## TESTIMONY OF THE DEPARTMENT OF TRANSPORTATION

## SENATE BILL No. 2019

## COMMITTEE ON TRANSPORTATION AND INTERNATIONAL AFFAIRS COMMITTEE ON EDUCATION

We support this bill but with concerns.

The Department of Transportation (DOT) supports the intent of this bill to improve pedestrian safety. The DOT has jurisdiction over higher speed corridor highways. However, access to elementary schools, especially on Oahu, is typically from county roads. The DOT does not have nor should we have the statutory authority to install speed tables or other roadway improvements on county roads.

We also have concerns that speed tables will lead to hazardous conditions on higher speed state roads. Speed tables are appropriate for low speed roads, but will create safety issues for motorists and increase congestion on higher speed highways. We have concerns if we are required to install speed tables along some of our 55 mph highways, as unintended safety hazards would be created as a result of this action.
