The Hawaii Government Employees Association, AFSCME Local 152, AFL-CIO strongly supports H.C.R. 277, H.D. 2. We concur that the nursing shortage can be solved only through the collaboration of all stakeholders, including educators, policy makers, employers, nurses, consumers, labor organizations and the Hawaii State Center for Nursing who share the common goal of increasing Hawaii's supply of well-educated and dedicated nursing professionals.

Prompt action on a variety of levels is required to avoid a serious shortage of nurses locally within the next several years that could affect the quality of care patients receive, especially in hospitals. For example, we must increase the number of nursing positions in our schools, train new nursing faculty members, transform nursing education, and develop initiatives to recruit and retain nurses. It is our belief that by working together, we can solve this complex problem.
