the approaches the Committee considered were combining the two existing systems - Land Court and Regular 24 System - into a single form of recordation that better serves 25 the needs of the community; and 26 27 WHEREAS, in addition, the Bureau's continuing failure to 28 operate in a productive and effective manner as a part of the 29 Department of Land and Natural Resources raised an unavoidable 30 question whether the function would be better placed in another 31 department of the executive branch or within the judicial 32 33 branch; and 34 WHEREAS, finally, questions arose as to whether the 35 recordation function would be better placed outside of state 36 government, and instead privatized to an existing or newly-37 created entity capable of handling the needs of landowners in 38 39 the State; and 40 41 WHEREAS, in light of the Committee's findings and recommendations, it has become apparent that the problems at the 42 Bureau require special action and further analysis; now, 43 44 therefore,

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ownership versus the Land Court's explicit guaranty by 1 2 the State of property ownership; and 3 4 (4) Establish findings and develop recommendations on how 5 the Bureau of Conveyances may be unified into a single system of recordation; and 6 7 8 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Legislative Reference Bureau identify a new administrative assignment for the Bureau 9 of Conveyances within the state government, including the 10 11 following: 12 (1)Perform a review of departments within the state 13 government to identify likely administrative 14 assignments for the Bureau of Conveyances, in order to 15 16 produce a "short list" of agencies for in-depth review, which shall not be limited to executive branch 17 departments, but shall include the judiciary of the 18 State of Hawaii; and 19 20 Review the policies, procedures, and current functions (2)21 of "short list" agencies to determine the feasibility 22 and advisability of reassigning the Bureau of 23 Conveyances to one of those agencies, including 24 consultation with the executives of the agencies 25 identified as relocation candidates, their staffs, and 26 stakeholders of those agencies as identified by the 27 respective executives, and consultation with the 28 leadership of the Hawaii Government Employees 29 30 Association as necessary to ensure union representation and consultation on all matters 31 concerning its union members; and 32 33 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Legislative Reference 34 Bureau perform an in-depth review of the issues and potential 35 challenges presented by privatizing the functions of the Bureau 36 of Conveyances, including a survey that includes: 37 38 An outline of criteria to be applied in identifying 39 (1)and selecting a private entity to assume the 40 responsibilities of the Bureau of Conveyances; 41 42 (2)Financial projections related to privatizing Bureau 43 functions, including potential income earned and 44 2008-1793 SCR SMA.doc 

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expenses borne by the private entity, adequacy of 1 current pricing, and potential net income to the 2 3 State: 4 5 (3) An analysis of tax collections now handled by the Bureau of Conveyances and, if appropriate, a process 6 for the selected private entity to collect and 7 transfer those tax revenues; 8 9 A recommendation of budgetary and personnel provisions 10 (4)11 to allow the selected private entity to accept the Bureau of Conveyances and its functions; 12 13 (5) A timeline and transition plan for the privatization 14 of the Bureau of Conveyances; and 15 16 (6) An analysis of other issues and considerations that 17 may militate against the reassignment of the Bureau to 18 19 a private entity; and 20 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Legislative Reference 21 Bureau submit its findings and recommendations to the 22 Legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of 23 the 2009 Regular Session; and 24 25 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that certified copies of this 26 Concurrent Resolution be transmitted to the Director of the 27 Legislative Reference Bureau, the Chair of the Board of Land and 28 Natural Resources, the Chief Justice, the Governor, and the 29 30 Executive Director of the Hawaii Government Employees Association. 31 32 Juneues.
