SENATE RESOLUTION

ESTABLISHING A TASK FORCE TO DEVELOP LEGISLATION FOR UNIVERSAL LAW CARE AND IMPROVED ACCESS TO JUSTICE.

WHEREAS, every person in Hawaii deserves access to 1 affordable, quality legal services and care; and 2 3 4 WHEREAS, according to a 2007 assessment funded by the Hawaii Justice Foundation and the Hawaii State Bar Association, 5 6 many Hawaii residents face critical legal needs without being able to obtain an attorney, including protection from domestic 7 abuse, securing affordable housing, family stability, living in 8 a safe and secure home, access to healthcare, and income 9 support; and 10 11 WHEREAS, in Hawaii there is only one legal services 12 13 attorney for every 2,291 persons living below 125 percent of the federal poverty guideline; and 14 15 WHEREAS, since 1997, the number of domestic violence 16 protective orders filed has risen 62.78 percent from 2,859 to 17 4,654 in 2006. 18 19 WHEREAS, legal services providers are able to help only one 20in three of those who contact them for assistance; and 21 22 23 WHEREAS, only one in five low and moderate-income Hawaii residents have their legal needs met; and 24 25 WHEREAS, legal service providers have inadequate resources 26 to assist the indigent and disadvantaged due to the high cost of 27 legal services and litigation as well as the high volume of 28 requests; and 29 30 WHEREAS, unlike emergency room doctors, who are required to 31 care for persons in medical need regardless of their ability to 32 pay, lawyers are not required to provide civil legal services to 33 34 the indigent and disadvantaged in times of great legal need. 35



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WHEREAS, absent the assistance of legal service providers 1 or pro bono volunteers, the indigent and disadvantaged are 2 unable to gain adequate access to legal services and litigation; 3 4 5 WHEREAS, lawyers should ensure that all members of the public have equal redress to the courts for resolution of their 6 disputes and access to lawyers when legal services are 7 necessary; now, therefore, 8 9 BE IT RESOLVED by the Senate of the Twenty-fourth 10 Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 2008, 11 that a task force be convened to develop legislation that 12 provides for universal law care and improved access to justice 13 by creating new funding sources for legal services to the 14 indigent and disadvantaged; and 15 16 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the task force be composed of 17 the following members: 18 19 (1)The Attorney General, or the Attorney General's 20 designee; 21 22 (2)A representative of the appellate judges of Hawaii, to 23 24 be selected by the Chief Justice; 25 A representative of the Hawaii State Bar Association; (3)26 27 (4)A representative of the Legal Aid Society of Hawaii; 28 and 29 30 (5)A representative of the general public who is not an 31 32 attorney, to be appointed by the Governor; and 33 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the proposed legislation 34 include provisions for the split recovery of punitive damages, 35 providing that upon the entry of a verdict including an award of 36 punitive damages, the State shall become a judgment creditor as 37 to the punitive damages portion of the award and the punitive 38 39 damages portion of the award shall be allocated as follows: 40 75 percent shall be paid to the prevailing party; 41 (1)42 The attorney for the prevailing party shall be paid 43 (2)out of the amount allocated to the prevailing party, 44



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in the amount agreed upon between the attorney and the 1 prevailing party, although in no event may more than 2 13 percent of the amount awarded as punitive damages 3 be paid to the attorney for the prevailing party; and 4 5 25 percent of the punitive damages awarded shall be 6 (3) deposited into the indigent legal assistance fund 7 established under section 607-5.7, Hawaii Revised 8 Statutes, or a comparable state fund established to 9 support legal services to the indigent and 10 11 disadvantaged; and 12 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the proposed legislation 13 include provisions that require a legal services fee of \$50 be 14 15 paid annually by each attorney with an active license to practice law in the State, and that such provisions further 16 include that: 17 18 The state licensing authority shall not renew or 19 (1)20 reinstate, or shall deny or suspend any license or application, of any attorney with an active license 21 who fails to pay the mandatory legal services fee; 22 23 Mandatory legal services fees collected shall be 24 (2)25 deposited into the indigent legal assistance fund established under section 607-5.7, Hawaii Revised 26 Statutes, or a comparable state fund established to 27 support legal services to the indigent and 28 disadvantaged; and 29 30 The mandatory legal services fee shall be administered 31 (3) by the Hawaii Supreme Court; and 32 33 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that that the Task Force is 34 requested to submit proposed legislation and a report of its 35 discussions, and any findings and recommendations, to the 36 Legislature no later than 20 days prior to the convening of the 37 Regular Session of 2009; and 38 39 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that certified copies of this 40 41 Resolution be transmitted to the Governor, the Senate President, the Attorney General, the Board of Directors of the Legal Aid 42 Society of Hawaii, the President of the Hawaii State Bar 43 Association, and the Chief Justice. 44 3



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
