1. A BRIEF description of the applicant's background

In 1969, a group of graduate students in the University of Hawaii Theatre Department founded Hawaii Performing Arts Company (HPAC). Their desire was to create Hawaii's first professional resident adult theatre organization. It was envisioned that this organization would nurture Hawaii's theatre artists while concurrently providing live, stage entertainment for community audiences. Their presentations in the first two seasons were staged in downtown Honolulu, but by 1971, support for the new company had grown and a larger performance space was needed. Kawaiahao Church's Manoa Valley Chapel, with a seating capacity of 100, became the new home of HPAC under a favorable property lease agreement between the church and the theatre, whose relationship was solely that of property lessee/lessor.

The community responded favorably to the new theatre company, and it grew quickly. Audiences were enthusiastic and performances were typically sold-out. The artistry of the theatre's play productions also continued to strengthen, and plays that most likely wouldn't be seen on any other local stages were presented to acclaim. By 1983, the MVT Board of Directors recognized that the aging chapel facility that had served as home for 12 years would have to be replaced. Nearly \$1 million was raised by the Board of Directors and the 150-seat Manoa Valley Theatre facility was newly erected on site in 1987. A subsequent half million dollar addition in 1993 expanded the backstage workspace, dressing room and costume shop.

In the twenty-one years which have elapsed since the building's first show, more than 125 productions encompassing approximately 2100 performances and 1250 rehearsals have been held, with total admissions of more than 315,000. In 1987, HPAC adopted the d.b.a. "Manoa Valley Theatre" to eliminate the confusion between the names of the producing organization and its performance facility. Concurrent with the company's physical growth, the staff and board committed themselves to growth of the company's artistry. Careful fiscal management, focused artistic policies, and enhanced nurturing of local theatre arts practitioners have all contributed significantly to Manoa Valley Theatre's evolution.

From its humble beginnings in 1969, through its community theatre operations in the 70s, 80s, 90s and 2000s, Manoa Valley Theatre has transformed into a semi-professional theatre that is both dynamic and exciting. Its reputation has grown beyond the shores of the Hawaiian Islands and its artistic associates have included Tony Award winning playwrights, Pulitzer Prize winning playwrights, and others.

As "Honolulu's Off-Broadway Playhouse", MVT enters the 21st Century with a clear vision of artistry and community service that enhances Hawaii's cultural community, entertains its residents, and develops its artists.

2. The goals and objectives related to the request;

Manoa Valley Theatre was established as a community workplace which would benefit local performing artists and audiences. Its mission statement is: To produce intimate, high-quality, innovative theatre for the benefit of Hawaii audiences and artists. The principles which guide fulfillment of this mission are: Striving to consistently provide quality entertainment; A commitment to develop Hawaii theatre artists; Producing challenging, thought-provoking, educational experiences; Acceptance of artistic risks; An expectation of professionalism at all levels; and Fiscal responsibility.

Manoa Valley Theatre's constituency is broad-based. Season ticket holders, the single-largest source of the theatre's earned income, live in communities island-wide. The volunteers who participate in MVT's program activities as actors, directors, musicians, stagehands, ushers, and designers also live throughout Oahu. MVT serves as a community workplace for theatre arts students from public and private schools - the University of Hawaii, Chaminade University, and Leeward Community College among others. Opportunities to get involved in all areas of live stage production are available to all community members who have that interest. Auditions for performing roles are open to all, and guest directors, designers, musicians and stage crew are recruited on a play-by-play basis from the abundance of talent available in the local community.

Manoa Valley Theatre's 2008-09 season will be its 40th anniversary season. Six plays and musicals utilizing nearly 350 volunteers from the abundance of Hawaii's theatrical talent will be presented. Actors, directors, set and costume designers, musicians, stage crew, ushers, and more, from our local community will be provided with hands-on opportunities in theatre arts. The program will be managed and focused by the theatre's small professional staff of seven. Within the season will be play productions that entertain, stimulate, provoke, and challenge the audience. Approximately 18,000 people comprised of Community members island-wide from Oahu, and some Oahu visitors from neighbor islands and the mainland, will constitute MVT's 2008-09 audience.

The theatre's active and enthusiastic board of directors will be involved throughout the season in marketing, fundraising, volunteer and donor stewardship, and community relations. Grant support from the Legislature will be utilized to help bridge the gap between ticket sales income and the total cost of producing the season. Because the MVT board of directors is committed to keeping ticket prices at realistic levels for the majority of our community members, ticket income provides only approximately 60% of the organization's annual operating budget. Contributions from individuals, corporate sponsors, an annual fundraising gala, and grants are sought to provide the remaining 40%.

3. State the public purpose and need to be served;

Entering its 40th consecutive year of operations, MVT has evolved as one of Hawaii's most important performing arts organizations. Its programming serves Oahu residents island wide as well as Hawaii residents visiting Oahu from other counties. The goals of the theatre are to aid the community in the expansion of minds, and encourage and challenge creative and analytical thinking. MVT is a major local source of new, groundbreaking and successful theatre which both entertains and provokes.

4. Describe the target population to be served;

Manoa Valley Theatre's theatrical programs are open to all Hawaii residents as well as Hawaii's visitors. It draws theatre arts practitioners as well as audience members from communities island wide. In addition to its patrons, free admissions to a number of community organizations and schools across the island are provided through its Community Outreach Program. Schools such as Maryknoll High School, Mid Pacific Institute, Kaimuki High School, Punahou School, Trans Pacific College, Leeward Community College, Hawaii Pacific University, Castle High School and the Pacific School of Performing Arts regularly attend special preview productions free of charge. Community organizations that take advantage this program

include Big Brothers Big Sisters, Hospice Hawaii, Sylvia's Seniors, Three S's, Kokua Council, Waikiki Community Center, Waikiki Seniors, Hawaii Kai Retirement Community, Life Foundation, HUGS, Manoa Gardens, Institute for Human Services, PBS Hawaii and the Alliance for Drama Education.

5. Describe the geographic coverage.

The breakdown of community interactions indicate the following: Central and East Honolulu (76%), Windward Oahu (13%), Central Oahu (5%), Leeward Oahu (5%), North Shore (1%), Big Island (1%), Maui County (1%), and Kauai (1%). Our audiences and supporters also extend into areas such as the Mainland, Alaska, Guam and the United Kingdom.

6. Describe how the request will, in the case of a grant, permit the community to benefit from those activities; or for a subsidy, reduce the costs incurred by the organization or individual in promoting a service available to some or all members of the public.

Hawaii's cultural community is an important force in Hawaii's economic development. Employers considering a move to Hawaii evaluate many factors in the attractiveness of the community to their company and employees. Programs offered by Manoa Valley Theatre contribute significantly to the drawing power of Hawaii for new corporate operations. The resulting growth of Hawaii's economy benefits everyone.

Manoa Valley Theatre's operations enhance the quality of life for residents and visitors. Its performing arts programming entertains, educates and stimulates, and fosters a greater understanding and appreciation of our community and the world around us.

MVT provides employment opportunities through its paid positions, and volunteer programs for adults and young adults. Ninety-five percent of its annual operating budget remains in the state of Hawaii. which benefit many.

MVT's 40th Anniversary Season will include six play productions drawn from the best of modern and contemporary American theatre plays and musicals. These shows will be produced utilizing performing arts practitioners from the local community, and presented for the entertainment and enrichment of Hawaii's performing arts audiences. All productions will be presented at MVT's 150-seat performing arts facility on East Manoa Road, which is home to its administrative and artistic operations.

MVT's 40th Anniversary Season will run from September 2008 through August 2009.

MVT's annual seasons are evaluated on a continuing basis. Reviews in local newspapers or each production provide critical analysis of play production quality. Feedback from audience members provide grass roots responses on artistic content, play selection suitability, and staging quality. Constructive feedback through MVT's volunteer program assists the theatre in evaluating the quality of the volunteer experience at the theatre and ways in which the program can be improved and enhanced in the future.

MVT's 40th Anniversary Season will be coordinated and supervised by the theatre's professional staff of seven full-time and five part-time positions. The staff is responsible directly to the theatre's board of directors for implementation of the theatre's annual play season.

The theatre has been in continuous operation for 39 years and has sustained considerable artistic and administrative growth throughout its existence. The 40th Anniversary Season will continue its commitment to high quality theatre arts presentations, the development of Hawaii's theatre practitioners, and the entertainment and enlightenment of Hawaii's audiences.

B. Facilities

Manoa Valley Theatre's 150-seat performing arts facility on East Manoa Road is home to its artistic and administrative operations. It was constructed in 1986 and opened in 1987. The facility is ADA compliant for the safety and comfort of its patrons.

Each play provides opportunities for community volunteers who are recruited on a play-by-play basis. Hands-on training in performance and technical theatre is provided by the play's guest director and the theatre's professional staff.
