HB 1971

RELATING TO VACCINATIONS.

HLT, EDN

Makes all vaccinations in the State non-compulsory but only recommended unless there is danger of an epidemic from any

communicable disease. Allows exemptions from vaccinations on any

grounds.

HB 1993

RELATING TO HEALTH.

HLT, FIN

Appropriates funds to provide care for uninsured Hawaii residents.

HB 1996

RELATING TO HEALTH CARE.

HLT, FIN

Establishes Health Enterprise Zones in the state to provide incentives for health care providers to serve in health professional shortage areas

of the state.

HB 2010

RELATING TO ANATOMICAL GIFTS.

HLT, JUD

Enacts the Revised Uniform Anatomical Gift Act.

HB 2011

RELATING TO BREAST CANCER.

HLT, CPC

Requires insurers, mutual benefit societies, and health maintenance organizations to provide coverage for hospital stays of at least forty-

eight hours in connection with mastectomies.

HB 2013

RELATING TO CANCER.

HLT, CPC

Requires insurers, mutual benefit societies, and health maintenance

organizations to provide coverage for oral chemotherapy.

HB 2015

RELATING TO HEALTH.

HLT, CPC

Prohibits health plans from requiring prior authorization for persons before receiving general Obstetric/Gynecological services or treatment

for Hepatitis C.



<u>HB 2016</u>	RELATING TO HEALTH INSURANCE. Includes methods of oral chemotherapy treatment in health insurances coverage.	HLT, CPC
<u>HB 2022</u>	RELATING TO CHILDREN'S HEALTH. Provides a means for childhood screening required for entry into school, from birth to eight years of age, and establishes the Hawaii Childhood Screening Initiative Advisory Committee.	HLT, FIN
<u>HB 2025</u>	RELATING TO TOBACCO. Prohibits the sale and distribution of flavored tobacco products.	HLT, JUD
<u>HB 2049</u>	RELATING TO INSURANCE. Expands the power of the insurance commissioner to include regulating the rates of dental insurance providers.	HLT, CPC, FIN
<u>HB 2059</u>	RELATING TO CIGARETTES. Prohibits sale of cigarettes in Hawaii that are not reduced ignition propensity "fire-safe" beginning 7/1/2009. Sets civil fines and requires attorney general to adopt rules to enforce law.	HLT, CPC/JUD, FIN
<u>HB 2117</u>	RELATING TO HEALTH INSURANCE. Mandates health insurance coverage to screen for colorectal cancer by colonoscopy every ten years, beginning at age fifty.	HLT, CPC, FIN
<u>HB 2119</u>	RELATING TO ANATOMICAL TRANSPLANTS. Prohibits health insurers from denying or limiting coverage for organ or tissue transplantation services on the basis that the insured, member, enrollee, or subscriber is infected with the human immunodeficiency virus.	HLT, CPC, FIN
<u>HB 2137</u>	RELATING TO HEALTH. Provides a \$1,000 tax credit for expenses related to an organ donation.	HLT, FIN
HB 2139	RELATING TO ANATOMICAL GIFTS. Enacts the Revised Uniform Anatomical Gift Act.	HLT, JUD
<u>HB 2366</u>	RELATING TO THE ORGAN DONOR REGISTRY. Establishes a statewide organ donor registry.	HLT, FIN
<u>HB 2287</u>	RELATING TO HEALTH CARE PROFESSIONALS. Provides for the resident tuition rates repayment of tuition for five nonresident students of the medical education program at the John A. Burns School of Medicine to encourage nonresident medical school graduates to remain in Hawaii.	HLT, HED, FIN
<u>HB 2023</u>	RELATING TO DRUG ADDICTION TREATMENT. Establishes a pilot project at Hina Mauka to treat crystal methamphetamine ("ice") addiction using Vivitrol (long-acting, injectable form of naltrexone).	HLT, HED, FIN
