Dear Chairs Ige, Chun-Oakland, Kokubun, and members of the Committees:

My name is Leinaala Ley and I am the Director of Government Relations for the American Cancer Society Hawaii Pacific Inc. Thank you for the opportunity to present comments on HCR 33, HD1.

The American Cancer Society is the nationwide community-based voluntary health organization dedicated to eliminating cancer as a major health problem by preventing cancer, saving lives, and diminishing suffering from cancer through research, education, advocacy, and service. In Hawaii, the American Cancer Society serves the local community through our corporate headquarters in Honolulu and seven field offices across the state: two on Big Island, three on Oahu, one on Kauai and one on Maui to serve Maui County. Each year the American Cancer Society Hawaii Pacific Inc. interacts with tens of thousands of individuals touched by cancer and thousands more who are active volunteers.

The American Cancer Society supports all efforts to educate the public about cancer risks, early detection methods, and cancer prevention strategies. HCR 33 will contribute to our efforts to raise awareness of ovarian cancer by recognizing the month of September as National Ovarian Cancer Month and Gynelogical Cancer Awareness Month. Cancer of the uterus is the most common gynelogical cancer followed by ovarian cancer and cervical cancer. Combined, these three gynelogical cancers will account for approximately 46 cancer deaths in the State of Hawaii this year. All scientifically grounded outreach efforts to educate the public about the prevention and detection of gynelogical cancers should be supported and we commend the legislature for taking this step to prioritize cancer prevention and detection in our state.
