## SENATE RESOLUTION

REQUESTING THE UNITED STATES CONGRESS TO AUTHORIZE THE ESTABLISHMENT OF A NATIONAL MONUMENT FOR WOMEN IN WASHINGTON, D.C., TO RECOGNIZE AND HONOR THE LEADERSHIP CONTRIBUTIONS OF AMERICA'S WOMEN.

WHEREAS, the 2007 International Women's Leadership
 Conference, hosted by the State of Hawaii, inspired and
 empowered women to deepen their understanding of what it means
 to be a woman leader; and

6 WHEREAS, the group of women presenters at the International
7 Women's Leadership Conference were chosen for their exemplary
8 leadership, including business and government executives,
9 community organization directors, and scientific experts from
10 all over the world; and

12 WHEREAS, the International Women's Leadership Conference 13 raised the awareness of women in business, government service, 14 and countless other professions to higher sights, higher 15 standards, and exciting and attainable future goals; and 16

WHEREAS, particularly for women in Hawaii, the
International Women's Leadership Conference helped them to
realize their potential and collective strength to perform
successfully in leadership positions in their own communities;
and

WHEREAS, the International Women's Leadership Conference focused on developing strong leadership skills in women by encouraging each conference participant to explore ideas and reach out in home communities to make a difference, day by day; and

WHEREAS, today's women shall bequeath their talents, education, wisdom, leadership skills, and the fruits of their successes to the coming generations, encouraging and enabling women, especially young professionals and students, to reach for the stars; and

WHEREAS, in addition to private and government sector women
 leaders, the military has had its share of women leaders from
 the Revolutionary War to the present who have performed
 courageously in a wide variety of duties; and

6 WHEREAS, women in the United States have taken leadership
7 roles in every major field of endeavor, often while
8 simultaneously supporting and nurturing families; and

10 WHEREAS, a November 20, 2000, article in Business Week 11 Online, stated that, by and large, studies show that women 12 executives, when rated by their peers, subordinates, and bosses, 13 score higher than their male counterparts on a wide variety of 14 measures--from producing high-quality work to goal-setting to 15 mentoring employees; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to Title 40 United States Code Section 8903, Congressional authorization is necessary to establish commemorative works, defined under section 8902 to include memorials in the District of Columbia, to "reflect a consensus of the lasting national significance of the subjects involved" (40 U.S.C. § 8901); and

24 WHEREAS, a national monument in Washington, D.C., dedicated 25 to recognizing and honoring the leadership contributions of 26 America's women is an ideal means of enshrining the past 27 achievements of women leaders and inspiring future women 28 leaders; now, therefore,

30 BE IT RESOLVED by the Senate of the Twenty-fourth 31 Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 2008, 32 that the United States Congress is requested to authorize the 33 establishment of a National Monument for Women in Washington, 34 D.C., to recognize and honor the leadership contributions of 35 America's women; and
