- 1 Department's Position: The Department of Health cannot support this bill as written. We believe
- there are multiple problems with this bill as drafted.
- 3 **Fiscal Implications:** The bill creates a loan guarantee revolving fund in the state treasury and
- 4 appropriates an unspecified amount of general funds.
- 5 Purpose and Justification: Section 1 of this measure amends Chapter 321, Hawaii Revised Statutes, to
- 6 have the Department of Health (DOH) review construction plans of "home and community based
- 7 services care homes and long-term care home facilities" to determine if these entities' proposed repairs
- 8 or alterations meet DOH licensing standards. In section 2, the "Definitions" group together homes and
- 9 facilities that are under the jurisdiction of two separate state departments: the Department of Human
- Services (DHS) and the Department of Health. DOH licenses (1) Type I and Type II Adult Residential
- 11 Care Homes (ARCH); (2) Expanded ARCHs; (3) Assisted Living Facilities; (4) Developmental
- Disabilities Domiciliary Homes; and, (5) Nursing homes. DOH does not license Community Care
- Foster Family Homes, which are certified by and under the jurisdiction of DHS, or Adult Foster Homes.

As to the DOH's review of repair and renovation plans for ARCHs, the department already 1 2 performs this function. Hawaii Administrative Rules (HAR) Title 11, Chapter 100.1-23(q)(1) states: "Drawings and specifications for all new construction or additions, alterations or repairs to existing 3 buildings shall be submitted to the department for review prior to construction" Chapter 100.1-23(q)(2) 4 goes on to say: "While final authority to approve the construction and fire safety features of such 5 6 building rests with county agencies and fire marshals, if construction drawings and specifications are submitted to the department, the department shall promptly review such submittals and make every 7 effort to advise the applicant of features which appear nonconforming: ..." Despite the fact that this 8 review language does not appear in all Office of Health Care Assurance administrative rules, DOH 9 provides this courtesy review, when requested, to all settings licensed by the Department of Health. 10 11 After review of such plans, and if they meet the criteria of current licensing standards, DOH issues a letter to that effect. All providers must obtain the appropriate county building permits and 12 comply with current county building, land use, fire codes and ordinances before beginning 13 construction or alterations. 14 While we understand the intent of this measure, we must oppose it as written. 15

PURPOSE: The purpose of this bill is to create a home and community based services care home and long-term care home facility repair and renovation loan guarantee office in the Department of Human Services to administer a program to guarantee loans to owners of homes or facilities to be repaired or renovated and appropriates funds.

DEPARTMENT'S POSITION: The Department of Human Services (DHS) cannot support this bill as written. This bill will create a continuous financial obligation of the State to provide repair and renovation loans as well as create a new revolving fund and the need to provide staffing for the proposed "home and community based services care home and long-term care home facility repair AN EQUAL OPPORTUNITY AGENCY

and renovation loan guarantee office". Also, this bill, as written, would obligate the Department of Human Services to provide loans to facilities that are deemed eligible by the Department of Health.

In lieu of this bill, we recommend that the language of this bill be amended by replacing its contents with the language of H.B. 3130 which would provide grants, instead of loans, to operators of community care foster family homes to assist with home upgrades.

Under the proposed grant program in H.B. 3130, grants would be offered for one year, for a maximum of \$25,000 per recipient, to assist community care foster family homes (CCFFHs) to make home upgrades that will increase the capacity for cost-effective home and community-based services for elderly and/or disabled Medicaid clients. This bill will incentivize providers to serve more Medicaid clients.

This is one in a series of initiatives that DHS has initiated to facilitate the placement of Medicaid recipients who are either "wait-listed" in hospitals for nursing home level of care placements, or are residing in nursing homes and desirous of returning to the community.

Our first initiative, the "Going Home" program, has moved over 830 "wait-listed" clients from acute hospital settings statewide to alternative residential care in CCFFHs and Expanded Adult Residential Care Homes. This program saves \$78,475 per

year, per client. Currently, there are 149 clients in the "Going Home" program.

Our second initiative was to increase recruitment of Community Care Foster Family Homes (CCFFH). Since September 2005, there has been a 35% increase in the number of CCFFHs. There are currently 795 certified CCFFHs. Thus capacity for this service continues to increase.

Our third initiative was to recommend to the Legislature that CCFFHs be offered the same opportunity at the discretion of the Department to provide care to a third nursing home level of care client, as the Department of Health can do with its Expanded Adult Residential Care Homes. Effective July 1, 2007, the section 346-331, Hawaii Revised Statutes (HRS), governing CCFFHs was amended by the Legislature to allow an increase for a third Medicaid client to reside in CCFFHs at the discretion of the department. This amendment was a major step forward in further expanding long-term care capacity which provides more placement choices and saves State revenues in Medicaid.

The proposed grant program in H.B. 3130 will build on these other initiatives. It will assist with the capital investment required to make home upgrades to accommodate up to three Medicaid clients in the home. Home upgrades costing from an estimated \$5,000 to \$25,000 per home may be needed to accommodate up to three clients in the home.

The grant program will incentivize operators of CCFFHs, who run small family owned and operated businesses, to use all three

slots in their homes to serve Medicaid clients. It provides an economical means for the operators to continue to provide services to these clients as they become more frail and not displace clients, who feel they are part of the operator's family, as the client requires more assistance.

DHS has already hired a consultant who will evaluate up to 120 CCFFHs for these home upgrades at no cost to the operator. The consultant will provide up to 120 CCFFH operators with estimates and the information that they could provide to building contractors to obtain bids to do the construction. The consultant will also develop samples of typical home upgrade requirements and costs, based on the evaluation of the up to 120 CCFFHs. This should assist other operators to estimate the cost for them to make these upgrades.

This grant of up to \$25,000 per CCFFH recipient has some requirements.

• It provides the CCFFH operator an eighteen month

"grace" period during which they must either begin

providing the sixty months of care for a second and/or

third Medicaid client, or return the full amount of the

grant. In essence, this is an interest free loan that

encourages all operators to consider making these home

upgrades which should reduce the displacement of

clients as they experience the need for more intensive

care.

- For those CCFFH operators who do provide care for a second or third Medicaid client for a total of sixty months, the grant obligation is completed.
- For CCFFH operators who provide a portion of the sixty months of care within five years, they would only need to repay the grant in proportion to amount of service they did not provide. So, for example, if they provide forty months of care, they could keep two-thirds of the grant and repay the one-third for the months of care they originally agreed to provide but are no longer able to provide.

The Department has requested \$1,600,000 in its budget for State fiscal year 2008-2009. This money will be offset with State fund savings of \$78,475/year/client for Medicaid clients deinstitutionalized from hospitals to home and community-based services. This is one more strategy that DHS is using to reduce Medicaid client who are in the hospital as "waitlisted" patients.

The Department appreciates the CCFFH operators and the significant role they play in providing care for our most vulnerable elderly. They are key partners in addressing the "waitlist" issue for hospitalized Medicaid patients.

<u>DEPARTMENT'S POSITION:</u> The Department of Human Services (DHS) appreciates the intent of this bill and respectfully requests that its passage does not replace nor adversely impact the priorities in the Executive Supplemental Budget.

We support sustaining perinatal clinic and case management services to women on Oahu with a history of substance abuse. Last year, the Department was agreeable to being appropriated the funds to contract with the University Clinical Educational and Research Associates program at the University of Hawaii, Department of Obstetrics, Gynecology, and Women's Health to continue the pilot perinatal clinic and the provision of case management

services because the Department would have been able to enhance any State funds with matching Federal funds. The consequence is increased risk to the health and development of their children and themselves."

I am writing to urge you to continue support of the PATH clinic. As you are aware the clinic was established from funding by ACT 248 in 2006 and the funding continued by ACT 147 in 2007. The PATH clinic opened in April, 2007 and since that time, we have served over 60 women, most pregnant or immediately post-partum. We have had 16 women deliver healthy infants so far, all but one was clean at the time of delivery. The one woman who was using at the time of delivery has since gone into residential treatment with her infant, and has remained clean since that time. We have multiple testimonies from the women that we've helped begin a new life.

Since opening, we have continued to add services. We now have an addictions fellow seeing the women for assessments and treatment of co-occurring psychiatric disorders. We are in the process of adding a full-time therapeutic child care provider who has been working with the women, teaching parenting skills. We have obtained two small grants from the Women's Fund of Hawaii, supporting the building of self-esteem through therapeutic craft projects and from the March of Dimes of Hawaii supporting our motivational incentive program.

Unfortunately, we have been unable to find a pediatrician willing to be a primary care provider for the infants, but we are still looking.



The clinic is currently billing Medicaid and other third party payers for our services when appropriate, which has offset some of the costs, however the clinic still requires approximately \$300,000 per year to cover the costs of the social worker, nurse manager, child care provider and medical assistant. Last year the money went through the department of human services and then to UCERA, as the current amendment states.

Not only do they provide basic prenatal care, this clinic covers a variety of drug education classes, parenting workshops, healthy relationships, and also has a day out of the week to do activities such as sewing, hands-on care with children and free discussions with one of the healthcare professionals.

The clinic is unique in its own way. First, it is located in a house which is very warming for the women and children. Secondly, they have a generous incentive program for active participation in groups and other areas in the clinic. They will also provide cab rides to and from the clinic, if you don't have any transportation. It is wonderful, knowing that you're in for a comfortable ride especially during pregnancy. The PATH Clinic is providing things beyond its mission statement and calling; such as its social work, for instance if you don't have any housing they will work with you immediately to find a solution temporarily, until something more permanent turns out, which is more than I can say about other services that just gives you the wait and run arounds. A lot of women like me were lost in the system and didn't have any reliable answers or referrals to be directed to. Luckily for the PATH Clinic's outstanding social work they will make the time for you to get whatever help or concern it is that you need and make forward progress. Lastly, I would like to compliment their family-based environment. The staff here is very welcoming and supportive throughout all your needs. They are non-judgmental and confidential with any information you share, which makes it really less-discouraging. Being open and honest knowing that you are coming from a challenging background or presently being challenged and able to come to a place like this and have some peace are very encouraging and reassuring on your conscience. Sometimes they have family-like gatherings on the holidays and they provide food, fun, and games for the women and children and it's just a great feeling for people who don't have any family there for

I hope to see the PATH Clinic in the future still operating on its remarkable purpose. One day I seriously wanted to end my life because I didn't know what to do, who to turn to, and how to do, until I looked up when I was riding city bus and read the PATH Clinic's advertisement. They took care of me and other women and their families. This clinic needs

to stay open for the sake of people like us in these trialing times of our lives; individually and specifically in REAL RESULTS for programs to help us become a productive member of society. I urge the committee to pass H.B.2881 Thank you for the opportunity to testify.

Good morning Chairs Ige and Chun-Oakland., and Co-Chairs Fukunaga and Ihara I am Linda Rich, Executive Director of The Salvation Army Family Treatment Services which operates the Women's Way residential alcohol and drug treatment program for pregnant and parenting women and their children.

### I would like to testify regarding the benefits of passing HB 2881..

Substance abusing and chemically dependant women who become pregnant often avoid prenatal care because of shame and fear. This may result in serious health consequences for themselves and their children. A clinic providing specialized, comprehensive care has the potential to reduce the incidence of a number of complications of pregnancy including low birth weight, stillbirths, miscarriages, infant mortality, prematurity and developmental disorders associated with maternal alcohol and drug use. Additionally, the woman's health may already be compromised by the affects of chronic drug or alcohol use leading to serious threats to her well being during pregnancy and labor and delivery. The PATH Clinic, Perinatal Addiction Treatment of Hawaii, has been providing effective comprehensive services to reduce the medical risk for addicted women in pregnancy, increasing positive birth outcomes.

In addition to providing prenatal care, this clinic is designed to address the emotional and behavioral and environmental issues related to the woman's substance use and to assist women to access and utilize both medical and behavioral health treatment. The clinic staff is trained to provide motivational interventions to encourage abstinence from alcohol, tobacco and other drugs. They provide outreach and transportation, critical components in reaching this population and keeping them engaged in treatment. The clinic has had success in helping women maintain abstinence and in referring those in need of more intensive treatment into appropriate programs. Their holistic approach to care is based on best practices and is supported by research related to this model of care The PATH Clinic is a vital component of the State's response to the methamphetamine epidemic that is devastating families and increasing the State's costs related to Child Welfare and incarceration.

Family Treatment Services, which operates the Women's Way alcohol and drug treatment program for pregnant and parenting women and their children, has supported the development of this clinic. We believe that this clinic meets a community need for specialized OB-GYN care for women at risk due to substance

abuse. Pregnant substance using women often want to deliver a healthy infant but are unable to stop their drug use and, out of fear, do not seek prenatal care leading to the complications already listed. ## Testimony in SUPPORT of HB22366 By Stephen A. Kula, Ph.D., NHA Executive Director, Organ Donor Center of Hawaii

My name is Dr. Steve Kula; I am the Executive Director of the Organ Donor Center of Hawaii, (ODCH). I submit my testimony in STRONG SUPPORT of HB2366. We believe that this Bill would save lives and provide needed assistance to the citizens of our State who wish to be donors and help someone in need of an organ transplant. Currently in the State of Hawaii more people are added to the organ transplant waitlist than are able to be transplanted off of it. In the past few years we have been declining in the number of donors and thus the number of organs and transplantations. Consequently more patients are dying while on the waitlist or being removed because they are too sick to be transplanted.

We believe that our community should be a society where people see organ donation as a social responsibility. In such a society, donating organs would be accepted as a normal part of dying, and in cases where a person died without recording a specific choice about donating his or her organs, the surviving family members would be comfortable giving permission. To achieve this there must be some mechanism for everyone to access information and be given the opportunity to give an informed consent to donate their organs so that others might live.

Organ donor designation on Hawaii driver's licenses has shown to have significant impact in predisposing potential donor families to consent for donation, where 94% of families consented to donation when their loved one had indicated so on his or her Hawaii driver's license as compared to an overall consent rate of less than 50%. If this bill is enacted we would be able to offer everyone, not just those who are able to drive, the ability to choose to be or not to be an organ donor.

The appropriated amount does not need to be very much if anything at all. The Department of Health currently has a grant application into the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services, (HRSA) for the sum of \$150,000.00 but will not know the outcome of that application until sometime prior to the start date of August 1, 2008. ODCH is also working on private funding and in-kind services to help supplement funds for public education and development. Other affected agencies, i.e. National Kidney Foundation of Hawaii, have also agreed to do their specific parts of the registry project with in-kind services as well. We ask that you accept the attached amendment to reflect this arrangement.

Please allow us to establish a statewide organ donor registry by passing this important piece of legislation.

SECTION 2. There is appropriated out of the general revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2008-2009 as a grant pursuant to chapter 42F, Hawaii Revised Statutes, to the Hawaii Organ

Procurement Organization for the establishment of a statewide organ donor registry, provided that no funds shall be released pursuant to this Act if funds are received from federal funds, other private funds, or a combination thereof.

The sum appropriated shall be expended by the department of health for the purposes of this Act.

I applaud the introduction of HB 2366 – Relating to Organ Donor Registry and I am submitting testimony in full support of the passage of this measure.

My name is Tony L. Sagayadoro, Program Coordinator of the Minority Organ Tissue Transplant Education Program (MOTTEP), a minority outreach program of the Organ Donor Center of Hawaii. MOTTEP is also a founding member of the Hawaii Coalition on Organ Donation.

Since the passage of Act 88 in year 1999, which provided the Clinical Staff of Organ Donor Center of Hawaii 24 hour access to Hawaii Driver's License Information to know whether Organ Donor designation was indicated on the driver's license, more lives have been saved. Organ Donor designation on Hawaii Driver's license have shown significant impact on families knowing their loved one's wishes, 94% of families approached consented to donation knowing that their loved had indicated their wishes to be an organ donor on their driver's license compared to an overall consent rate of less than 50%.

The sad part the number of patients waiting for organ transplant continue to increase at a very alarming rate, there are more patients waiting and the number continue to increase everyday. Any of these patients can be anyone of us, our neighbor, families, friends or anyone that we know.

On the positive note through the collaboration and partnership of different agencies involved in the promotion of organ and tissue donation and the formation of the Hawaii Coalition on Donation (HCOD) has produced encouraging results. During the past seven years, the number of drivers who signed up as organ donor had increased. And having a Statewide Organ Donor Registry will encourage not only those who have driver's license but to every individual to have the opportunity to have their wishes documented by signing up through the donor registry.

On behalf of the Advisory Board Member of MOTTEP, we fully support the passage of HB 2366 to encourage more people to serve as organ donors by registering to the Statewide Organ Donor Registry to help increase available organs and tissue for transplantation to saves the lives of patients in need organ transplants.



- 1 Department's Position: The Department respectfully opposes this measure due to its potential adverse
- 2 impact on the Administration's priorities as established in the Executive Supplemental Budget. In
- addition, previous DOH testimony on the provisions of Parts I and II of this measure has documented
- 4 EMS services for both regions of Maui County that are comparable to other rural communities
- 5 statewide.

- 6 **Fiscal Implications:** Provides an unspecified level of funding for FY2009.
- 7 **Purpose and Justification:** The Department appreciates the desire of communities to reduce the
- 8 waiting times for advanced life support ambulance arrival after a 911 call, which in rural communities
- 9 such as Haiku and Molokai, may seem excessive.
- The Department's Emergency Medical Services and Injury Prevention Systems Branch recently implemented the Hawaii Emergency Medical Services Information System (HEMSIS) that allows examination of data that is fairly current. Records were analyzed to assess response times for advanced life support ambulances to the Haiku region and the island of Molokai in the year 2007. During this period, for the Haiku area, there were 497 ambulance responses to 911 calls from that area of which 187 were categorized as serious or critical. The median response time from 911 dispatches to ambulance

arrival was 14.4 minutes. The Makawao ambulance unit handled 83% of the calls from that area, with

- the Kula ambulance unit responding to 12% and a few responses by other units. The Makawao
- 2 ambulance unit averages approximately 144 cases per month with approximately one fourth of its calls
- 3 from the Haiku area. Should a new unit be added at Haiku, it would experience approximately 38 cases
- 4 per month. The Department finds that ambulance response times for serious cases in the Haiku region
- 5 meet our target of response within 15 minutes or less for rural areas of the state.
- As for the island of Molokai, a 24-hour advanced life support ambulance unit already exists as
- 7 part of the contract for 911 ambulance services for the County of Maui. The Molokai ambulance unit
- 8 transported 521 serious/critical cases averaging 2 cases/day with a median response time of 4.7 minutes,
- 9 well below the rural target of less than 15 minutes.

Chair Ige and Members of the Committee:

The Attorney General provides the following comments:

Part IV, section 8 of this measure seeks to appropriate funds for the expansion and construction of facilities at the "Waianae coast comprehensive health center." The funds are to be expended by the Department of Health (DOH). In order for the DOH to transmit funds to a specific private entity, the appropriation must be made as a grant pursuant to chapter 42F, Hawaii Revised Statutes (HRS).

Furthermore, the definition of the term "grant" in section 42F-1, HRS, requires that the Legislature specify the organization to which the grant will be awarded. The bill must state the correct legal name of the entity to which the grant is to be awarded, not the name under which it may be doing business, in order for DOH to appropriately contract with the entity. In this case, our research indicates that the "Waianae coast comprehensive health center" is a former name under which the entity did business, but it is not an incorporated entity capable of entering into contracts in that name. The entity's legal name is Waianae District Comprehensive Health and Hospital Board, The bill should specify that the chapter 42F grant be Incorporated. awarded to the Waianae District Comprehensive Health and Hospital

Chair Ige and Members of the Committee:

I am Major General Robert G. F. Lee, State Adjutant General. I am testifying on House Bill 2888 HD2. The department supports the intent of this measure, specifically the provision for emergency power systems for Queen's Medical Center, as long as it does not replace or adversely impact priorities as indicated in the Executive Supplemental Budget Request.

Queen's Medical Center is the only trauma center in the state. It services patients from Oahu and the Neighbor Islands. It also service Pacific jurisdictions with patients throughout the region.

Queen's Medical Center emergency generator is currently not sufficient to support a prolonged power outage resulting from a major disaster. During the aftermath of the October 2006 earthquakes, the need for this improvement was evident when services were severely hampered by the prolonged power outage.

In order to upgrade and to make modifications to its electrical power infrastructure, Queen's Medical Center has requested financial assistance to build an emergency generator capacity that would accommodate an estimated peak demand of six thousand kilowatts of electricity.

A grant to the Queen's Medical Center under Chapter 42F, Hawaii Revised Statutes, may be a viable strategy to hasten the installation of additional emergency generators and storage areas.

For these reasons, we support the immediate passage of this measure. Chair Ige, thank you for allowing me to submit this written testimony.

Thank you for this opportunity to offer comments on House Bill 2888 HD1, with regard to two programs relating to Kona Community Hospital.

1) Part III, Sections 5, 6 an 7 - appropriates funds relating to a mobile medical van program to be based at the Kona Community Hospital and to provide basic medical clinical services to the South Kona, Ka'u and upper Puna areas of the County of Hawaii.

Kona Community Hospital is a major acute care hospital and Kohala Hospital is a Critical Access Hospital (CAH) of the West Hawaii Region of Hawaii Health Systems Corporation serving approximately 60,000 people on the West side of the island including the southern portion of the island of Hawaii. Ka'u Hospital is a Critical Access Hospital of the East Hawaii Region, Hawaii Health Systems Corporation.

The mobile medical van program offers a creative solution to address the serious lack of access to appropriate emergency and clinical medical care for residents

and visitors in the South Kona, Ka'u and upper Puna areas of the County of Hawaii. This measure however, appropriates funds for purchase of a mobile van, planning and equipment to provide medical care services and requires program and funding contingencies for an additional two years. We support this measure if an adequate funding stream follows and funding is provided from grants/foundations etc. to pay for the operational cost of the service.

2) Part VII, Sections 13 and 14 – appropriates funds for a Family Practice Residency Program at Kona Community Hospital.

Regarding the Family Practice Residency Program, we appreciate your consideration to establish a family practice residency program to bring healthcare provider support in various hospital inpatient service areas, outpatient or clinic-based services to benefit the Kona and surrounding communities where available physician shortages exist. The significant costs of establishing a Family Practice Residency Program are recognized in this measure and an appropriation to support only one year of a three-year family practice residency program to be based at Kona Community Hospital presents somewhat of a concern.

We ask your consideration and direction to build and enhance the establishment of a Family Practice Residency Program at Hilo Medical Center and to expand this program to cover Kona Community Hospital. Such an approach to strengthen and expand the Hilo program to include Kona Community Hospital would offer the desired benefits of bringing additional healthcare practitioners to serve the West Hawaii community and to optimize limited program resources.

Thank you for your consideration to the needs of the Island of Hawaii.

Chair Ige, Vice Chair Fukunaga, and Members of the Committee:

My name is Mark Yamakawa, Executive Vice President and Chief Operating Officer of The Queen's Health Systems, testifying in strong support of HB 2888 HD2, which appropriates funds to the State's only trauma center to upgrade emergency power systems to ensure sufficient capacity in the event of a major disaster.

The October 2006 Big Island earthquakes and subsequent power outage severely hampered The Queen's Medical Center's (Queen's) ability to provide comprehensive health care and serve as the "heart" of the State's trauma system. Queen's was forced to rely on back-up generator power and the hospital activated its internal disaster plan.

Patients Discharged: In the early hours following the earthquakes, the severity of damage and injuries was not immediately clear. Queen's asked physicians to discharge sufficiently healthy patients to open up bed capacity in the event the Medical Center received patients on ventilators from home-care settings (who were affected by the power outage) or possibly had to accommodate neighbor island-transferred patients.

Elevators Inoperable: Following the earthquakes, only certain elevators worked intermittently, affecting the delivery of food to patients as well as the ability to move patients to other floors.

Lack of Air Conditioning, Impact on Diagnostic Equipment and Sterility: With limited back-up generator power, the Medical Center went without air conditioning. Higher than normal temperatures affected diagnostic equipment, which must remain cool to function correctly. Queen's CT and MRI (vital tools in our ability to diagnose and treat suspected traumas) became unusable, forcing the Medical Center to go on "Trauma Divert" for the first time ever. Emergency medical services had to divert incoming trauma patients to Tripler because Queen's could not function as a trauma center without a reliable CT or MRI. Staff physicians were also concerned about the sterility of the Operating Room due to increased warmth and humidity in the Medical Center.

Queen's has been working on an electrical upgrade project since 2004, and the 2006 earthquakes stressed the urgent need for additional emergency power generation. Anticipated project cost is

Founded in 1859 by Queen Emma and King Kamehameha IV

\$34.5 million, which includes the cost of four new emergency generators, a building to house the four generators that is capable of withstanding a Category V hurricane, and related infrastructure. Queen's is grateful to the State Legislature for its allocation of \$2 million toward the project in 2006. That funding was utilized for the purchase of two new 20,000-gallon fuel tanks, and contributed, along with Queen's, to the purchase of the four generators. Implementation of the project will provide sufficient on-site emergency electrical generation capacity to back up Queen's for seven continuous days, in the event of a utility power outage.

As the State's trauma center, Queen's appreciates the Legislature's support and acknowledgement that trauma care should be a public health priority, and respectfully requests additional funding to complete the project. Such a public-private partnership will help assure the safety of our community in the event of a disaster.

The Waianae Coast Comprehensive Health Center's CIP request will address the Health Center's critical need to expand its medical facilities, which are 30+ years old, in order to support its role as the only safety-net health care provider on the Leeward Coast.

To address the dire need for expanded and new facilities, the Health Center identified two phases of construction projects.

Phase I:

Build a new 3-story medical building to address immediate needs of overcrowded primary

care clinical space. (to be completed Summer 2008)

Phase II:

Rebuild and/or renovate the 30+ year old vacated medical clinic space and

incorporate and upgrade the Health Center's 30+ year old emergency department

space.

The Health Center's capital improvement project will serve the following overall purpose:

- Upgrade and expand family medicine
- Develop and modernize emergency medical services
- Build teaching and training facilities for Waianae economic development purposes

In order to complete the capital improvements, the Health Center is requesting \$2,500,000 in funding to complete the Phase II rebuilding and/or renovations of its existing 30+ year old primary care and emergency facilities to accommodate comprehensive healthcare services including emergency medical care.

In 2007 the Health Center requested a state appropriation of \$3.5 million to complete its current Phase II capital project. The legislature funded \$1 million of this request. The Health Center is seeking the \$2.5 million balance to be funded in 2008. Without the balance of funding, the Health Center will not be able to achieve the long range outcome which is to improve medical care and increase economic development opportunities for the community.

We ask for your support of this important project for our patients and the Leeward Coast community. Thank you.

I am testifying in favor of House Bill 2888. I currently work at Molokai Community Health Center and would like to provide a testimony as someone working in health care and living on Molokai. Molokai Community Health Center is the only federally qualified health center in the island of Molokai, predominately serving the most medically vulnerable patients in this rural and isolated island of Molokai.

Molokai currently has 1 ambulance station and a second ambulance station will provide back up and additional support needed in Molokai. From my experience as a health care provider and resident of Molokai a second ambulance station is needed for the following reasons:

  - First, the whole island of Molokai which is about 261 square miles and can take about two hours to drive from one end of the island to another. If there is an emergency call from different locations in the island, it may take up to two hours for a patient to receive emergency medical services.
  - Second there are increased emergency health service needs due to increased morbility, as in most communities, the population in Molokai is aging. This translates fortunately to longer lives (mortalities) and unfortunately to increase residents living with illness and disabilities (mobility). There is an increase in "ice" addiction, which increases both the individual's health risk and family violence. Per health data, Native Hawaiians are more likely to experience health disparities and 67% of Molokai residents are Native Hawaiian.
  - Third, more residents are living further apart (about 39 miles from the east and west side) increasing the incidence of calls coming from different parts of the island.
  - Fourth, in reviewing disaster scenarios, we know that the east end will be cut off in case of flood. If an ambulance is not located in the east end in preparation for natural disasters, east end residents will not be able to access emergency medical services.
  - Fifth, there is an increase of accidents that may result in multiple injuries. In these cases of multiple injuries, some of the injured will experience delays in transportations as others from the same accident are transported.
  - Lastly, the current Emergency Medical Technicians are aging, and there is a need to train new young health care professional.

While the above data can speak on the reasons why a second ambulance is needed, the most important

reason is for the safety of human life. Last year my land lord who lives on the east end of the island loss consciousness while working in his yard. According his wife they had to wait over an hour to get emergency services. I have heard over and over again from residents in the West End of the island regarding their concern about the need for additional ambulance services. For these reason, I strongly encourage you to support House Bill 2888.

Dear Senator Ige and Honored Members of the Senate Health Committee:

For many years the paramedics on Molokai have served our community with only the staff for (1), 24/7 ambulance. We have a 2<sup>nd</sup> ambulance, which we keep stocked for multiple casualty incidents, for times when simultaneous emergencies happen, and for times that a 911 emergency call would tie up the primary ambulance for more than an hour.

There is no paid staffing for that second ambulance. For over 30 years we have served our community by being called back to work from our homes at a moment's notice. Many times there has been only one paramedic available to quickly respond. In those cases we have responded to all types of emergencies with the help of first responders from the Police and Fire Departments. Recently, there is no one available to call back. Right now, during your hearing, there is no one to come and provide back up for a traffic accident with multiple patients, or if 2 (or more) calls come in simultaneously. 2 of our members are ill and may not return. Molokai's lone ambulance is being staffed by 1 resident and one off-island paramedic. Our other 3 island residents are off island. That means we are all alone.

We are thankful for the partnership with the Fire and Police Department, but these fine men and women are not trained as paramedics. Often when we come in to back up, these cases are frequently challenging as we give patient care with only "one pair of trained hands". In the past 5 years, as our population grows, as hospitals discharge patients earlier, as cars become faster, as the ice epidemic rages, and as our patients have become much sicker, these "back up calls", and the severity of these back-ups have increased.

For years we had a staff made up of 6 full time staff and 1 part time staff. Of the full timers, 5 were MICT paramedics who live on Molokai, and there was 1 MICT paramedic who flew in from Oahu to work. Our part time worker was an EMT who lives on Molokai. All of MICT paramedics have over 20 years in the business and our "rookie" EMT had over 10 years of experience. They have served our community honorably and valiantly.

We are getting older now. 2 of our on-island staff are severely ill and may not return. Much of our staffing comes from paramedics from other islands who fly in and out for their shifts and are therefore unavailable to back up the 911 ambulance for emergencies. In reality, we have only 3 MICTs who can sometimes back up the primary crew. Many times there is no one to back up the primary 911 crew.

Those times have led to patient care disasters. Recently a man with a neck injury lay paralyzed for over an hour without a paramedic to help because the 911 ambulance was on the other end of the island and there was no crew to call back. Last week a patient with a surgical abdomen waited for over an hour while the primary crew worked on another call.

On those occasions when we have 2 paramedics working and we know there are injuries from a traffic accident, we often put a paramedic in each ambulance and drive to the scene to be able to accommodate the multiple patients. Unfortunately, we don't often get information about multiple injuries until after we are already responding to the call. And that doesn't solve the problem when multiple calls come in or for when we are asked to respond on calls that will involve long access or transport times. These are often cases where the only 911 ambulance on Molokai is unable to respond to any other emergency patients for 2-hours.

Our ambulance covers the entire island- 35 miles long and 12 miles wide with deep

valleys, steep cliffs and rough terrain. Our roads are narrow, winding, and rough. A recent plane crash had 7 survivors. It took the primary ambulance over 70 minutes to reach the scene and another 40 minutes to reach the first patients. One paramedic was available to respond with a back up ambulance. The initial call came in at about 7:00 P.M. The last patient was finally flown out to Oahu at 5:30 A.M. The duration of that one call was over 10 hours. 10 hour that we were basically unable to respond to any other emergency. (It would have been much longer had the back up not been available.)

This translates into significant delays in treatment and transport. Every one of us has stories...lots of stories of responding to heart attacks, traffic accidents, diabetic emergencies and every other type of emergency by ourselves, from home. There are also many stories of patients who have laid helplessly and needlessly suffered as they waited and waited for 911 help. Imagine calling 911 having no one able to respond for an hour. Sadly, that is what will happen today, and every day that we do not have another unit to back us up.

The amount of simultaneous calls and patient acuity calls a second 911 ambulance on Molokai. We urge you to support HB 2888.

Aloha Chair Ige, and Honored Members of the Senate Health Committee:

I am testifying in favor of HB 2888. My feelings for a second ambulance station on Molokai are included with the submitted testimony of the Molokai Paramedics.

For almost 30 years I have been honored to assist my community by responding to medical emergencies. I work as a full-time 911 paramedic. On my days off, I work as a 911 paramedic too. There is no pay for being on call. There is no official recognition by the State that we do this. Often, very often I am responding by myself and getting assistance from the Police and/or Fire Department. We don't seek recognition. We just need help.

Almost every vacation I have ever taken on this island has been interrupted by being recalled. Last year, I walked out of a graduation party where I was the main organizer, cook, and caterer to respond to 3 calls at once.

Why do we do this? To help our Ohana. Maybe this will help explain....

Years back, I got tired of being stuck with a radio. I hadn't been diving in years because I had to be available for recall. I called in and told the station I was turning off the pager for a few hours. During that time, the primary ambulance went to the East End of the island. At the same time, my neighbor, next door by Molokai standards, had a heart attack. There was no one to help him and the family was unable to carry him to the car. They waited for over 45 minutes. Then his heart stopped. He died.

I also heartily support an ambulance station for the booming area of Haiku, Maui.

The Haiku area is a poster for the need to coordinate State and County resources. Construction is booming while infrastructure struggles to catch up. New neighborhoods are springing up and increasing the population. What was once a remote and rural area is now filled with all the challenges of suburban life. Adding to theses challenge is the fact that this boom town is remotely located away from EMS and other medical services. People need to drive far, (30-40 minutes) to get primary care. So they tend to try and wait out their medical problems. Often, these problems get worse and suddenly, they need immediate access to emergency care. Even in the most optimal scenarios, they have to wait for 15-20 minutes for an ambulance to deliver emergency care.

The combination of lack of primary care and delayed advanced life support care frequently exacerbates the problem and sometimes is deadly.

The current bill has an inaccuracy. In the current form, the bill states that Molokai does not have a 24/7 ambulance. That is not correct. Molokai indeed does have 24/7 ambulance service.

The need is not for a 1<sup>st</sup> ambulance station. The need is for a second ambulance

station. Even though the call volume is not excessive, the lone ambulance covers the entire island, including Kalaupapa. It is not unusual for a 911 ambulance call to tie up the crew for 2-3 hours. We often stay at the hospital and help with serious/critical patients since Molokai General Hospital has a small staff and since our MICTs are specialists in critical, life saving skills. These times do not show up in the statistics generated by the State.

The stats may show that we transfer over 10 patients a month off island with acute coronary events. What the stats don't show is that few of those patients call 911 because they don't want to wait for the long response times. The stats don't show all the times people decide to drive to the hospital when the 911 ambulance is busy.

And the stats don't show how often a back up crew is called in from home. They don't show when we have 3 calls at once or when we have to transport 5 patients from a traffic accident with one ambulance or when we have a fire fighter drive the second ambulance. The stats don't show when an air ambulance patient waits for hours, waiting for definitive treatment, while the 911 rig responds to other emergencies.

This is not the fault of the HEMSIS system. It wasn't designed to show these types of stats. Often, cases such as these are referred to as "outliers". We call them Ohana. We call them patients. We call them neighbors. We call them family.

Like many remote practitioners, we work without a safety net. But we have no other back up in place when there are no off-duty paramedics on island to cover the back up ambulance.

Right now, as we speak, if the only ambulance is involved in another emergency there is no one to organize the medical response for a natural or other type of disaster, such as an airplane incident.

A few weeks ago, the Department of Homeland Security had an unannounced bioterrorism drill. The scenario cut off the island's only hospital. It also cut the island in half (which is very common when there are big rains). DHS asked us to place ambulances

strategically on each side of the evacuation to be able to treat and transport patients. That day, there was no one on island to call back to staff a second ambulance.

I understand that we are in challenging times in terms of health care dollars. I believe one option is to explore a public/private partnership to deliver service.

In such a case, the State could subsidize the ambulance station while allowing this unit to also provide fee for service transfer capabilities. Quarterly, or at other intervals, the State and the provider could subtract the private fees generated. Guidelines for usage could be created to insure optimal 911 coverage while allowing this unique partnership. As private call volume increases, the State subsidy could decrease.

The other creative option is for the State to fund and strategically locate a single MICT in a rapid response unit as there is on Oahu. But instead of just a quick response SUV, as in Honolulu, that MICT could respond in a van capable of transport. Then we could utilize our first responders or recalled personnel to help with transporting patients to the hospital.

For the price of a City and County Rapid Response Unit we could have a unit with transport capabilities.

Honorable Chairperson and valued committee members. I support HB 2888 which would provide ALS ambulances for the rural Maui communities of Molokai and Haiku. One of my first shifts after graduating from MICT School in the early 90's was on Molokai. In the middle of the night I was dispatched to the area of Halawa Valley for a yacht that overturned in the Kenwood Cup Race. It was reported that 2 people were dead, 23 were in the water with at least 5 injured. I was the only paramedic on the only ambulance and the very rural hospital would be over an hour away.

This call illustrates some of the profound challenges to providing EMS services in rural communities. Examples are as follows.

- 1. Timeliness. Large areas that are sparsely populated can result in long response times to the patient and / or long transport times to the medical facility. Timeliness is critically important in a significant number of cases.
- 2. Tie up times. This is directly related to long responses or transport times. Tie up time results in the lack of availability for the next call which impacts timeliness. In Molokai an ambulance can't just come in from the adjacent community.
- 3. Stacked calls and Multiple patient calls. An ALS ambulance is only able or set up to take care of 1 or 2 serious patients at a time. This effects timeliness and can effect quality.
- 4. Lack of hospital resources. Just dropping the patient(s) off at the rural hospital or clinic doesn't solve the problem. Frequently crews help out in the clinic / Hospital. Following that the ambulance may have to transport the patient to the airport to be flow to higher care on Oahu.

Thank you for your time. Please support improved EMS services for Molokai and Haiku. Please don't hesitate to contact me with questions.

I am writing to express my strong support for H.B. 2888, an act to appropriate funds for 24-hour ambulance coverage in Haiku, Maui.

I am a paramedic and a consultant in public health and emergency services. I have some past experience with strategic planning for prehospital Emergency Medical Services (EMS), including placement of EMS units. There are many reasons why a Haiku ambulance is highly justifiable, including a growing population and a corresponding increase in call volume in Maui. The chief reason why I support a Haiku paramedic unit, however, is its capacity to greatly reduce response times along an under-resourced stretch of Maui's north shore.

Currently, there are only two 911 ambulances on the north shore of Maui: units in Wailuku and Hana, which are 52 miles apart (a drive time of two hours and 40 minutes). There is an ambulance in Makawao, but that unit is often busy in its upcountry primary service area. Even when the Makawao ambulance is available to descend towards the north shore, paramedics have to navigate extremely curvy roads to reach those lower areas. It takes the Makawao ambulance about seven miles (approximately 20 minutes' drive time) to reach lower Haiku or Paia, a frequent source of calls. In contrast, a strategically placed Haiku ambulance would provide rapid response not only to greater Haiku, but also to surrounding communities along Maui's north shore, including: Sprecklesville, Paia, Kuau, Pauwela, Huelu, and Kailua. Perhaps most importantly, a Haiku paramedic unit would be able to split the 52-mile distance described between Wailuku and Hana, with its district potentially reaching the village of Keanae.

Response times to almost all of these areas of Maui's north shore could be reduced by at least 20 minutes if a paramedic ambulance were located in lower Haiku. This amount of time can literally mean the difference between life and death. In major trauma, a "golden hour" is considered the maximum window of time between the incident and when the victim should be in an operating room. In heart attacks and stroke, "time is heart muscle" and "time is brain" respectively: as minutes pass without definitive care, heart and brain function is lost. In cardiac arrest, the American Heart Association describes a "chain of survival": early access to EMS, early CPR, early defibrillation, early advanced care. Without such care, a typical victim has only a few minutes before death is irreversible.

The citizens and visitors of Maui deserve this marked improvement in the availability of EMS resources in their community. Thank you for your consideration.

Although it may not appear that the Molokai ambulance is very busy in regards to 9-1-1 needs on the island of Molokai, it is more often that the following scenarios occur:

- Multiple 9-1-1 calls for service at the same time on different sides of the island
- Cases taking a long time (either waiting to access patient or transport / response times)
  to complete while another calls get made to 9-1-1 for an ambulance thereby delaying the
  second response. Standing by at a brush fire scene or standing by to search & rescue a
  victim often takes time and potential periods where this unit is 'out-of-service'.
- Primary ambulance crew is dedicated to transfer of an unstable patient from Molokai General to the airport for transfer to Oahu thereby rendering this unit out-of-service for 9-1-1 responses
- Multiple victim scenarios have meant that the ambulance has to make multiple trips from a scene to Molokai General and back to the scene to transport more victims. (There is only 1 ambulance & crew on duty without backup)
- At times critical patients who are waiting to be transferred from Molokai /general to the airport for transfer to Oahu have to wait for hours as the only 9-1-1 ambulance is busy running back-to-back emergency cases. This further impacts the only ER on the island as they are now left to manage the critical patient as well as caring for new emergencies.

What occurs on Molokai to assist with these scenarios are the following:

 Callback of 'off-duty' caregiver who can report back to work even though they are not obligated to. This takes time and if only (1) is available, it still doesn't allow for optimal patient care. Often times off-duty personnel are off-island or unavailable.  Have primary crew split-up and have firefighters driving ambulances that they are not trained to drive in emergency situations.

With regards to a Haiku ambulance, the entire Maui Upcountry area is getting more populated with subdivisions and Hawaiian homelands. Often times, it is the Kula ambulance who responds into Haiku as the Makawao ambulance is busy. A Haiku ambulance would have much better response times into their own district thereby minimizing responses from other ambulances responding from another district often adding critical response time minutes.

Both of these communities deserve fast emergency medical services responses and I urge you to pass these bills. By passing these bills on, solutions can be compromised so as to get some benefit as opposed to none by having these bills dies before you. Thank you for your time, attention & consideration to my testimony.

My name is Jeffrey Miyazawa, D.D.S., Chair of the Board of Dental Examiners ("Board"). The Board appreciates the opportunity to testify in support of a proposed Senate Draft 1 for H.B. 2301, H.D.1, which we have attached.

The purpose of H.B. No. 2301, H.D.1, is to prohibit interference by an unlicensed person or entity in the practice of dentistry and prohibit the practice of dentistry in a commercial or mercantile establishment. The proposed S.D.1 would delete the prohibition of the practice of dentistry in a commercial or mercantile establishment.

Since the introduction of the bill, the Board has had an opportunity to work with the Hawaii Dental Association and has come to an agreement on a proposed draft. The proposed S.D.1 clarifies that only a licensed dentist can own, direct, and control the practice of dentistry, and prohibits interference in the practice of dentistry from non-dentists.

(a) No dentist licensed pursuant to this chapter who engages in the practice of dentistry shall permit a person or entity, other than a dentist licensed pursuant to this chapter, to directly or indirectly own, direct, control, or interfere with the licensee's practice of dentistry; provided that this section shall not apply to the State or any county, any legally incorporated eleemosynary dispensary or infirmary, private school, or welfare center.

- (b) A licensed dentist shall not permit a non-dentist to:
- (1) Direct or interfere with the licensee's clinical judgment and competent practice of dentistry;
- (2) Select a course of treatment for a patient, the

  procedures or materials to be used as part of such

  course of treatment is carried out by the licensee;
- (3) Exercise control of the patient's records; or
- (4) Prohibit or limit access to the dental office,
  facilities, and equipment necessary to provide service
  to the licensee's patients.

SECTION 2. In codifying the new section added by section 1 of this Act, the revisor of statutes shall substitute appropriate section number in designating the new section in this Act.

SECTION 3. New statutory material is underscored.

SECTION 4. This Act shall take effect upon its approval.

Thank you for the opportunity to resubmit this testimony in support of House Bill 2301, rev HD2. This measure seeks to prohibit the interference by an unlicensed person or entity in the practice of dentistry. This measure would not apply to the employment of dentists in Federally Qualified Health Centers or in any non-profit hospital or eleemosynary setting. We are priveleged to have had the direction, input, and support of Dr. Jeffrey Miyazawa, Mr. Jimmy Kobashigawa and the

Dentistry has been a profession which relies on trust. If that trust were compromised it would bode poorly for both dentist and patient.

What HB 2301 seeks to address is that the dentist act in the best interest of the patient. To this end an actively practicing dentist should not be subject to any outside pressure. The dentist is there for the mutual benefit of the practice and the patient. The dentist must be able to rely on the best of his (or her) training and intuition. The dentist can't be beholden to an arrangement where financial interest dictates the promotion of a treatment which would profit the practice owner but would be to the detriment of the patient.

A dentist is liable for his (or her) actions as reflected in the ethics of the profession. If another person renders the decision on which dental laboratory is used or when, whether and where to refer to a specialist then this is asking the dentist to be accountable for not only the dentist's own professional decisions but also the business decisions of the, possibly, non-dentist employer.

There is also the matter of the practice location setting. A dental office is a self contained unit. The dentist is responsible for the welfare of his patients and should be able to treat outside of regular practice hours. Should an emergency arise that has to be seen there is an imperative for the office to be available for that patient to be seen. As dentists we are compelled to act in an ethic which allows us to be able to practice to the best of our abilities. To additionally impose external strictures needlessly compromises an atmosphere of trust and dedication to our patients and profession.

The following is a recent news release concerning a mainland dental franchise. It points out the presssure that a corporation can place on a dentist to increase profitability at the expense of the patients' welfare.

### Former Dentist Confesses Criminal Behavior at Kids Clinic

Reported by: Jane Flasch

(February 15, 2008, Rochester, N.Y.) - Last December, 13WHAM showed a disturbing video tape of children strapped in restraints undergoing multiple root canals while their parents were kept out of the room.

Now, the man who once ran the Irondequoit Small Smiles Branch is speaking out for the first time.

He was jailed for fraud. In a follow-up to our 13 WHAM News investigation, he told Jane Flasch that some of the procedures that so traumatized children weren't even necessary.

Rochester's Small Smiles dental office opened with a promise to serve children who don't get regular dental care. Clinic director, Dr. David Gardner, was hauled into a Monroe County court 14 months later.

Gardner pleaded guilty to grand larceny and left Rochester for prison. Now, he wants to come clean about what he says was going on behind closed doors on Ridge Road in Irondequoit.

"Taxpayer dollars are being wasted because they're paying for treatment that's not getting done, treatment that doesn't need to be done, and children aren't being treated like children," Gardner said.

Ashley Sones was a patient during that time. Nine of her teeth were extracted. Another dentist reviewed Ashley's x-rays.

He confirmed that at least two of her teeth could have been saved. But, her file did not contain enough information about the rest.

She never did get partial she was promised; it was denied.

Some very young Small Smiles patients had metal caps, crowns, and root canals. Dentists dispute whether root canals and crowns are the best treatment option for young patients.

However, Gardner said he was under pressure from the corporation to make \$1 million every year.

"The biggest thing you can do is those baby root canals and crowns because it's \$220 that Medicaid does not question. It's just \$220, \$220, "Gardner said.

The Rochester office would not allow cameras inside.

Gardner said they routinely used another controversial technique to restrain children. On an attached video taken at a Small Smiles in Maryland, you can see a small child strapped to a papoose board which holds his body and arms immobile.

Gardner said papoose boards were encouraged in order to complete four or more root canals at a time. Even though it made kids frightened and stressed.

"Stressed out enough to wet their pants, sweat completely through their clothes, be all wet," Gardner said. He said he was told, "Clean them up as best you can before you give them to mom and dad."

Ashley Sones said both she and her younger brother Wesley were physically held down.

"My heart was racing," she said. "It felt like blood was rushing through my body."

Their mother never even knew. It was Small Smiles policy not to allow parents to be with their children.

"I trusted them," said Ashley's mother Wendy. "That's their job."

Since our reports first aired in December, Small Smiles changed its policies. It now allows parents to be present with their children for procedures.

While it still uses papoose boards, the policy is clearly posted and parents can refuse. As for Gardner, the company characterized him as someone with an ax to grind.

Gardner confessed to billing Medicaid for work he did not do.

Investigators say Small Smiles cooperated in the investigation against Gardner and repaid nearly half a million dollars.

Gardner has surrendered his medical license and now sells RVs in Indianapolis.

He says he was pressured into the Small Smiles way of doing business with the understanding that if he were caught, he would be taken care of.

"I've lost my career, I've lost my livelihood," he said.

A member of the Pediatric Dentistry Program at SUNY Buffalo conducted an independent review of the Small Smiles Rochester office last month.

He concluded that restraints, crowns, and other procedures are being used in the proper manner.

Nevertheless, we were not allowed to see a copy of the review documents.

The reviewer spent only half a day at the clinic and did not interview parents. Criminal investigations are underway in several states including New York.

- 1 **Department's Position:** The Department strongly supports this Administration-sponsored measure.
- 2 This emergency appropriation funds continuation of services provided by the adult mental health
- 3 division (AMHD).
- 4 **Fiscal Implications:** The department respectfully requests the Committee's consideration in restoring
- 5 the full, original amount of \$10 million for this emergency appropriation. The entire \$10 million is
- 6 urgently needed by the Adult Mental Health Division to ensure the continuity of services this division
- 7 provides throughout the State. AMHD has encumbered and/or expended all general funds allotted for
- 8 fiscal year 2007-2008. AMHD is heavily relying on special funds to continue to meet all its obligations.
- 9 While the Department has been working diligently with the Department of Human Services (DHS) to
- 10 expedite an increase in federal revenues, the Department also continues to realize projected increases in
- its expenditures in the area of POS contracts.
- 12 **Purpose and Justification:** The Department strongly supports this emergency appropriation which
- 13 funds continuation of services in the areas of case management, crisis services, treatment services,
- 14 rehabilitation services, and housing.
- AMHD serves a continuously increasing population: for comparison, 4,445 consumers received
- services in fiscal year 2002-2003 versus 14,576 consumers in fiscal year 2006-2007. This represents an

over 300% increase in persons served by AMHD over the past five years, and a 19% increase from fiscal year 2005-2006 to the current 2006-2007 fiscal year.

The primary reason for the significant increase in number of persons served is the capacity expansion of available services throughout the islands. This expansion was triggered by a federal lawsuit *United States v. State of Hawaii, et al.* Civil Number 91-00137 (DAE KSC) that first involved the Hawaii State Hospital (1991) and later was expanded to address the needs of consumers in the community (June 2003). In November 2007, the State successfully exited the settlement agreement resulting from the suit. This emergency appropriation will allow AMHD to continue providing existing services to the expanding eligible population and to continue funding of required services developed during the current fiscal year.

In response to the increased numbers of consumers served and the increase in budgetary requirement, there are a number of initiatives that AMHD has embarked upon to increase revenue and decrease general fund expenditures:

### **INCREASE REVENUES:**

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- Ensure all incoming and existing AMHD consumers obtain health insurance coverage when available;
- Ensure Assertive Community Treatment (ACT) providers are in compliance with requirements which will increase MRO revenue;
- Increase focus on revenue generation from state-operated clinics; and
- Seek contracts with all third party payers for AMHD services.

### DECREASE EXPENDITURES:

- Review and revise diagnostic eligibility criteria policies and procedures;
- Develop a diagnosis-based "tiered" array of services;
- Enforce 60 day payment policy;

- Implement billing edits to reject claims regarding frequency and duration caps; and
  - Identify administrative expenditures for postponement, reduction or elimination

3 Despite diligent efforts towards budget restraint, there are other factors that contribute to the

- 4 shortfall, such as the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Special Fund Ceiling in relation to Medicaid
- 5 Rehabilitation Option revenues. The fund generates revenue under a Memorandum of Agreement
- 6 (MOA) with the Department of Human Services (DHS) called the Medicaid Rehabilitation Option
- 7 (MRO). Under the MRO, AMHD is allowed to bill DHS for certain services paid to POS contractors.
- 8 DHS returns federal matching funds to AMHD for these expenditures based on a percentage of the State
- 9 dollars expended. The special fund is used to offset AMHD's general fund allotment. The Department
- is working diligently with DHS to expedite an increase in federal revenues.

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Finally, operational deficits at Hawaii State Hospital (HSH) have risen in relation to an increased, high census. Last fiscal year, HSH had a budget deficit of \$5,000,000. This included funding forty beds at Kahi Mohala. However, the Kahi Mohala contract has been reduced to thirty-two beds this year, resulting in a savings of over \$5,000,000. Additionally, HSH management has taken measures to reduce the overall use of contracted agency staff, resulting in lower deficits. The hospital budget is based on an expected daily census of 178. However, this year since September the HSH average daily census has been 191. In total, the budget deficit for the HSH for fiscal year 2008-2009 is projected to be \$1,104,698.

Approval of this funding will allow AMHD to continue to address related social issues of homelessness, co-occurring substance abuse, emergency mental health services, and access to critical mental health services including housing, employment opportunities, rehabilitation, treatment, case management, and those individuals served at HSH. In total, this funding will allow AMHD to assist people with severe mental illness in Hawaii to fully participate and contribute in the community through their recovery process.

My name is Alan Johnson. I am the current chair of the Hawaii Substance Abuse Coalition (HSAC), a statewide hui of more than twenty non-profit treatment and prevention agencies.

### **HSAC supports HB 3146:**

The population of residents engaged in mental health services has increased from around 4,000 to 5,000 a few years ago to over 14,000 today. AMHD has implemented significant cost savings practices in recent years to help address this crisis change in census that includes, but not limited to: integrating with substance abuse treatment services using strength-based "recovery methods"; increased case management; implementing more transition programs and group homes; more expansive and effective services at Community Mental Health Centers (CMHC); and more collaborative and integrated practices with community services. Never-the-less, state agencies and community based agencies will continue to collaborate to find ever more improvements in services to provide adequate care at reduced per client costs.

However, the multi-million dollar per year budget that once did cover less than 5,000 clients is not sufficient to treat 14,000 clients. It is the result of improved services that AMHD only requests \$10 million.

We applaud the Legislator's decisive previous actions that have proven to be making a difference in reducing drug and alcohol abuse and addiction. On behalf of HSAC, we appreciate the opportunity to provide information and are available for questions.

Dear Committee Chair Ige, Vice-Chair Fukunaga and distinguished Members of the Health Committee:

As the Director of the Clint Spencer Clinic, our clinic provides clinical care and education to a large number of Hawaii's HIV infected adult and pediatric population. We treat all individuals infected with HIV the same, regardless if they have insurance or not. Antiretroviral medications have dramatically improved the lives of our patients. However, for these life saving medications to be effective, these medications need to be taken regularly in the day. These medications need to be stored appropriately, often requiring refrigeration. In addition, many of these medications need to be taken with food. These expensive medications and therapy will not mean much if these patients are not able to take them appropriately. It is therefore essential that housing and food be supplemented for these infected individuals to achieve productive and healthy lives. The danger is that without food and housing assistance, many of these infected individuals may have worsening of their disease. The cost savings from removing the current food and housing assistance may be offset by the raising health related costs of worsening disease. There will be no savings and the health of our patients will be worse off.

I strongly support HB 1890, which proposes state funding to supplement the federal funds received from the Ryan White CARE Act Reauthorization Bill (HR 6143). This bill would assist in supporting the care of our patients.

Thank you for the opportunity to testify and your thoughtful consideration of this bill which is important to HIV infected individuals living in Hawaii.

My Name is Jon Berliner, and I serve as executive director of Gregory House Programs, Hawaii's only statewide HIV/AIDS housing program. I strongly support passage of HB 1890, HD 1.

Over the years, particularly from 1995 – 2002, state funding for HIV care services was continually reduced through budget restrictions, while at the same time case loads continued to increase pacing more demands on services. Hawaii will see a reduction in Federal Ryan White CARE Act (now called the Ryan White Modernization Act of 2006) funding due to newly established formulas that penalize smaller states with lower incidence rates. However, the need here is still tremendous. Additionally, due to the federal budget for FY '09, just released by the president, funding for housing services under the HUD HOPWA program, for persons with HIV/AIDS, is proposed to be level funded while at the same time three new jurisdictions will be eligible meaning that all other jurisdictions will experience funding reductions — under the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development's HOPWA — Housing Opportunities for Persons with AIDS program. The State of Hawaii will experience, once again, a reduction in funding.

HB 1890, HD1 is of particular importance and has some current urgency because the federal Department of Health & Human Services - HRSA HIV/AIDS Bureau (HAB) issued on February 26, 2008 Policy Notice 99-02 Amendment I, entitled "The Use of Ryan White HIV/AIDS Program Funds for Housing Referral Services and Short-term or Emergency Housing Needs, provides grantees with guidance on the use of Title XXVI of the Public Health Service Act (Ryan White HIV/AIDS Program) funds for short-term and emergency housing assistance for persons living with HIV/AIDS that significantly restricts the use of Ryan White funds for housing services, and this amendment will significantly limit and negatively impact housing services for persons with HIV/AIDS here in Hawaii as well as elsewhere.

Maintenance of funding is needed for the areas addressed in HB 1890, HD 1. Without adequate funding for housing, case management, and support services, it will be more challenging for persons / families living with HIV/AIDS to gain access to primary medical care and other support services. The services funded under HB 1890, HD 1 are critical and essential in providing stability in the lives of persons challenged with living with HIV/AIDS. I urge the committee to pass HB 1890, HD 1. Thank you for this opportunity to offer testimony.

Aloha Senator Ige, Senator Fukunaga, and Committee Members,

My name is Joseph Rattner and on March 15<sup>th</sup>, 2008, I will be diagnosed HIV Positive for 17 years. I consider that date an Anniversary because of the life I was Blessed with despite the new ways of life I had to learn how to lead. Retiring early from my lively hood of Opticianry' and having to give up a lovely home is not what I had in mind, but HIV had different ideas for me.

My Disability from a life with HIV came to fruition when I moved to Hawaii from New Jersey 6 years ago. All of a sudden it was hard to obtain my medications, even more difficult to fulfill the Dentistry I so desperately needed, and with the obvious sense that the HIV Community in Hawaii was suffering dramatically, I was a tremendously concerned.

In 2004 I was blessed with Founding West Oahu Hope For A Cure Foundation, a newly

blossoming AIDS Service Organization (ASO) located in Ewa Beach, serving the Leeward and West Side Communities of Oahu or elsewhere Island or State wide in need of Care or Prevention services. I am presently the organization's President and acting Executive Director.

I was wait listed by Gregory House Programs, the only Housing program in Hawaii for people living with HIV/AIDS. When I learned there was a gathering place that not only distributes Healthy food but as well as maintained a Vitamin Program, was music to my ears. Problem is that the Vitamin program has been slowly cut, year by year, as they delete many important Vitamins(now offering 3 basic kinds) with home delivery's reduced to once a month. Worse off, does the program cover the full ADAP formulary of Medications. There is already discussion about removing and/or changing important drugs to an HIVers life. There have been years that I needed to ask you all to pay for medications to keep me alive.

Your heard my plight and three years ago SB 1227 was passed unanimously with just enough funding to allow an abnormally expensive medication to be dispensed through ADAP because the drug fell into the Protease Inhibitor category. The Governor signed off on \$50,000 which was to be split into: Half for the ADAP program and half for the HSPAMM program which pays for bi-annual examinations at Leahi Hospital. The only Wellnes Center on all of the Islands for people living with HIV was shut down this year leaving the Community lost in outer space when it came to working out or maintaining a balanced diet with a Nutritionist who was at the Center 75% of the time for exams, tests and advice.

Patients now live longer, but many are unable to return to work due to their health and debilitating side effects of the treatments for HIV/AIDS. These patients continue to need housing, nutrition services, and case management as well as life-saving medications, often for many years. While we hope that better treatments will offer a cure, or at least a better recovery, right now, that is not the reality for most people with HIV/AIDS.

We have had some very important legislation pending since last year at the Hawaii State legislature for funding of HIV Programs. Many requests were sent to have a hearing, so that this Bill HB 1890 could be considered by the House to then be passed out by the House Finance Committee. HB 1890 was finally scheduled for a hearing shortly before the cross over, passing with AMENDMENTS and sent to the Senate. Mahalo to Rep. Marcus Oshiro and his Staff for believing in the necessity of this Bill. I am most grateful for the House Health Committee hearing this measure and passing it unanimously!

The HIV Community had put their hopes in SB 2890. Senate Bill SB 2890, introduced by Senator Will Espero, a similar measure for additional HIV funding was passed UNAMENDED by the Senate Health Committee, but the Bill will not be heard by (WAM) Ways and Means. Senator Baker is working very hard to find additional funding to add to the budget for HIV programs, but all she can do now is promise to try and *find* some funding.

Our hope for additional funding and support from the Hawaii Legislature is tentative at best this year. We had hoped to get extra funding for people living with HIV for Housing, Dental, Food, and other HIV programs. We are currently under funded in general for our AIDS Service Organizations, (ASOs), in Hawaii to operate efficiently. Our ASOs are hard pressed to even meet current demand by HIV positive clients. More clients are expected in next few years as new HIV rapid tests are implemented and the known HIV population here expands.

It is imperative that we meet the needs of the HIV Community. Hawaii needs to maintain strong HIV programs for both prevention and care. These programs are essential in keeping people healthy who are living with HIV, and in preventing the spread of the virus. Hawaii will

pay more in health care costs in the long run if it continues to accept AIDS funding cuts with no additional support. What is needed is the support of the <u>ENTIRE</u> Hawaii Legislature <u>NOW</u>, and ensure the quality of life for people living with HIV/AIDS.

For these and so many other reasons I am strongly supporting HB 1890 HD1!

Thank you for your present support, and your help in creating a brighter future for people in Hawaii living with HIV or AIDS.

My Name is Scott Orton, and I have been living with AIDS for 8 YEARS. I co-facilitate the Friday HIV Support Group at Life Foundation on Oahu, and have assisted many living with HIV to cope with the many problems associated with the disease.

Hawaii's proposed Fiscal Year 2008 budget from federal and state resources will reduce funding for some of the HIV/AIDS programs here. Total funding has been declining for several years, according to the Department of Health. Peter Whiticar, STD/AIDS Prevention Branch chief, affirmed that there will be even less money for HIV programs this coming year.

Very important housing, food assistance and dental programs currently do not have enough funding. All these programs are essential in keeping people healthy who are living with HIV, and in preventing the spread of the virus.

Are we being penny wise but pound foolish with HIV funding? Hawaii's HB 1890 HD1 is meant to supplement the federal funds received from the Ryan White CARE Act Reauthorization Bill (HR 6143). This past year, there have been problems in housing, food and dental programs due to lack of funding. So much more could be done, but because of tight budget constraints good programs are now underfunded. Our hope, for a better economic time, won't wait with HIV/AIDS. Waiting on funding will only fuel the spread of HIV, every time that we turn away or put wait lists on important programs.

HIV numbers are about to skyrocket as all persons with HIV, not just AIDS, under care, will be reported to the State. Names reporting for HIV will take effect as soon as Gov. Linda Lingle signs on to

I am currently conducting an needs assessment on HIV medical care state-wide for the University of Hawaii John A. Burns School of Medicine, in collaboration with the Department of Health. Part of this assessment involves a survey of over 350 HIV-infected people living in our state. About 43% of them were living on a combined household income of less than \$12,000 a year and an additional 30% were living on a combined household income of less that \$25,000 a year. Without programs to help with food and housing, these incomes do not allow them to maintain a stable living situation necessary to adhere to their medication and an adequate diet to maintain their health.

Thank you for the opportunity to present testimony in strong support of HB 1890, (MAKING AN APPROPRIATION FOR HEALTH CARE SERVICES).

My name is Debra Ogata-Arakaki. I was born and raised in Hawaii, and have spent the past 21 years working as an HIV research nurse and coordinator. I began my research career in 1986 at the National Institutes of Health, at a time when AIDS was at its infancy. There were no anti-HIV drugs available at that time. A diagnosis of AIDS was a death sentence. It was only through the tireless efforts of many researchers and nurses, dedicated and willing research participants that new drugs to treat HIV and its many infections were developed. Today, a diagnosis of HIV is no longer an ominous sentence and with proper care and treatment, people living with HIV can maintain healthy, productive lives.

I support this bill because it will help to support programs that have done, and can continue to do, valuable work for the people in Hawaii living with HIV. Programs such as HIV counseling and testing, HIV drug assistance programs, housing and food assistance, AIDS surveillance, and dental assistance are already under-funded. Federal funding for many HIV-related programs has decreased sizably over the past few years. Many programs will be unable to provide the level of services they have been able to provide in the past due to the continued cuts in funding. This bill will help to supplement the federal funds received through the Ryan White CARE Act Reauthorization Bill and help to maintain these valuable programs.

The state can chose to financially assist the programs that support the health and welfare of HIV-infected individuals so they may be contributing, productive citizens, or they can turn away and pay for it on the backend, supporting them financially in the hospital once they are ill.

In summary, I would like to restate my strong support for passage of **HB 1890**. Thank you for the opportunity to provide testimony for the committee.

#### TESTIMONY ON HOUSE BILL NO. 2165, RELATING TO NURSING.

TO THE HONORABLE DAVID Y. IGE, CHAIR, AND MEMBERS OF THE COMMITTEE:

My name is Kathleen Yokouchi and I am the Executive Officer for the Board of Nursing ("Board"). I appreciate the opportunity to present testimony on behalf of the Board in support of House Bill No. 2165.

The purpose of this bill is to amend Act 198, Session Laws of Hawaii 2003, in order to extend the sunset date of the fee assessment on licensed nurses, which provides a means of funding to the University of Hawaii, Hawaii State Center for Nursing ("HSCN").

The Board is in support of House Bill No. 2165 because:

- It believes the data produced by the HSCN is crucial to the State policymakers,
   the Board, and other stakeholders involved with nursing in developing workforce
   programs and policies for the future;
- Besides producing a uniform source of nursing related information, the HSCN
  provides a positive opportunity for various sectors of the community to come
  together with a common interest in staffing which supports quality of care, patient
  safety and a positive working environment;
- It will allow the HSCN to continue focus on the complex issues which underlie the nurse shortage including nursing workforce data, recruitment and retention of nurses and faculty, and research on best practices and quality outcomes;

- It will allow continual collaboration as the HSCN has done with its annual Summit on Education and Practice (held in March, 2006 and December, 2007). The Summit brought together nurses from all islands to focus on integration, collaboration, innovation and community partnerships. A total of ninety and 100+ individuals, respectively, represented all sectors of the healthcare community and all islands. Many recommendations have resulted in new initiatives. A residency/internship model is being developed to assist in the transition of new graduate nurses into practice and to increase retention, satisfaction and success. A formalized plan to integrate nursing education with the practice sector is being finalized; and
- It will support the 5-year longitudinal study of new graduate RNs where this study
   will identify issues in new graduate turnover and best practices in retention.

Therefore, the Board respectfully requests the Committee's approval and passage of this measure and we thank you for this opportunity to testify on House Bill No. 2165.

#### HB 2165, Relating to Nursing

Chair Ige, Vice Chair Fukunaga, and members of the Senate Committee on Health, thank you for this opportunity to provide testimony in support of HB 2165, Relating to Nursing. The University strongly supports this bill which amends section 457-7(f), Hawai'i Revised Statutes, to provide an additional means to qualify for licensure as a registered nurse by allowing a graduate with a completed portion of a master's entry program in nursing (MEPN) to apply for a license as a registered nurse by examination.

The proposed amendment clarifies that students of a qualified MEPN program are eligible to enter the nursing workforce after successfully completing the designated portion of the curriculum.

There are more than 60 accelerated or fast track programs with entry at the Master's level across the country. The MEPN is designed for adult learners with no prior nursing experience/education, have a baccalaureate degree or higher in another field other than nursing and are leadership bound and seeking a career in advanced practice nursing. The program equips students with entry-level professional nurse competencies as a foundation for advanced practice roles.

The University of Hawaii at Mānoa (UHM) School of Nursing and Dental Hygiene developed the new MEPN program in response to the nursing shortage and student interest. The program is built upon the curriculum expertise of faculty, institutional experience with accelerated education, and in partnership with the health care community, students, and national experts. State funding was allocated to offer the innovative program in an effort to address workforce need.

The UHM MEPN program received provisional approval by the Hawai'i State Board of Nursing. It consists of an intensive pre-licensure year structured as three continuous semesters transitioning into a specialty nursing pathway. The program does not replace the generic baccalaureate nursing program but provides an additional program pathway to prepare nurse professionals. At the completion of the pre-licensure component, students meet the American Association of Colleges of Nursing designated baccalaureate competencies.

Passage of this measure will assist in addressing the nursing workforce shortage by enabling nurse professionals to enter the workforce in a shorter amount of time and contribute to increasing the pool of advanced practice nurses and potential future faculty.

The Hawai'i State Center for Nursing strongly supports this bill which will provide an additional means to qualify for licensure as a registered nurse by allowing a candidate who has completed the required portion of the Master's Entry Program Into Nursing to be eligible for the licensing examination.

This is an innovative program established by the University of Hawai'i School of Nursing and Dental Hygiene to provide an undergraduate to master's degree pathway in three years. This program was developed in response to community and student interest, and provides an excellent option for adult learners with prior degrees in other fields. Designed as an accelerated or fast track program, it will expedite a career pathway into advanced practice or nursing faculty roles.

An increased supply of nurses prepared at the graduate level is a critical factor in addressing the nursing shortage both in Hawai'i and nationwide. This program will be a welcome addition to educational options available at the local level.

In light of an ongoing nursing shortage in the state and the nation, it is vital that schools of nursing consider innovations to meet the needs of the workforce both now and in the future. This is positive example of such a program that is responsive to the needs of both students and the employers.

I am writing in **strong support of HB 2134 HD 2**, relating to the Center for Nursing. I strongly support the intent of this bill which would extend the sunset clause from 2009 to 2010. The 2003 Legislature established the Hawai'i State Center for Nursing, and placed it at School of Nursing and Dental Hygiene at the University of Hawai'i at Mānoa. #### **HB 2165 RELATING TO NURSING**

Thank you Chair Ige, Vice Chair Fukunaga and other distinguished members of the Senate Committee on Health for considering HB 2165.

My name is Matthew Williams and I am a student in the Master's Entry Program in Nursing (MEPN) at the University of Hawaii at Manoa. I would like to submit testimony in support of HB 2165. I recommend amending the Hawaii Revised Statutes to provide additional means to qualify for licensure as a registered nurse by allowing a graduate with a completed portion of the program to apply for a license as a registered nurse by exam. The MEPN program is of great benefit to students and the people of Hawaii.

From my personal experience, the decision to apply to the MEPN program was the next logical career step for me. I have a Bachelor's of Arts in Psychology with a minor in Business from The Ohio State University. After graduation I worked as a Personal Banker and as a small business owner. Later, I transitioned to the medical field as a licensed Emergency Medical Technician (EMT) to fulfill a desire to make a hands-on positive contribution to the lives of others. Working as an EMT, I was employed within a variety of environments including working as a member of a volunteer rescue squad, as an Emergency Department Technician, an Intensive Care Unit Technician, for a medical transport team, and as a Test Administrator for drug screening in for the National Collegiate Athletic Association. After events which brought me to Hawaii, I worked for the City and County of Honolulu Department of Emergency Medical Services for approximately two years. While on the job I sustained an injury to my back that is now chronic in nature. Because of this injury I was forced to consider other work because I could no longer meet the physical demands working as an EMT.

The MEPN program is an excellent opportunity to continue to work in health care. The master's degree gives the opportunity to advance one's education forward instead of a lateral move to a second bachelor's degree. Because the program is accelerated it will allow for a quick return to the workforce. In addition, the program offers the opportunity to gain a Master's of Science in Nursing and offers a specialty track to also earn a Master's in Business Administration. This merging of healthcare and business is a unique program that will prepare me for a position in administration. I hope this MSN/MBA program will give me the opportunity to work in a hospital environment both in management and as a clinician.

Passage of this bill provides an additional and expeditious route for future nurses to enter the workforce. This bill directly impacts the current nursing shortage crises that will continue to worsen in light of the increasing geriatric population. This program is an amazing opportunity for nursing students and for the people of Hawaii.

I received a bachelor of science degree in health/exercise science and a master's degree in public health from the University of Hawai'i at Mānoa. It has been rewarding to work in health education, work-site wellness promotion, and public health research for the past five years. Thank you for the opportunity to submit testimony on H.B. 12, H.D. 2. The Office of Information Practices ("OIP") takes no position on the substance of this bill, but makes the following recommendation.

The bill seeks to add a provision at page 2, lines 10-13, which states as follows:

(c) The board of pharmacy and the attorney general shall keep confidential all trade secret information. The disclosure form prescribed by the board of pharmacy shall permit the company to identify any information that is a trade secret.

OIP recommends that the second sentence be deleted. The sentence is unnecessary to allow an agency to allow a private company to identify what it believes to be a trade secret, which is what some agencies routinely do without such a statutory provision. However, the sentence, as written, appears to create a presumption that the company is allowed to determine what will be protected as a "trade secret."

This is contrary to the agency's responsibilities imposed under chapter 92F, HRS, the Uniform Information Practices Act (Modified), which places the burden on the agency to establish justification for nondisclosure. See Haw. Rev. Stat. § 92F-15 (1993). Thus, under the UIPA, it is the agency that must make the determination that information constitutes a "trade secret" in order to withhold that information. See Haw. Rev. Stat. § 92F-13(4) (1993) (UIPA does not require disclosure of government records which are protected from disclosure pursuant to state or federal law).

Accordingly, to avoid any ambiguity as to the agency's responsibility to make the final determination as to what constitutes a "trade secret," consistent with the UIPA and other confidentiality statutes protecting "trade secrets," OIP recommends that the second sentence of proposed subsection (c) be deleted.

My name is Norman Suzuki. I am a representative of the Pharmaceutical Research and Manufacturers of America ("PhRMA").

WE RESPECTFULLY OPPOSE PASSAGE OF HB 12, HD 2

#### WHAT THE BILL DOES:

**HB 12, HD 2** requires every manufacturer selling prescription drugs in the State of Hawaii to file an annual disclosure for all items of economic benefit of \$25 or more provided to a physician, hospital, nursing home or other provider of health services. The bill requires each company to select someone to be responsible for the accuracy of the disclosure report. Each violation will be subject to a civil penalty of up to \$10,000.

#### LIMITS INFORMATION WHICH BENEFITS PATIENTS:

When a physician, clinic or hospital or other provider receives charts, graphs, medical literature, physical models, visual aids or any type of information which cost \$25 or more, a disclosure must be made by the manufacturer. These items are intended to benefit the patient as well as the provider who obtains the information. Such disclosure requirements may be too onerous to comply with. At conventions for medical providers, often literature or other handouts are made available. If this bill becomes law, it will result in a loss to patients as well as doctors and hospitals. Calculating what materials may exceed \$25 and having to account and take liability for disclosure may discourage the dissemination of worthwhile information.

#### REQUIRES TRADE INFORMATION DISCLOSURE:

The bill attempts to indicate that trade secret information will be held confidential, but there is no provision to insure confidentiality or place restrictions on the use of the information

collected. Free samples of drugs, which are given to physicians for needy patients, are excluded from this bill. Most of the promotional and advertising costs of pharmaceutical companies represent the value of free samples passed out to physicians or directly to patients through the various company pharmaceutical assistance plans. To place restrictions on the use of literature or other aids which may accompany the samples appears counterproductive.

#### IMPACT ON INNOVATION:

Marketing efforts increase competition among pharmaceutical companies by promoting access to information and the choices available in the marketplace. Pharmaceutical companies compete to discover and develop life-saving and life-enhancing new products. Government interference in the marketplace by requirements of disclosure and the attendant major liability for non-disclosure reduces the incentive of pharmaceutical companies to engage in research or development which lead to valuable medicines that may become available in the future. Many smaller companies which may rely on direct marketing to physicians or other providers may not be able to comply or compete.

#### FEDERAL AND PHRMA GUIDELINES ARE ALREADY IN PLACE:

Pharmaceutical manufacturers are subject to criminal anti-kickback statutes and other criminal and civil provisions, enforced by the U.S. Department of Justice, that govern their relationships with healthcare providers, including the Food, Drug and Cosmetic Act, the Federal Anti-Kickback Statute, Prescription Drug Marketing Act, the Federal Trade Commission Act, and the False Claims Act. Furthermore, the Federal Health and Human Services Office of Inspection General (OIG) maintains detailed guidance for pharmaceutical companies designed to deter violations of these federal laws. These marketing guidelines prohibit quid pro quos between drug makers and healthcare professionals. Furthermore, the pharmaceutical industry has issued its own voluntary guidelines, The PhRMA Code for Interactions with Healthcare Professionals (the "PhRMA Code"), related to communications with healthcare practitioners.

#### ADDITIONAL COST AND EXPENSE MAY INCREASE PRICES.

Requiring an additional layer of reporting and monitoring, given the presence of both the PhRMA Code and OIG guidance, and existing legal sanctions for unlawful behavior will result in additional compliance costs to the industry. Such compliance will result in increased cost of the product and is counterproductive to the goal of reducing drug costs to consumers. Such legislation that would require substantial oversight would also increase the financial and administrative resource burdens of the State.

The Healthcare Distribution Management Association (HDMA) represents the nation's primary, full-service healthcare distributors and are responsible for ensuring that billions of units of medication are safely delivered to 144,000 retail pharmacies, hospitals, nursing homes, clinics and other provider sites in the most efficient manner possible. In light of the fact that three major healthcare distributors operate significant facilities in the state of Hawaii, we would like to comment on H.B. 12.

HDMA supports the ultimate goal of H.B. 12, that would require drug manfacturers to disclose to the board of pharmacy any economic benefits of \$25 or greater to persons who prescribe or purchase prescription drugs. This legislation would ensure that those individuals who are responsible for the prescribing or purchase of prescription drugs do so based on the best interests of the patient rather than as a result of undue influence by pharmaceutical manufacturers.

The current language of H.B. 12 clearly exempts wholesale distributors from the definition of "pharmaceutical marketers" in recognition of the fact that wholesale distributors carry products from all manufacturers and have no vested interest in promoting the products of one manufacturer over another. We respectfully ask that the same exemption language also be included under the definition of "pharmaceutical manufacturing company

The sponsor of H.B. 12, Representative Takumi, is in agreement that wholesale distributors are NOT the intended target of this legislation and is in support of the addition of the following language under the definition of "pharmaceutical manufacturing company"

"THE TERM DOES NOT INCLUDE A WHOLESALE DRUG DISTRIBUTOR OR THE DISTRIBUTOR'S REPRESENTATIVE WHO PROMOTES OR OTHERWISE MARKETS THE SERVICES OF THE WHOLESALE DRUG DISTRIBUTOR IN CONNECTION WITH A PRESCRIPTION DRUG."

Dear Rep. Takumi,

On behalf of Genentech, Inc., I am writing to respectfully oppose your HB 12, which would require the disclosure of certain marketing activity.

Certainly transparency is important. However, this bill does not accomplish its intended purpose. It will not reduce drug costs, and if anything, may increase costs as companies struggle to comply.

Doctors do not prescribe drugs in response to drug company marketing activities. In today's world of managed care, doctors do not have the final word on decisions to prescribe or administer drugs, especially for patients with life-threatening, seriously debilitating, or chronic conditions. Rather, health plans lay out the drug coverage rules under which doctors seek prior authorization for the use of the most costly drugs. Disclosing "gifts" to doctors will not change that system.

HB 12 ignores the scientific expertise of our sales force. Our sales force, a large proportion of whom are Doctors of Pharmacy and oncology nurses, have extensive educational backgrounds in biological sciences. They provide valuable assistance to doctors working to understand who the right patients are -- and who the wrong patients are -- for the medications being contemplated to treat serious and complicated diseases like cancer.

Hawaii is currently competing with other states and countries to build a biotech and life sciences industry that could help invigorate the economies of the islands. As you know, the State of Hawaii has committed funding over many years to invest in the businesses and infrastructure to encourage the growth in the high technology industries, such as biotech and the life sciences. Unfortunately, HB 12 would mark Hawaii as hostile to the very industry you hope to attract.

Requiring pharmaceutical disclosure of marketing information would represent unwarranted interference that could decrease competition. It is important to note that <u>no other industry</u> in Hawaii is required to disclose marketing efforts. This bill would unnecessarily add to compliance costs while duplicating voluntary guidelines already established by the industry. It may also potentially violate federal trade secret laws because confidential marketing information would have to be disclosed. Certainly this issue is not best addressed at the state level. As you can imagine, complying with 50 different marketing disclosure laws in 50 different ways would require an inordinate amount of time and resources on the part of life sciences companies like Genentech.

Hawaii's economic future is grounded in attracting and retaining jobs in high technology fields, like biotechnology. With increasing national and international competition, we urge you and your colleagues to reconsider this legislation that would discourage private investment in Hawaii's biotech and life sciences industry.
