Bill No. and Title: House Bill No. 3273, Relating to Traffic Infractions

Judiciary's Position:

While the Judiciary takes no position on this bill, an effective date of January 1, 2009 would be helpful to the Judiciary in ensuring proper implementation of the intent of this bill.

A change in the penalty section for certain infractions requires the Judiciary to (1) make database system changes, (2) obtain statewide approval from district court administrative judges for changes in monetary assessment and fees amounts (required under HRS 291D-9), and (3) inform external agencies and other court operations of the changes.
