SENATE RESOLUTION

REQUESTING THE ESTABLISHMENT OF A VOLUNTARY COMPLIANCE PROGRAM TO ENCOURAGE COMMUNITIES AND BUSINESSES TO CONVERT TO EXPANDED POLYSTYRENE FOAM ALTERNATIVE PRODUCTS.

WHEREAS, due to the inherent nonbiodegradable, nonrecyclable nature and chemical composition of expanded polystyrene foam (commonly known as Styrofoam), the use and disposal of this product poses a significant threat not only to Hawaii's ecosystems and environment but also to the general health and welfare of the citizens of this State; and

8 WHEREAS, expanded polystyrene foam is a petroleum
9 by-product, nonrenewable resource composed of the chemical
10 styrene, a neurotoxin and a possible human carcinogen; and

WHEREAS, when expanded polystyrene foam breaks down in the State's landfills, dangerous chemicals leach into the seepage of the landfills, adversely impacting the State's environment and ecosystems. Additionally, as this seepage is pumped out of the landfill and inadequately processed or treated before being discharged into the ocean, it also threatens marine ecosystems around the islands; and

20 WHEREAS, expanded polystyrene foam products take hundreds 21 of years to breakdown, posing a significant long-term 22 detrimental impact upon Hawaii's environment and ecosystems; and 23

WHEREAS, when expanded polystyrene foam is disposed of by
 incineration, it produces a dense, black, irritating smoke
 containing acidic gases and over ninety different chemical
 compounds, including carbon monoxide, carbon dioxide, and the
 known neurotoxin and possible carcinogen, styrene; and

30 WHEREAS, when, contrary to the designed one-time use, food 31 or beverages are reheated in expanded polystyrene foam 32 containers, leaching of the chemical neurotoxin styrene occurs; 33 and 34

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WHEREAS, improper or inadvertent disposal (littering) of 1 expanded polystyrene foam products is not only an aesthetic 2 concern but also raises significant health and welfare concerns 3 for the State's aquatic and wildlife; and 4 5 WHEREAS, disposable cups, clamshell containers, egg 6 cartons, meat trays, and numerous other items made from expanded 7 polystyrene foam pose a significant threat to the environment, 8 including the numerous and oftentimes fragile ecosystems that 9 10 exist in Hawaii, and to the health and welfare of the general public: and 11 12 WHEREAS, Haleiwa town's Plastic Free Haleiwa coalition 13 provides a tremendous example and excellent model of community 14 members and business owners working together to reduce and 15 ultimately eliminate the use of disposable plastics, including 16 expanded polystyrene foam products, in their community; now, 17 therefore, 18 19 BE IT RESOLVED by the Senate of the Twenty-fourth 20 Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 2008, 21 22 that the Department of Business, Economic Development, and Tourism (DBEDT) is requested to create a voluntary compliance 23 program to encourage communities and businesses to convert to 24 alternative products, other than expanded polystyrene foam 25 products; and 26 27 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that under the program, DBEDT is 28 requested to create a list of alternatives to commonly used 29 30 expanded polystyrene foam products, and make the information available to the public; and 31 32 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Department of Business, 33 Economic Development, and Tourism is requested to submit a 34 report containing the contents, actions, and results of the 35 voluntary compliance program to the Legislature twenty days 36 before the start of each regular session, and that the report 37 may include but is not limited to suggestions, comments, or 38 requests for legislative action; and 39 40

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BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that certified copies of this 1 2 Resolution be transmitted to the Governor; Director of Business, Economic Development, and Tourism; and each Mayor and Council 3 Chairperson of each county of the State. 4
