Department's Position: 1 The Department respectfully and strongly opposes this measure. Fiscal Implications: If enacted, this measure could have severe fiscal implications by resulting in a 2 resurgence of vaccine preventable diseases, thus causing associated increases in medical costs related to 3 hospitalizations and potential fatalities. Department funds would also be expended to conduct the 4 epidemiological investigations necessary to determine the source and interrupt the spread of disease. 5 **Purpose and Justification:** This measure seeks to make Hawaii the only state in the nation in which 6 7 vaccinations are non-compulsory for school attendance and exemptions from vaccinations are allowed on any grounds. The continued observance and enforcement of scientifically proven, evidence-based 8 public health interventions such as school immunization entry requirements are essential to the 9 10 maintenance of high immunization rates necessary to prevent outbreaks of dangerous diseases. The effect of our school immunization entry requirements can be seen when comparing the estimated up-to-11 12 date vaccination coverage rate of Hawaii's 19-35 month old children of 78.8%, with the estimated up-todate vaccination coverage rates among children enrolled in kindergarten of 99%. Ultimately, enactment 13 of this measure could jeopardize the public's health by causing a significant decline in Hawaii's 14 childhood vaccination levels, resulting in an inevitable increase in illness, disability, and death from 15 vaccine preventable diseases not only among children, but persons of all ages, including the elderly and 16 17 infirm.
