# BEFORE THE SENATE COMMITTEE ON WAYS AND MEANS

April 1, 2008

House Bill 3348, House Draft 2, Senate Draft 1 appropriates \$1 to the Hawaii Preservation Fund endowment, as administered by the National Trust for Historic Preservation, in cooperation with the Historic Hawaii Foundation. While the Department of Land and Natural Resources (Department) recognizes and appreciates the work and support of the Historic Hawaii Foundation, the Department nonetheless has concerns with the fiscal impacts this measure will have on the Executive Supplemental Budget request. The Department instead, respectfully asks the Committee to support the Department's Supplemental Budget request, which allocates funds to the Department's Historic Preservation Division, to support historic preservation across the State.

Position requests include two Compliance Specialists, which will provide accurate project intake and classification, consistent data base maintenance and help ensure timely responses to public inquiries, as well as, a Librarian to maintain the State Historic Preservation Division libraries on all islands and provide a consistent filing system for reports.

Additional money is requested for reinternment of iwi in the State Inventory on all islands. The funding will allow the department to purchase burial vaults and to pay for labor to reinter the iwi. The Department is also requesting lease rent monies for Hawaii Island staff, which lost its Kona office space and is in need of a permanent office.

On behalf of Historic Hawai'i Foundation (HHF), I am writing in support of HB3348 HD2 SD1, with amendments to restore an appropriate funding amount up to \$500,000 and to establish the effective date as July 1, 2008.

Since 1974, Historic Hawai'i Foundation has been a statewide leader for historic preservation. HHF works to preserve the unique architectural and cultural heritage of Hawai'i and believes that historic preservation is an important element in the present and future quality of life and economic viability of the state.

Historic Hawai'i Foundation supports HB3348 HD2 SD1, which would capitalize a Hawai'i Preservation Fund with Historic Hawai'i Foundation, in association with the National Trust for Historic Preservation (NTHP), with funds as matched by private sector contributions.

NTHP is a national nonprofit organization chartered by Congress. It currently administers a spend-down preservation fund for projects in Hawai'i. The Hawai'i Preservation Fund, established through a gift from Historic Hawai'i Foundation in 1998, is anticipated to be depleted by the end of 2008, leaving Hawai'i projects to compete for limited unrestricted national dollars.

HB3348 HD2 SD1 will help to establish a permanent Hawai'i Preservation Fund. The State funding will be leveraged by private contributions, including a lead gift of \$100,000 from a generous donor. Creating a perpetual endowment for the Hawai'i Preservation Fund will create a dedicated funding stream for preservation projects in the state, which will then provide a catalyst for preservation activities and leverage additional investment from private sources.

The Hawai'i Preservation Fund will increase the viability of individual preservation projects by providing grants to nonprofit and government organizations to support cultural heritage resource protection efforts in Hawai'i. Grants may be used for planning and assessment, education and interpretation, and stabilization, rehabilitation and restoration of historic sites. These kinds of grants have proven to be an effective way to foster community-based efforts to save important landmarks, to initiate neighborhood or community-wide programs that reinforce sense of place, and to reuse historic buildings for contemporary needs. Helping to strengthen Hawai'i's historic fabric is also a benefit for the growing reliance on heritage tourism and cultural travel.

Therefore, Historic Hawai'i Foundation urges your support for HB3348 HD2 SD1 to capitalize the Hawai'i Preservation Fund.

Please accept this testimony in strong support of HB 3348 - Relating to Historic Preservation.

The legislature finds that, to date, funding for preserving our local culture has been insufficient. To address the insufficient funding for historic preservation, HB 3348 will appropriate funds for the purpose of funding the Hawai'i Preservation Fund endowment. Historic Hawai'i Foundation, in cooperation with the National Trust for Historic Preservation, will establish the Hawai'i Preservation Fund.

Preserving Hawai i's irreplaceable edifices and scenic landscapes should take precedence in the Legislature this session as we look to recover from slumping tourist numbers. The National Trust for Historic Preservation provides strong evidence of the emergence of Cultural Heritage Tourism as an increasingly popular trend in US tourism as well as a growing economic. Overall, cultural heritage tourists are more affluent, stay longer and spend more while contributing to global understanding through cultural exchange and commerce. Cultural and heritage visitors spend, on average, \$623 per trip compared to \$457 for all U.S. travelers.

The Hawai'i Preservation Fund is envisioned as an endowment vehicle which would allow the Historic Hawai'i Foundation to compete for federal funds. The State funding will be leveraged by private contributions, including a lead gift of \$100,000 from a generous donor. Creating a perpetual endowment for the Hawai'i Preservation Fund will create a dedicated funding stream for preservation projects in the state, which will then provide a catalyst for preservation activities and leverage additional investment from private sources. To ensure transparency of allocated state funding, this bill would also prohibit the release of funds until the appropriated funds are matched by private contributions.

It is in the best interest of this State to preserve Hawai'i's uniqueness and cultural identity for the benefit of business as well as tourism. Please support HB 3348 to ensure that the special places of the Islands are preserved, used and enjoyed. Mahalo.

I submit testimony in **strong support** of House Bill 3348 - Relating to Historic Preservation.

Hawaii's multi-ethnic and multi-cultural society is represented in its diverse landscape markers- its buildings, gardens, and edifices. For instance, Japanese temples and shrines were once visible markers as community and plantation centers when Japanese immigrants were establishing their families in a new land. Today, few of these temples exist and those that do are hidden gems in our communities. If neglected, these last remaining temples will also be demolished, with no story left to tell our descendants. There are many more examples of the diversity of our broad ethnicities including our Chinese temples, theaters, and cultural centers, plantation camps, ethnic neighborhoods, and countless other historically significant "places" that can be listed.

Why is it important to preserve our historic buildings? Essentially, the traveler asks: "Do the people living in this place believe their land to be special and important?" If they look around and see that the landscape is well-preserved and historic structures are highlighted, it tells that the people of the area treasure their heritage. They then seek further to understand its secrets.

It is shallow to present Hawaii as a place to see beautiful beaches alone. Our cultures are the heart of Hawaii, and in fact, a large part of the reason why Hawaii originally grew to be a tourist destination in the first place. We must uphold our cultures because it signifies our respect of our past and our multiethnic cultural diversity.
