

My name is Virginia Pressler, Senior Vice President for Hawaii Pacific Health. For more than a century, families in Hawaii and the Pacific Region have relied on the hospitals, clinics, physicians and staff of Hawaii Pacific Health as trusted healthcare providers. Through Hawaii Pacific Health (HPH), Hawaii's leading hospitals and clinics – Kapi'olani Medical Center for Women & Children, Kapi'olani Medical Center at Pali Momi, Straub Clinic & Hospital, Wilcox Memorial Hospital and Kauai Medical Clinic – focus on delivering the highest quality, most accessible and most affordable care and services. Our non-profit integrated healthcare system is the state's largest healthcare provider and is committed to improving the health and well-being of the people of Hawaii and the Pacific Region through its four hospitals, 18 outpatient centers and a team of 1,100 physicians on the islands of Oahu, Kauai and Lanai.

We are writing in Strong Support of HCR 138 HD2. HPH has been an early adopter and strong supporter of Telemedicine since 1998 to increase access to specialty medical care from rural areas of Hawaii and currently is providing Telemedicine services. However, there remain significant, non-technology related issues that are slowing the wider adoption of Telemedicine here in Hawaii. These include lack of full reimbursement for medical services provided via telemedicine from Medicare/Medicaid as well as private medical insurance and lack of clarity about Malpractice Insurance coverage for medical care provided via telemedicine.

I am testifying as an individual with the experience and knowledge of both managed care, public health, and the issues/capabilities of Telemedicine at the state and national level and not as a representative of my employment.

I'm a registered nurse certified in managed care and enrolled in the MBA Health Administration program from Loma Linda School of Public Health. I am currently employed as the Telemedicine Coordinator at Shriners Hospitals for Children, Honolulu in which I've developed and managed the program since it inception in 1998. I have coordinated the evaluation and management of nearly 100 patients a year by Telemedicine, and have witness the benefits and effectiveness of delivering health care to rural areas by Telemedicine.

During my eight (8) year involvement with Telemedicine, I've found that the most difficult barriers are due to human factors and the disconnection of system. Telehealth is multi-facets involving a variety of stakeholders. Many of these challenges are common to all of us, but working in silos has led to a duplication of effort and inefficient use and/or waste of resources and manpower. The challenges of integration over a local, state, and national level could only be efficiently addressed as a coordinated effort. Therefore, I passionately support the formation of a Telehealth Task Force to work collaboratively with the stakeholders.

I respectfully ask for your support of HCR 138, HD2 to potentially expand telemedicine applications in Hawaii. Broader support for implementing and sustaining telemedicine programs is needed especially on the island of Hawaii where the shortage of primary care physicians and specialists has reached a crisis. Further, with transportation fuel costs on the rise there is a compelling need, now more than ever, to utilize technological advances that afford efficient and cost effective systems of healthcare delivery.

Among other telemedicine applications at Hilo Medical Center, a newborn in the hospital's nursery can now be seen by specialists at Kapiolani Medical Center through two-way video conferencing. In addition to video conferencing access, pediatric cardiologists can also examine radiographic images and echocardiograms of newborns, in real-time, to assist Hilo physicians with timely patient care decisions, in some cases avoiding unnecessary air ambulance transport off island.

Support from the State Legislature, the John A. Burns School of Medicine and other healthcare institutions will promote telemedicine as a viable alternative to the customary in person physician office visit and foster a paradigm shift in Hawaii's healthcare marketplace.
