TESTIMONY OF THE CHAIRPERSON OF THE BOARD OF LAND AND NATURAL RESOURCES

on House Bill 3340 - RELATING TO KAWAI NUI MARSH

BEFORE THE HOUSE COMMITTEE ON FINANCE

February 6, 2008

House Bill 3340 establishes the Kawai Nui Marsh Advisory Council (Council) and appropriates money to the Department of Land and Natural Resources (Department) for the work of the Council. The Department supports the intent of this measure, however has concerns with the budgetary impacts this bill will have on the Executive Supplemental Budget request.

The involvement of the community in the planning and implementation of programs in Kawai Nui Marsh is critical to maintain and increase public support for protecting and preserving this unique treasure. The Board of Land and Natural Resources recognized the key need for community support and participation when it included a requirement for community input in implementing the Kawai Nui Marsh Management Program.

In as much, the Department supports the involvement of the different community groups identified in the bill, but would like to suggest four other key participants that were not included in the proposed membership. The Department would suggest including the following representation in the Council:

- 1. One student representative from a Kailua area school as selected by a high school council:
- 2. One representative from the Kailua Chamber of Commerce;
- 3. A fourth ex-officio member representing the United States Fish and Wildlife Service; and
- 4. The Administrator of the Division of State Parks (fifth ex-officio member)

The Department also suggests keeping the Council size at a manageable level of 10 voting members and five ex-official members.

The Office of Hawaiian Affairs (OHA) <u>SUPPORTS</u> HB 3340, which would establish the Kawainui Marsh Advisory Council and would appropriate money to support the work of the council.

Over the years, dedicated groups and individuals have spent countless hours in restoration efforts and education of the larger community on the significance of the natural and cultural resources found within Kawainui Marsh. International organizations such as the Ramsar Convention on Wetlands have also recognized the importance of the natural and cultural resources found within Kawainui Marsh, and it has been declared eligible for listing on the National Register of Historic Places.

HB 3340 - Relating To Kawai Nui Marsh STRONGLY SUPPORT

My name is Shannon Wood, speaking on behalf of the *Windward Ahupua`a Alliance*, a <u>501c3</u> Hawai`i non-profit corporation which has several projects in *Kawai Nui Marsh* along its northern section and in the area between the dike & Kailua Town in support of <u>HB 3340</u>.

The bill would establish the Kawai Nui Marsh Advisory Council which would have a number of different functions.

These are the two areas which have been impacted by human activities over the past 75 years ranging from dumping by the military after World War Two to a junkyard which held an estimated 35,000 vehicles to the impacts of current industrial activities in *Kapa'a Valley* as well as a landfill closed in 1996 both of which lie directly *mauka* of the *Marsh*.

The area *makai* of the dike is loaded with invasive mangrove and jammed with a wide range of illegally-dumped materials. Although the *City & County of Honolulu* is removing the mangrove so that we can handle the man-made STUFF, budgetary constraints have kept our combined efforts to a minimum. Still, we move ahead - albeit slowly - because the future health of the *Marsh* and its inhabitants depends upon it.

WAA strongly supports HB 3340 and urges you to support it as well. Mahalo.



Mr. Chairman and members of the Committee,

I'm Charles Pe'ape'a Makawalu Burrows, a member of several Hawaiian and community organizations but I'm here this afternoon to testify in behalf of Ahahui Malama I ka Lokahi, a native Hawaiian conservation organization of 2000 members. Ahahui does support H.B. #3340 as proposed with amendments to support the establishment of a Kawainui Marsh Advisory Council and appropriated funding for its support for the fiscal year 2008-2009.

Ahahui Malama I ka Lokahi has been the leading Hawaiian environmental and cultural organization for the past 12 years in the ecological and cultural restoration in Kawainui Marsh and conducts educational programs for school, college and community groups. Under the DLNR/Division of State Parks, Ahahui is a cocurator with the Kailua Hawaiian Civic Club for Ulupo Heiau. It is also the curator for Na Pohaku o Hauwahine and recently signed a contract with the Kailua Bay Advisory Council to maintain a newly landscape Hawaiian garden at the Kailua Neighborhood Park in the Kawainui estuary. We therefore would like to have the following changes made in Section 2 of the new section 171 – Kawai Nui marsh advisory council.

In Section 2, lines 1 & 2, replace Kawai Nui Marsh Heritage Foundation with "Ahahui Malama I ka Lokahi".

On line 5 (3) add Ahahui Malama I ka Lokahi with the Kailua Hawaiian Civic Club.

On line 12 (6) add Division of State Parks.

In (e) (1) line 9 – In (e) (1) line 9 – Review and assist in updating and (revising) the (1994) Kawai Nui Marsh Master Plan which should include the Hamakua wetlands, adjacent waterways that enter into Kawainui from Maunawili and Kapa'a Valleys and flow into Kailua Bay (Ahupua'a of Kailua). There must be appropriate funding for the revision of the updated Kawainui/Kailua Ahupua'a Master Plan and approved by the Board of Land and Natural Resources.

On line 15 (4) add Kawai Nui marsh's natural and (cultural) resources.

We as Hawaiian, environmental and community organizations are actively involved in the ecological conservation and restoration of Kawainui Marsh and its sacred sites, We strongly urge this committee to include the Kanaka Maoli organizations such as Ahahui Malama I ka Lokahi and the Kailua Hawaiian Civic Club as partners with the State DLNR/DOFW/State Parks to offer the Hawaiian cultural and spiritual guidance and leadership in the restoration and educational programs for Kawainui Marsh. Excellent examples where this partner/stewardship agreement is taking place is at Ulupo Heiau and Na Pohaku o Hauwahine as well as on the Island of Kahoolawe.

Testimony before the House Committee on Finance regarding

H.B. 3340, Relating to Kawai Nui Marsh February 6, 2008

Chairman Oshiro, Vice Chairman Lee and other members of the Committee:

I am Susan Miller, President of Kawai Nui Heritage Foundation. The Foundation appreciates the efforts of Representative Chong in introducing H.B. 3340, but believes it is premature, and that a resolution would better serve the present situation for the following reasons.

- Kawai Nui Marsh is not a simple management problem -- it has aspects of a wildlife refuge, a cultural monument, an agricultural park (taro), and a recreational area. There is no model for an appropriate management structure in Hawai'i, so one will have to be developed or sought elsewhere. Whatever management structure is chosen will affect both the updating of the 1994 Master Plan and the composition of an advisory body.
- Kawai Nui is called the piko of the ahupua`a of Kailua, but it does not
 exist in a vacuum; there is the need to view Kawai Nui in the context of
 the ahupua`a, which includes Kaelepulu (Enchanted Lake), and not as an
 isolated entity. This needs to be taken into account by a management
 structure and an advisory body.
- There is a need for better and more consistent communication among <u>all</u> the entities involved in enhancement and restoration activities in Kawai Nui and the ahupua`a.

A resolution that

- 1. charged either DLNR-DOFAW or an existing community organization such as Ho`olaulima ia Kawai Nui with the ongoing responsibility for achieving consistent communication among all the entities involved in enhancement and restoration activities in Kawai Nui and the ahupua`a; and
- 2. charged the same group with
- developing a management structure,
- finding funds for updating the 1994 Master Plan.
- updating the 1994 Master Plan, and
- proposing the formation of an advisory body,

would go far toward improving the management of Kawai Nui Marsh.

Testimony of Robert E. Bourke

Chairman and Committee Members.

As a professional biologist I hold a special viewpoint with respect to biological wonder that is Kawai Nui Marsh. The company that I work for, Oceanit, was privileged to have conducted the first complet botanical survey of the wetland two years ago, and to have helped design the bird ponds that will be built in the upper areas of the marsh next summer. As a resident of Kailua I also look at the marsh from a different perspective in appreciation of the open space and recreational opportunities it offers to my community, but also in fear of it's potential to flood out the homes of my neighbors. As a board member of the Enchanted Lake Residents Association I see Kawainui Marsh as the potential source of waters restored to the Kailua Waterways from which they were divided in the 1960's by the original flood control project.

There are many ways to view the Kawai Nui Marsh, depending upon ones cultural and educational background. To properly manage a complex system such as this, the use of a governing advisory board is both appropriate and necessary. I support the passage of HB3340.
